With each new year there are changes that must be made. We are pleased to welcome the students and instructors at our newest site in Oaklyn. Work is being done to introduce diakonia to the Neptune area soon.

We are currently working to introduce an exciting new method of delivering instruction, the use of Zoom video conferencing. This "site" would require students to attend class weekly via their computer. The students would be able to see and hear each other and the instructor. Assignments would be handed in via an email attachment. You would still be required to be "in class" at a set time each week, but you could do so from the comfort of your own home. We would like to pilot this program in the spring to make certain this is a comfortable method of delivery of instruction. You may notice that we will not be holding our usual fall retreat this year. After a great deal of discussion the steering committee decided to forgo a retreat this year. There are a number of exciting programs being offered in October in commemoration of the 500th anniversary of the Reformation. I pray that you will take part in at least one of these activities. THE PASTOR'S CORNER

Dear people of God in the diakonia community:

In these days of commemoration of the 500th anniversary of the Reformation I find myself reflecting on something we read in worship a couple weeks ago – Romans 12:2, where Paul writes: Do not be conformed to this world, but be transformed by the renewing of your minds.

Now, I don't know about you, but each time I hear this text I connect it to an earlier verse from Paul's letter – Romans 10:17 where we read: So faith comes from what is heard, and what is heard comes through the word of Christ.

Taken together these verses seem to clearly point to a couple of central Reformation themes.

- 1) The importance of ongoing reformation, both in our lives as individual Christians and in the Church, the assembly of God's people; and
- 2) The importance of understanding that it's God's Word that is the impetus and the guide for this ongoing reforming, or to use Paul's words this ongoing renewing of the mind.

As we continue to serve Christ's people together as

REFLECTION ON VISIT TO ELIZABETH, NJ DETENTION CENTER FOR UNDOCUMENTED IMMIGRANTS

Excerpts from July 14 post

I joined Presiding Bishop Elizabeth Eaton in a visit to the Elizabeth, New Jersey Detention Center for undocumented immigrants. It was a convening of the many partners and allies in New Jersey who accompany civil society and its issues with the Gospel......We came at the invitation of Pastor Ramon Collazo, pastor of Santa Isabel Lutheran Church in Elizabeth and their parish leaders. He is also chaplain at the Detention Center and has established respectful relationships with the leadership of the Center, which has opened doors for the visitation and worship Lutherans provide. (Pastor Collazo offered bi-lingual Diakonia classes at Santa Isabel.)



It was a full, emotional, troubling, hopeful day. We shared time with the young people and their leaders of the confirmation camp sharing stories about their own experience with immigrants in their family history and relationships, the issues involved, a biblical framework. We met with the leaders assembled above and their efforts to accompany those being deported where families are being ripped apart, as well as to advocate on issues of policy. Pastors talked about the challenges and opportunities of conversation with their own parishioners who have divergent views on immigration issues. The PICO community organizer spoke about keeping the issue of race front and center in dealing with immigration issues. Volunteers talked about how Saturday visitations at the Center was the best part of their week and helped give a human face to these issues in real and deepening relationships. Pastor Ramon and his leaders spoke about the life and leadership of their parish, and how they are trying to nurture and form leadership for their emerging Latino ministry.


On My Shelf

When you receive thisnewsletter it will be October

and all of Lutherland will be celebrating and remembering the 500th Anniversary of the Reformation. It seems appropriate then to review a book about Martin Luther. There have been many publications recently about the Reformation and even a couple of movies about the life and global implications of the Reformation and Brother Martin, but I have chosen "Resilient Reformer – The Life and Thought of Martin Luther" by Timothy Lull and Derek Nelson and published by Fortress Press.

As a biography of Luther it progresses in chronological order beginning with his family life and ending with his death, but it is the in-between times that intrigued me most. The book illuminates how he wrestled with his own salvation and the corruption of his beloved church. It is fortuitous for the church's history when Luther is appointed as a professor of the Bible to the young university at Wittenberg which

also had its own printing business. Luther found himself in the right place at the right time to change history and the church even when that was never his intention. It is his reading of scripture and his stand on God's Word as the only authority of faith that brings about the dramatic personal change and condemnation of church practice and teaching.



Although this book was written by two scholarly authors, their gifts as teachers shine through in their writing style and in how the book was printed. It is enjoyable to read. The format is easy on the eyes and it tells of Luther's life as a story worth hearing. Luther's theology shines through especially in chapters 4, 8, and 10. There are numerous Luther quotes, but they are always placed within the historical and biographical context. I highly


