FACTS:

Danillo Camanag, an adult male, reportedly suffered a concussion with headaches and memory problems, as well as unspecified injuries to his neck, back, left knee and left ankle, when he slipped and fell over debris on the stairway of an apartment complex owned and operated by defendants City of Alameda and City of Alameda Housing Authority. The plaintiff contended the defendants contracted with a non-party to perform roof work, including installing solar panels, and that the debris on the stairway originated from this project. The plaintiff asserted the defendants created or allowed a dangerous condition to exist on public property under the control of the defendants for an unreasonable period of time, which was the proximate cause of his injuries. The defendant purportedly denied the plaintiff's allegations. After a bench trial, judgment was rendered in favor of the defendants.
