

### <u>U.S.-Pakistan Energy Partnership – U.S. Announces 15 Year Partnership</u>

#### with Banks



Consul General Grace Shelton presided over the signing of a partnership agreement between the U.S. Agency for International Development (USAID) and Habib Bank Limited, MCB Bank Limited, Faysal Bank Limited, Meezan Bank Limited and JS Bank Limited today. Through U.S. funding, this 15 year partnership will provide up to a 50 percent guarantee for loans made for clean energy projects.



"The U.S. Government is excited to partner with some of Pakistan's leading private commercial banks and support the banks' efforts in promoting clean energy" said USAID Assistant to the Administrator

for Afghanistan-Pakistan Affairs William Hammink during his remarks. "Under the program, smaller scale clean energy projects will be able to access long-term, Pakistani Rupee financing. The facility is expected to significantly improve access to financing for these smaller scale projects and encourage private investment in clean energy," he added.

Through this agreement, approximately \$88 million in financing will become available to support the development of the clean energy sector in Pakistan. Partner banks will be able to extend debt financing to smaller scale clean energy projects, developers, and companies or to households and businesses purchasing clean energy equipment.

The United States and Pakistan cooperate to support their efforts in energy growth, including through the U.S.-Pakistan Energy Working Group under the U.S.-Pakistan Strategic Dialogue. Under the U.S.-Pakistan Clean Energy Partnership, announced by President Obama and Prime Minister Sharif in October 2015, U.S. assistance supports increased energy generation, its transmission to Pakistan's national grid, improved distribution, management, and revenue collection, as well as policy reform.

#### **US Consul General hosts volleyball clinic for Dawood girls**



Karachi – U.S. Consul General Grace Shelton engaged with young Pakistani girls at a volleyball clinic held at her residence. Renowned Pakistani volleyball coaches Farah Sarfaraz, Nouma Faridi, and Fozia Naz trained more than 40 girls from Dawood Public School as their parents watched from the sidelines.



"Volleyball shows us the importance of teamwork and inclusivity," said U.S. Consul General Grace Shelton, speaking to the girls, coaches and parents. "Just as volleyball teams need players with different skill sets – bumping, setting, and spiking – so do communities need people with different backgrounds, expertise, and perspectives," she added.U.S. Consulate General Karachi organizes sports diplomacy events to promote friendly relations and increased understanding between Pakistanis and Americans. ## American Ambassador David Hale Meets with Pakistani "Let Girls Learn Ambassadors"



Islamabad, September 26, 2016 – American Ambassador David Hale welcomed back from the United States Pakistan's Let Girls Learn Ambassadors Summayka Qadir and Deepa Kumari who represented their country in New York City during United Nations General Assembly (UNGA) week. The women participated in the "Broadway Shines a Light on Girls' Education" event on September 19, part of the Let Girls Learn initiative, which encourages world leaders to provide education opportunities to an estimated 62 million girls globally who do not attend school.

Hosted by First Lady Michelle Obama, the program was convened as a side event to coincide with the gathering of world leaders in New York for the opening of the 71st UNGA. At the event, three young women from Pakistan, Jordan and Malawi spoke about their personal educational experiences, highlighting the importance of girls' education. Dignitaries, including several spouses of the heads of government participating in this year's UNGA, attended the event.

Ms. Qadir, 19, told her story on stage: "I came from an impoverished single-parent household. Despite financial hardships, I was accepted into medical school and granted a full scholarship from USAID for my studies." She has aspirations to become a doctor to help others. "To me, girls' education is very important, as girls deserve the education as much as the boys do."

When greeting Ms. Kumari and Ms. Qadir upon their return to Pakistan, Ambassador Hale stated, "Girls with dreams become women with vision. Let's create a world where this vision runs free. Educated girls like Summayka and Deepa will become women who can ultimately strengthen their

families, communities, and countries. This important initiative will be transformative for Pakistan, empowering young women to overcome barriers and lift themselves out of poverty."

The two young women were selected from the many beneficiaries of the USAID-funded Merit and Needs-Based Scholarship Program which is implemented in partnership with Pakistan's Higher Education Commission. With the help of this program, talented yet economically disadvantaged Pakistani youth are earning bachelor's or master's degrees at 31 partner universities across Pakistan. The program is also a part of USAID's Let Girls Learn initiative.

USAID's Let Girls Learn in Pakistan program was announced last year on October 22 by Michelle Obama and First Daughter Maryam Sharif in coordination with the Government of Pakistan as a commitment to advance girls' education. The program will provide an additional 200,000 Pakistani girls access to education and the tools they need to succeed in life. This initiative demonstrates the importance that both countries attach to girls' education. Building on Pakistan's commitment to double its spending on education, the United States will invest \$70 million to educate adolescent girls in Pakistan.

19 Pakistani Students Return Home from U.S. Embassy-Funded "Summer Sisters" Exchange Program



Islamabad, September 22, 2016: Yesterday, U.S. Embassy and iEARN Pakistan staff welcomed home 19 female Pakistani students who recently participated in the Summer Sisters Exchange Program at U.S. universities, including Harvard, American University, and Smith College. The students, ages 15 to 18, spent the summer studying science, leadership and international affairs.

"The U.S. Embassy sponsors this program because all children – no matter their gender or their economic background – have the potential to develop into community leaders and deserve a quality education," said U.S. Embassy Deputy Cultural Affairs Officer Maureen Mimnaugh. "I look forward to seeing the participants in this program inspire other students in their communities and implement their new leadership skills."

The Summer Sisters Institute, launched in 2013 by the U.S.-Pakistan Women's Council, aims to provide a unique educational experience and mentor promising young Pakistani female students from historically disadvantaged backgrounds. Since 2013, a total of 42 Pakistani girls have participated in this exchange program.

"Exchange programs like Summer Sisters are intensive, structured, and powerful," said iEARN Pakistan Executive Director Farah Kamal. "Through this program, students develop lifelong friendships and gain knowledge, enthusiasm, and passion to make the world a better place."

"Summer Sisters was the best summer of my life," said 2015 program alumna Kainat Kanwal, who attended American University's Community of Scholars program. "I especially enjoyed the opportunity to do community service alongside my American friends, and I used my new volunteering

skills when I came home to set up a hygiene camp for mothers and children in Sialkot."

The Summer Sisters Exchange Program is one of many exchange programs sponsored by the U.S. Department of State. ### American Embassy Celebrates Achievements of Pakistani Women with Disabilities



Islamabad, September 22, 2016 – American Counselor for Public Affairs Christina Tomlinson joined members of the National Assembly and nongovernmental organization representatives today to celebrate the achievements of Pakistani women with disabilities. At the Special Talent Exchange Program (STEP) Conference, she emphasized the importance of supporting the rights of women with disabilities so they can fully participate in all aspects of society.



"Promoting disability rights is an integral part of our efforts to promote human rights more broadly," she said. "We want to remove barriers and create a world in which disabled people everywhere enjoy dignity and full inclusion. We work with governments and organizations like STEP to protect and promote the rights of disabled persons, and provide practical support to ensure their inclusion and full participation in society."

This conference marks the conclusion of a one-year, \$375,000 program to support Pakistani women with disabilities funded by the American Embassy and implemented by STEP. Throughout the past year, STEP has organized more than 90 training sessions, TV talk show discussions, and provincial workshops to increase public and Pakistani government awareness about the rights of women with disabilities and to provide livelihood training for women with disabilities.

"Women with disabilities face disadvantages in several key areas when compared with other women, men with disabilities, and society as a whole," said STEP Programs Director Abia Akram. "STEP, with the support of the American Embassy in Pakistan, initiated Supporting Women with Disabilities project to refine the approach of stakeholders and to help fully realize these women's rights." As this program comes to a close, the American Embassy and Mobility International are beginning collaboration on a new program to empower Pakistanis with disabilities and their allies. USAID's Initiative Succeeds in Increasing the Use of Research for Policy Reforms in Pakistan

Islamabad, September 21, 2016 – The United States Agency for International Development (USAID) has helped Pakistan strengthen its institutional capacity and policy making by fostering evidence-based decision-making on public policy issues.

USAID partnered with the International Food Policy Research Institute from July 2011 to July 2016 on the Pakistan Strategy Support Program. Working with the Ministry of Planning, Reforms and Development they shaped a policy research agenda for Pakistan to achieve economic growth and reduce poverty.

"The objective of this project was to help government leaders design and implement evidence-based policy reforms and to encourage public investments in agriculture," Mission Director USAID John Groarke explained. "Some of the successes of the program include developing a new agricultural seed law, charting pathways to reform fertilizer subsidies, reforming the national water policy, and refining poverty measurements," he added.

Under this program, USAID also awarded 71 competitive grants to Pakistani researchers to work the Government of Pakistan's development objectives including those under Vision 2025. These grants resulted in four PhD dissertations, 16 Journal Articles and 23 Working Papers. More publications are in process even after the closing of the USAID project.

Some of the awardees notably influenced policy. A study on medicinal and aromatic plants led to a new chapter in the Khyber Pakhtunkhwa Forest Act of 2011 that regulates collection and harvesting of medicinal and aromatic plants without harming the ecosystem. Additionally, several surveys, including the Pakistan Rural Household Panel and Production Surveys, the Pakistan Cotton Production Survey, and the Migration Tracking Survey provided data that will aid the policymakers for drafting future policies.

Dr. Nadeem Amjad, the Chairman of the Pakistan Agriculture Research Council stated, "The Pakistan Agricultural Research Council (PARC) acknowledges the efforts of the USAID in promoting agricultural research in Pakistan through its various programs. We especially appreciate USAID's support through Pakistan Strategy Support Program for the Independent Third Party Evaluation of PARC in 2012 that resulted in many institutional reforms and a business plan, which has led to efficient allocation of resources and better monitoring systems at PARC."

Through Pakistan Strategy Support Program, USAID also developed programs and modules to train more than 900 government and academicians on economic modeling and simulation techniques; geographic information systems; data analysis; poverty mapping; and monitoring, evaluation, and survey techniques.

Karachi – Over 50 alumni and teachers of the U.S. government funded English Access
Microscholarship Program (Access) came together earlier today to clean Karachi's beaches. American and Pakistani volunteers including the U.S. Consul General Brian Heath and incoming Consul General Grace Shelton joined the young volunteers in the clean-up.

"Today's event has showed the value of keeping this city clean, and the shared role we all can play in improving our communities" said Consul General Heath while talking to the volunteers. In advance of U.S. Secretary of State John Kerry's third "Our Ocean" conference September 15-16, 2016, Americans and Pakistanis came together to highlight the joint commitment to protecting the ocean and fighting marine pollution.

The English Access Microscholarship Program (Access), a two-year after-school English-language proficiency program, trains talented 13-20 year olds from disadvantaged communities. Throughout the world, the Access Program has reached over 115,000 students in 80+ countries. When Access

came to Pakistan in 2004, it first began in Karachi and has reached over 13,000 students in Pakistan to date. Through community service projects like the beach cleanup, Access students develop awareness of social problems in their own communities; they also develop positive civic attitudes, empathy for the less privileged, and youth leadership skills.

(TiE) Islamabad Chapter concluded the 2016 Pakistan StartUp Cup, a nationwide business model competition. Over the past six months, more than 950 teams from Lahore, Karachi, Faisalabad, and Islamabad competed for a top prize of 1 million rupees. The winning team, "Cowlar," hailing from Islamabad, developed a startup plan to sell smart collars for cows designed to help farmers improve herd health, optimize dairy operations, and boost milk yields.



U.S. Embassy Deputy Chief of Mission Jonathan Pratt congratulated the members of the top 12 teams and encouraged them to continue pursuing their startup dreams beyond the conclusion of this competition. "As President Obama said, 'I believe that entrepreneurs like you can make the world a better place, one idea at a time,'" Pratt commented. "Tonight, we've seen that Pakistani women and men are doing just that, by developing plans to help farmers optimize their operations, to provide affordable clean drinking water, and to create prosthetic devices for amputees."

The 2016 StartUp Cup in Pakistan built on the success of the 2013 and 2015 competitions and continued to strengthen partnerships with the Higher Education Commission and entrepreneurship centers across Pakistan, including the Women's Entrepreneurial Center of Resources, Education, Access, and Training for Economic Empowerment (WECREATE) in Islamabad, the Lahore University for Management Science Center for Entrepreneurship, Lahore-based government-supported incubator Plan 9, Karachi-based technology incubator "The Nest I/O," and the National University of Sciences and Technology (NUST) Technology Incubation Center.

The partnerships between StartUp Cup and these centers will ensure that newly established

businesses receive sustained support, mentoring, and essential tools for long-term success. Various U.S. Embassy programs assist Pakistani entrepreneurs by increasing their access to financial resources, supporting opportunities for entrepreneurship education, and nurturing an entrepreneurial culture.

Islamabad, September 01, 2016 – Representatives from Pakistani businesses traveled to the United States to participate in the 2016 International Woodworking Fair in Atlanta, Georgia. The IWF is one of the world's premier furniture manufacture, architectural woodwork, custom and general woodworking trade shows, and hosts more than 1,000 exhibitors specializing in all areas of woodworking supply and technology.

"Through this trade delegation, Pakistani and American businesspeople had the opportunity to explore new markets and build connections between their businesses," said Cheryl Dukelow, Commercial Counselor at the U.S. Embassy in Islamabad. "This delegation had the opportunity to learn about the latest products and technologies in their fields, and will be able to improve their businesses as a result."

Each year the U.S. Commercial Service (USCS) recruits and leads 150 to 200 members of Pakistan's private business sector to trade shows in the United States as part of the International Buyer's Program. Thus far this year the USCS has led delegations to trade shows focusing on consumer electronics, poultry and processing equipment, concrete natural homeopathic products, and smart grid and electricity transmission and distribution technology. Upcoming programs will include the Farm Progress Show and Solar Power International.

Delegation members pay a fee to join the official Pakistan delegation and their own expenses, and in return, receive specialized services and facilitation through the USCS, tailored according to their business objectives and interests. ## Ambassador Hale Urges Public and Private Sector Representatives to Foster Women's Entrepreneurship

Islamabad, August 31, 2016 – American Ambassador David Hale encouraged public and private sector representatives to continue their efforts to support women's entrepreneurship in Pakistan during a workshop in Islamabad today.

Ambassador Hale's remarks occurred during the final conference of the one-year Women Can Do Project, funded by the U.S. Embassy and carried out by the Shaoor Foundation. Through this project, over 3,000 women have received entrepreneurship training at public universities and madrassas across Pakistan. Shaoor Foundation staff also have coordinated a series of policy discussions with government officials, educators, business representatives, and others to identify and address the barriers to women's entrepreneurship in Pakistan.

"Through this project, we have found that so many women across Pakistan have a dream of establishing their own businesses, but many didn't know where to begin," said Women Can Do Project Manager Durreshawar Mahmood. "While training and inspiring women currently in universities and madrassas to pursue their goals, we also have worked with officials and others to ensure future generations of Pakistani women have more resources and fewer challenges when seeking to start their own businesses."

Supporting women entrepreneurs in Pakistan has a ripple effect on families, villages, and cities across Pakistan. Successful entrepreneurs create jobs for other women and men. They offer innovative solutions to problems. They deliver essential services. And they support their families. The Women Can Do Project is one of many entrepreneurship-related initiatives supported by the American Embassy. For example, the American Embassy sends Pakistani entrepreneurs to the United States on exchange programs, supported the establishment of the WECREATE Center for women's entrepreneurship in Islamabad, and sponsored the travel of Pakistani delegates to the Global Entrepreneurship Summit in June.

#### Senior U.S. Official Reaffirms Commitment to Trade with Pakistan

Islamabad, August 30, 2016 – Assistant United States Trade Representative (AUSTR) for South Asia Michael Delaney led a delegation to Islamabad to discuss the ongoing U.S.-Pakistan Trade and Investment Framework Agreement, known as TIFA, from August 28-30 with members of the government of Pakistan. The intersessional meeting, hosted by the Ministry of Commerce, covered a broad range of trade and investment-related issues, including expanded market access for Pakistani goods in the United States, business-to-business ties, intellectual property, and progress on the Augmented Joint Action Plan for Trade and Investment, as agreed by President Barack Obama and Prime Minister Nawaz Sharif during the Prime Minister's October 2015 visit to Washington, DC. "Pakistan and the United States share a relationship based increasingly on trade and investment, and have a five-year action plan to continue to do so," AUSTR Delaney said. "The United States sees Pakistan's prosperity as good for the region and good for the United States."

AUSTR Delaney met with members of the government of Pakistan and discussed issues of bilateral interest. During his meetings, AUSTR Delaney emphasized that the United States remains committed to working with the Pakistani government and private sector to enhance bilateral trade and investment ties.

The United States is the largest destination for Pakistani exports and is one of the country's primary sources of foreign direct investment, and in 2015, bilateral trade between Pakistan and the U.S. surpassed \$5.5 billion.

The U.S-Pakistan TIFA provides a strategic framework and principles for dialogue on trade and investment issues between the two nations. # USAID helping Pakistani mango farmers access world markets 22 August, 2016

Thatta – U.S. Consul General Brian Heath visited a mango farm in Tando Hafiz Shah to inspect automated mango graders and processors provided by the U.S. Agency for International Development (USAID). USAID Deputy Mission Director Denise Herbol and Deputy Provincial Director Patrick Brady were also present.

"The United States is helping Pakistan boost domestic and international sales of Pakistani agricultural products, including mangoes," said Consul General Heath. "We want to make Pakistani mangoes as competitive as they can be in international markets," he said. Pakistan is the fifth largest mango-producing country in the world, but exports less than 8 percent of its production. "Pakistani mango

exports to the U.S. doubled last year, setting a record at 184 metric tons, and there is even more potential in this area," said Mr. Heath.

USAID launched the U.S.-Pakistan Partnership for Agricultural Market Development in February 2015 to increase production and sales of products, including meat, vegetables, mangoes and citrus. This partnership promotes cooperation among farmers, processers, exporters and buyers of agricultural products from Pakistan.

In Sindh, the situation is most severe in districts affected by the 2010 floods.

USAID also awarded a grant to Aga Khan University to mainstream education for children with special needs and increase enrollment for girls in government and private schools. The effort is part of the "Let Girls Learn" initiative in Pakistan to ensure girls receive the education they deserve, announced by Michelle Obama and Maryam Nawaz Sharif at the White House in October 2015.

# Pakistani Students and Faculty Travel to the United States to Conduct Energy Research August 4, 2016

Islamabad, August 4, 2016 – U.S. and Pakistani officials gathered today to recognize 33 Pakistani graduate students and two faculty members who will soon travel to the United States to spend a semester at Arizona State University and Oregon State University. During their exchange program, which is funded by the U.S. Agency for International Development (USAID), these individuals will conduct research relating to Pakistan's most pressing energy challenges.

This academic exchange is associated with USAID's five-year, \$127 million investment in the U.S.-Pakistan Centers for Advanced Studies Program, which aims to harness applied research to find innovative and practical solutions to Pakistan's energy, water, agriculture, and food security challenges. As part of this program, approximately 200 Pakistanis will spend a semester at American universities over the next four years. Faculty will have the opportunity to enhance their teaching skills and to learn how to build successful partnerships between academia and the corporate sector, while students will focus on research and industry awareness.

"Over time, USAID expects each Center for Advanced Studies will form public-private partnerships and networks to bring together the best minds in academia, government, and the business community and drive innovation, competitiveness, and economic growth," said USAID Deputy Mission Director James Peters. "The centers will also set new standards for supporting the success of women and disadvantaged youth in the engineering profession."

Under the umbrella of the Higher Education Commission, the U.S.-Pakistan Centers for Advanced Studies in Energy at the National University of Sciences and Technology and at the University of Engineering and Technology, Peshawar are expected to become Pakistan's premier sustainable energy research centers. American and Pakistani officials have also collaborated to establish a Center for Advanced Studies in Agriculture and Food Security at the University of Agriculture, Faisalabad in partnership with the University of California-Davis, and a Center for Advanced Studies in Water at Mehran University of Engineering and Technology, Jamshoro in partnership with the University of Utah.

With his wife Bilquis Edhi, he created the Edhi Foundation, which has provided humanitarian assistance to hundreds of thousands of people in need, both in Pakistan and abroad. Whether creating the world's largest ambulance service, providing free and low cost medical care, training nurses, or building rehabilitation and welfare centers throughout the country, Edhi's life work was devoted to providing assistance and care anywhere there was a need. In the United States, his Foundation gave \$100,000 for relief efforts related to Hurricane Katrina. His legacy is his generosity, his humility, and his humanity.

His loss will be felt throughout the world. We join the people of Pakistan and the Edhi family in mourning the passing of this great man.

## Building a Stronger Future for Pakistan and America by Ambassador David Hale 4 July, 2016

As America celebrates its Independence Day, we at the American Embassy and Consulates are pausing to reflect on the shared values of our two countries. The people of Pakistan and the United States share a fundamental desire for peace and prosperity. Working together since Pakistan's own independence, our two countries have achieved great successes in fields ranging from energy to education to security, and have built the foundation for our long-term partnership.

Over the decades, the United States and Pakistan have become strong economic partners, with two-way annual trade of over \$5 billion. Last October in Washington, Prime Minister Nawaz Sharif and President Barrack Obama highlighted this economic partnership, announcing a Joint Action Plan on Trade and Investment and a U.S.-Pakistan Clean Energy Partnership. On June 2-3 in New York City, the United States hosted the fourth annual U.S.-Pakistan Business Opportunities Conference, bringing together over 250 industry representatives, investors, and government leaders from our two nations. We also recently launched the Pakistan Private Investment Initiative, a partnership between the U.S. Government and Pakistan to invest over \$150 million in small- and medium-sized enterprises in Pakistan. Moreover, I have made it a priority for the Embassy to support entrepreneurial efforts of Pakistanis, particularly among women and youth.

In both Pakistan and the United States, there is a recognition of the critical importance of a stable energy supply to power economic growth. That's why energy is a centerpiece of our civilian assistance program in Pakistan. American and Pakistani cooperation has added enough power to the national grid to benefit 28 million Pakistanis. We also are focused on attracting private sector

investment to develop Pakistan's rich, renewable solar, wind, geothermal, and water resources for sustainable energy. Together, we can build Pakistan's energy capacity not just for today, but for the future.

Whether in the United States or Pakistan, a successful economy and society also require the participation of engaged and educated citizens. As the first American President, George Washington, once said, "Knowledge is in every country the surest basis of public happiness." From primary school to post-graduate research, our nations are collaborating to develop the knowledge and skills of Pakistani youth. The U.S. Agency for International Development's Pakistan Reading Program aims to improve the reading ability of over one million children. The Fulbright Program has made it possible for thousands of students from Pakistan to pursue advanced degrees in the United States. Our two nations also are partnering through the Let Girls Learn-Pakistan initiative to support girls' access to education throughout Pakistan.

Security and counterterrorism efforts are another key element of our partnership to build a prosperous and peaceful future. Pakistan has suffered greatly at the hands of terrorists and violent extremists, and America stands in solidarity with the people of Pakistan and all who fight the menace of terrorism. To support Pakistan's efforts, America provides financing for military equipment and infrastructure, strengthening the Pakistan military's combat and operational capabilities. Pakistan is in fact the largest recipient worldwide of International Military Education and Training funds, which invest in the professional and human resource development of Pakistan's military and is among the top five recipients worldwide of American Foreign Military Financing. Beyond military support, America has been a longstanding partner with Pakistan's law enforcement professionals, providing millions of dollars annually since 1982 to strengthen Pakistan's law enforcement and criminal justice systems and its capacity to fight illicit narcotics.

In each of these fields, and many others, the length and breadth of our cooperation has seen us through challenges, and I look forward to seeing our cooperation flourish as our enduring partnership grows. Through our joint efforts, we can build a stronger future for both Pakistan and America.
