Our County Commissioner, Martha Salas. has not been sitting idle! In

her work as our county representative, Martha has made inroads with some our major concerns and has worked hard enough for even other counties to take notice.

At this year's Association of County Commissioner Affiliates, held in Santa Fe with commissioners from throughout New Mexico, Martha was elected Chairperson of the Association. She will now not only serve as the Vice-Chair of the Socorro County Commission, but will also be representing all NM counties at the state and national levels.

On a more personal level, Martha completed and received her EDGE certification through New Mexico State University. This certification provides extensive and thorough training in the legal, ethical and logistic responsibilities of being a county commissioner. Although this is a certification that is open to all commissioners, many elected officials chose not to acquire a full understanding of their role in this politically-critical position. We salute and congratulate Mrs. Salas for choosing to be at the top of her game in order to better represent us!

Lastly, Commissioner Salas has advised that the NM State Auditor

Hard Work is **Producing Results**

Keller has recognized Socorro County for having one of the most improved audits. First place went to Clay County, and we were the Runner-Up. In light of previous years' abysmal accounting audits, the recent results indicate that everyone's hard work, with the Commission's oversight has produced wonderful results. With fewer financial clouds to mar our county, this should make acquiring funding more feasible.

After a family emergency, Mrs. Salas learned that the ambulance company (AMR) out of Belen is involved with litigation with Living Cross, which is stalemating some of prior efforts. Until further notice, Socorro County Fire Chief Gonzales needs to approve on a case-by-case basis for AMR to provide services. Fire Chief Gonzales says he will promptly approve AMR to come out if all of their local ambulances are otherwise busy.

One of Commissioner Salas' primary projects has been our medical center. The Department of Finance Administration (DFA) has not as yet moved on this project. Although \$100,000 was approved for site preparation, which the County has done, these funds have not been reimbursed. Mrs. Salas has now teamed up with Rep. Don Tripp in order to try to resolve this issue and get our medical center moving forward again.

Overall, it appears our commissioner has been working overtime. Thank you Commissioner Salas! 💥


Meeting every quarter rather than monthly means an action packed agenda in a very short time. This quarter's LJCDA meeting was no exception!

One of the highlights was Gair Linhart's success in organizing the Adopt-a-Highway project for the Highway 304 stretch just north of La Joya. The first highway cleanup is scheduled for March 19 (just before Easter) and more details will be available next month.

Another grant request had been submitted for the gymnasium, but due to the state budget cuts, it appears this project will have to wait another year.

Recycling was also discussed. At one time the Convenience Center was provided with bins for recycling, but they were removed several years ago. The Association is going to ask that this facet be returned to the Convenience Center, principally for cans, glass and paper.

The archeological dig just north of the La Joya Water Tower was discussed. It appears that onefourth of the site has been excavated. In the work thus far it has been discovered that Old Kings Road ran directly through the Piru Pueblo instead of around it (which was usually done). It was also discovered that the area in which the San Luis Abisbo Church was thought to have been located was wrong. When the dig resumes this spring, it is hoped to locate it.

At this time the dig has uncovered the remains of five buildings and three kivas. Also found were pottery shards, some of which are dated from the 11th Century.

The biggest challenge faced by the archeological dig is caused by the curious and the vandals. It is planned to construct fencing with clear postings of "no trespassing," and a locked gate.

Last of the activities of the meeting included a call for members to pay their membership dues (\$12.50 per year) and to encourage residents from the La Joya/Contreras communities to join.

Their next meeting has been scheduled for April 20, starting at 6:30 p.m. in the Rio Abajo Community Library. 💥

Natural Health Tips

Type 2 Diabetes in a Nutshell

In a healthy person the stomach breaks down carbohydrates into sugars. These sugars enter the bloodstream, prompting the pancreas to release insulin in order to help your cells use the sugar for fuel (energy). In type 2 diabetes your pancreas makes less or no insulin, so your body can't use sugar properly, which leaves sugar in your blood.

What Will You Notice First?

About 1 out of 3 people with type 2 diabetes don't know they have it because they have no symptoms. When they do appear, the most common symptoms are:

- Being thirsty a lot;
- Dry mouth;
- Bigger appetite;
- Peeing a lot (sometimes every hour); and
- Unusual weight loss or gain.



As blood sugar levels get higher, other problems develop, like headaches, blurred vision, and fatigue. If still undiagnosed, red flags begin to pop up:

- Slow healing cuts or sores;
- Frequent yeast or urinary tract infections; and
- Itchy skin, especially in the groin area

Diabetes can damage blood vessels and nerves in your genitals, leading to feeling loss. About one in 3 diabetics have some form of sexual trouble. Women are prone to vaginal dryness and 35%-70% of diabetic men develop some degree of impotence.

Risk Factors

Some things in life cannot be controlled, such as race/ethnicity, family history, or age. However, health habits and medical conditions can raise your odds of developing type 2 diabetes, including:

- Being overweight, especially at the waist
- A couch potato lifestyle
- Smoking
- Eating a lot of red meat, processed meat, high-fat dairy products, and sweets
- Unhealthy cholesterol and triglyceride levels

Women have a higher risk of developing type 2 diabetes if they had gestational diabetes when pregnant, delivered a baby that weighed over 9 pounds, or had polycystic ovary syndrome


Lifestyle Makes a Difference

Blood sugar levels can be controlled through diet and weight loss.

- Track the carbs in your diet. Keep amounts the same at every meal, watch how much fat and protein you eat, and cut calories.
- Regular exercise (strength training or walking) improves your body's use of insulin, helps get rid of body fat, lower blood pressure, and protect you from heart disease.
- Stress can boost blood pressure and blood sugar. Practice relaxation techniques; and take time to talk to a friend, family member, counselor, or a religious leader.

If you don't treat diabetes with a healthy diet and exercise, you're more likely to:

- Get plaque in your arteries, leading to hardening of the arteries (atherosclerosis).
- Develop chronic kidney disease, which leads to kidney failure.
- Damage the tiny blood vessels that bring oxygen and nutrients to the retina of your eye (diabetic retinopathy) and lose your vision.
- Develop nerve damage. Symptoms include tingling, numbness, pain, and a pins and needles sensation (in fingers, hands, toes, or feet). This can make it hard to feel, so you might not notice wounds until gangrene sets in.
- Lose teeth since high blood sugar levels feed plaquecausing bacteria. This leads to tooth decay and gum disease.



Can It Be Prevented?

Type 2 diabetes can be avoided! To lower your risk, follow the same guidelines for warding off heart disease:

- ➢ Eat a healthy diet.
- Exercise for 30 minutes, five days a week.

- Stay at a healthy weight.
- Talk to your doctor about being tested for prediabetes.

People with prediabetes <u>can</u> avoid getting diabetes.
