PRESIDENT'S REMARKS

At our last meeting, Tuesday Nov. 21^{st,} the Board approved the Budget for 2024. The operating budget was only slightly higher than 2023 (4%) but the Reserve Allocation needed to be raised to keep the reserves from falling below 80% funded. We are a little over 100% funded today but we have some expensive projects for the next couple of years and if we had not raised the allocation, the reserve funding would be at 30% which is too low. The increase in Reserve Allocation will mean that the monthly dues will increase \$20 and will now be at \$185. If you have questions on how

to change the payment of this fee please contact Paul Strong.

A big project that has been projected to start in 2024 is the fence replacement along Arnold and Watmaugh. These fences are paid ½ by the HOA and ½ by the individual homeowner that back these fences. I am doubtful we will start replacing the fences in 2024 however, as there is a significant amount of work to prepare. First we must get all the homes that are impacted by this project with the number of feet their portion amounts to, so we can partition the costs. We also want to give everyone a lot of time to accumulate the funds to pay for their share of the fence. We have formed a Fence Committee to start working on this process.

Every year at this time of giving, we take a collection up to divide among the Landscape crew, as a small monetary thank you gift for all the hard work they do for us over this past year. If you would like to donate please put your donation in an envelope and drop in my locking mailbox at 186 Saint James before December 15th.

TREASURER'S REPORT

THROUGH THE END OF OCTOBER 2023

There was one reserve expense in October (tree and stump removals), but the amount in the reserve fund is still in good shape at \$530,401 at the end of October. As for operating expenses, we were over budget by about \$2,260 in utility expenses, which, like last month, was mainly caused by the use of gas to heat the pool. In Landscape, we were over budget by about \$11,094 so far through the end of October. I'm still hoping that the \$1,700 per month savings due to the lower monthly maintenance cost will help offset the overage somewhat by the end of the year, but I still think we will end the year at about \$7,000 over budget in the landscape category. We were under budget in the other operating expense categories. Overall, we were about \$7,285 over budget for total expenses through the end of

October, an improvement of about \$3,200 from last month. I'm still hopeful that we have a chance of further reducing the overage somewhat by the end of the year, barring unforeseen circumstances. Our operating cash stands at about \$33,798. Subtracting the current liabilities leaves us with ready cash of about \$12,363, which should be enough to tide us over for the remainder of the year. There were four delinquent accounts at the end of October for a total of \$3,682.50. One of them has been delinguent since at least January of this year, with occasional payments and partial payments being made. Another account has had the bank account frozen, so we're not sure what's happening there. The other two residents are about 3 or 4 months in arrears. Strong Management has notified every one of these, and the board will be discussing

this situation in a future meeting.

If you don't have email access, you can also drop it in my mailbox at 266 S Temelec Circle. There is a list of homeowners who only have Waldron mow, nothing else on their front yards. They take care of everything else themselves. The majority of the HOA Board does that, including me. I do it because they damaged my shrubs and I have an invasive weed in my lawn that is spreading down the street. I want better for myself and for everyone else.

I know you all value your lawns, and want to make them better. I do too. If you agree, then please email me and I will tally the results for the January newsletter.

LOOSE ENDS

A Heartwarming Way to Give Back 'Loose Ends' mends broken hearts by finishing projects left behind by deceased loved ones.

While in Europe a few weeks ago, I watched a news story on BBC that featured an American non-profit called Loose Ends, an organization of volunteers that finish the knitting, crocheting and quilting projects of those who have died or are physically unable. Founded by two Americans, Masey Kaplan and Jen Simonic, the word about what the non-profit does is spreading around the world.

One of their first endeavors was a knitting project. The women were asked if they could find someone to finish a project for a family who had lost their mother. The mother had been working on a blanket but died before she could finish it. Loose Ends stepped in and found Sarah deDoes, an avid knitter for over 70 years. "It's something of myself that I can give to others," she said.

"We had been asked by friends who had lost loved ones if we could finish projects for them," Kaplan said. "By finishing it, they would be able to wear that person's love on that, basically. And after we had each done a number of projects, it occurred to us that there was an opportunity to let other people express that kind of generosity to each other as well. Many have since jumped at that opportunity, as Loose Ends has grown through word of mouth to over 1000 volunteers in 19 countries and all but two states, all in search of the satisfaction of delivering a part of who's gone to their loved ones.

Kaplan hopes that word can continue to spread about Loose Ends, and that the legacies of those who leave projects behind can be finished one stitch at a time.

Seeing this story reminded me of the labor of love my brother-in-law and I undertook when my husband passed last year. Joel's brother is an accomplished author and has written three novels. Joel asked his brother to publish his memoirs he had been writing since he retired. After Joel passed, Leonard and I put the pieces of Joel's memoirs and short stories together and I had them published. I distributed the books to members of his family and to his friends mentioned in his memoirs. Leonard and I were glad we were able to fulfill Joel's wishes.
