applied both to Israel and within Israel. We all recognize the double standard that leads to a hyper-focus on the relatively less severe violations of human rights perpetrated in a defensive posture by the

state of Israel, all the

while completely ignoring far more blatant violations across the globe. How is it that those who criticize Israel for being a (mislabeled) apartheid state have literally nothing to say when the King of Brunei declares that homosexuals and adulterers will now be put to death by stoning in his kingdom.

There is another, and I believe justifiable, double standard that Israel is entitled to apply to itself: the right to treat mortal threats outside of conventional norms. The annexation of the Golan Heights is an excellent example of this. While I, and for that matter the state of Israel, values the rule of law, applying the normal international standard that mandates territory captured in warfare be returned simply does not apply to Israel. The reason why this double standard is justifiable has to do with the unique position of the Golan Heights as a base for shelling and terror of the northern Galilee, as it was before the 1967 war.

THE CANTOR'S CLOUD by Cantor Menachem Bazian Unintended Consequences

The "Law of Unintended Consequences" plays a huge role in many fields. The famous economist, Adam Smith, relied on it in developing his economic theories. Other fields like sociology and psychology try to measure and quantify it. Its basic tenets are so obvious that only the really young, who do not yet have the life experience to identify it, are not clear about what it means.

Who among us has not experienced this? How many times have we taken an action and got results other than what we expected. In truth, many great inventions owe their existence to this indomitable truth. Alexander Graham Bell discovered the telephone by accident, just to name one. Our beloved State of Israel owes its existence in part due to the utter cruelty of the Holocaust. If that statement seems very strange to you, consider this. Given the utter propensity of the world to hate Jews, do you think that anything other than shock over the Holocaust could have gotten the UN, to agree to the partition plan that led to the establishment of the state?

The period between Pesach and Shavuot is known as *Sefira* because we count each day. Beginning with the second night of Pesach, we count from 1 to 49 knowing that each day brings us one day closer to celebrating the greatest gift in history: the presentation of the *Torah* to the Jewish people.

One would think that each day would be filled with greater and greater joy and anticipation. Like a child eagerly awaiting the presents on their birthday and counts the days until its arrival, each day brings greater expectations and excitement. If we are counting from our redemption in Egypt to our receipt of the *Torah*, would that not be how we should be feeling?

Yet, there are many Jews who observe a portion of the 49 days as days of mourning. They refrain from haircuts, shaving, public forms of entertainment and other restrictions. Why? Because the *Talmud* records that 24,000 ____students of Rabbi Akiva died

during a 33 day period that occured between Pesach and Shavuot. In remembrance of the catastrophe, people conduct themselves as I described.

And why did they die? The *Talmud* tells us that they died "because they did not conduct themselves respectfully with each other."

Why do we commemorate the catastrophe? Because we are meant to learn a lesson from their mistakes.

I find it hard to believe that the students of the great Rabbi Akiva went around insulting each other. Rabbi Akiva, a maverick in his own right, was the greatest sage of his time. Rabbi Akiva's *halachic* opinions in *Talmud* are frequently taken as authoritative law. His piety and faith were an example for all future generations and many stories about them are recounted in rabbinic literature. One would think that someone like Rabbi Akiva would teach his students proper behavior. If so, what happened?

I think we can look around the world today and maybe have an inkling. The world today is filled with people who have formed strong opinions and are closed minded to any speech that does not conform to their own. These people live in an echo chamber where their view of the world is constantly validated. When they meet someone with other opinions, the "discussion" is frequently anything but: They do not talk to each other but rather at each other.

I have no doubt that Rabbi Akiva's 24,000 students were brilliant scholars. I also have no doubt that anyone seeing their regular daily interaction would not have seen boorish behavior. But I wonder whether or not the "respect" they withheld from their colleagues was the simple recognition that there may be validity in another opinion. I am sure that they

did not intend disrespect: if they were people of that sort they would not have studied with Rabbi Akiva. But I wonder if, in their zeal to learn *Torah* and reach the truth that is core to learning *Torah*, they may have forgotten that every opinion deserves to be heard and weighed.

In our own lives, there are certainly times when we feel we are right without any doubt. When we feel that way, we are most vulnerable to fall into the trap of closing our minds. When we close our minds, we are cutting ourselves off from learning more. Maybe we aren't right? Maybe we are right but there can be improvements? One of the greatest qualities we can foster is that of an open mind. When our minds are open, we treat others with more respect because we will be interested in what they have to say. Perhaps, if we have our minds open, we can open other minds too.

There is no doubt that our society is in no small amount of trouble. Political debate is almost gone. People do not talk with each other anymore, they shout at each other. More communications are done using impersonal technologies than with the age old method of actually talking face to face.

If we work, maybe we can do our part to reverse some of this trend. We won't change the world but maybe, just maybe, we can start a ripple that can turn into a wave that could turn into a flood of change. We have to do our part. I'll leave the rest to *Hashem*.

ADDENDUM Cantor Bazian

In several of my prior **Scroll** articles, I have called for us to be vocal and fight anti-semitism in all its forms and wherever it manifests itself. You may recall that I specifically called out the company AirBnB.com for their acts of blatant anti-semitism when they put in place a policy that singled out Jewish properties in Judea and Samaria for delisting on their website. I asked that anyone who has an Airbnb account cancel that account and tell the company why they were cancelling. I myself cancelled my account immediately.

The response to Airbnb's flagrant antisemitism was strong and came from many different directions. As reported by *Forbes* magazine:

"Several U.S. states are now researching whether the global travel company has broken state laws by prohibiting the listings. Some U.S. cities are calling for a boycott. Airbnb faces multiple lawsuits over alleged discrimination, and U.S. Vice President Mike Pence criticized the move during a keynote at the Israeli American Council conference on November 30, saying Airbnb's actions had "no place" in the market. Last week, a prominent rabbi took out a full-page ad in the Washington Post, titled 'Airbnb: Anti-Semitic Bed & Breakfast.""

Texas enacted a boycott. Beverly Hills, CA did the same and Miami was looking into it. A lawsuit was brought by American/Israeli citizens who live in Judea and Samaria over the ban. And many Jews (I wish I could tell you a number, but I don't have it) cancelled their accounts over this issue.

Well, the *NY Times* reported on April 9, 2019, that Airbnb has now reversed their policy and will list the properties from Judea and Samaria on their website. They have promised to donate all their profits to humanitarian organizations which I have no problem with so long as those organizations have no ties to BDS, anti-semitism or terrorist related organizations.

Your voice counts! Airbnb's capitulation shows that we can and must continue to fight. The souls of millions of our murdered and oppressed coreligionists demand it.





Although we value the rule of law, it is simply inconceivable from the strategic point of view to return the Golan Heights to Syria.

However, this willingness to apply a double standard can be taken too far. The basic value of a democratic state is that all citizens may vote and that nothing should be done that suppresses the vote. I was therefore dismayed to hear that the Likud party employed a strategy to do just that. While I understand their position that a left-wing government will adopt policies that will bring renewed terrorism and a compromised sense of security, that is very different from a mortal threat that would justify actions we would otherwise consider reprehensible. Only when we are certain that the threat is direct and mortal are we entitled to use extraordinary means; Arab citizens voting in elections, and for that matter the possibility of a less right-wing government, simply do not qualify. We must protect ourselves not only from mortal threats that are real but from the moral corruption that follows from stepping outside of ethical norms to address a distant threat.

There is one accusation of double standard against not only Israel but supporters of the United States that is both wrong and intolerable. Questions about dual loyalty are simply unacceptable. It is our responsibility to

our nation--the United States of America--that we must stand together with Israel. Israel is the only nation in the Middle East founded not on the double standard of those with power and those without, but rather on the values of freedom, democracy and peace. When we support Israel we act in support of the interests of the United States and everything that the United States stands for, and we are prepared to make peace with anyone who will use that peace for greater freedom and prosperity.

We will always defend our right to apply the only double standard that is justified: the right to treat mortal threats outside of conventional norms. Let us remember that we are threatened, we are strong, and through AIPAC and other organizations we have friends and supporters across the political spectrum of our country.

Congregant of the Month: Anita Finklestein "Still Waters Run Deep" by Julie Feldman

nita Finkelstein is well known to members of our congregation as Sisterhood's Recording Secretary and she is one of the most fashionable women around, but she is also one of the quietest. Amazingly, she allowed me to interview her for my column, and I think you'll agree that there is much to know about her.

JF: Where did you grow up?

AF: I was born in Manhattan and grew up in the West Bronx on Valentine Avenue between 183rd and 184th Street. Later my family moved to the Lincoln Park area of Yonkers, in Westchester. My father attended the Lincoln Park Jewish Center. **JF:** Tell me about your family.

AF: I have one older sister. My father was a dress manufacturer and my mother was a dress buyer.

JF: What did you do for a living?

AF: I was a buyer for coats for a buying office in New York City for department stores. Buying offices advise stores about what is going to be "in" for the coming season, including what brand and designer to buy. Then I worked for Abraham & Strauss. Later, after my first husband and I moved to Rockland I met Herb Reisman. He was in the Legislature at the time and he offered me a job. I took it, and when he became Ramapo Town Supervisor, I moved over with him. I was involved in the town Twinning Program with Italy, Ireland, Israel, India, the Philippines and Ghana. I was involved in the fundraising for the program and in being a chaperone for the High School students who went on the twinning trips. I also was involved in forming the "Over 90 Club". The town would arrange monthly meetings for these superseniors at restaurants that would donate a luncheon. We also received donations of small merchandise for them and we would pick them up individually at their homes. It gave this group who was becoming more isolated, an opportunity to socialize.

JF: What made you interested in joining Monsey Jewish Center (and later CSI)?

AF: My first husband and I lived at Fort Bragg in North Carolina when we first married. After our

New York and a cousin of ours suggested at looking at Rockland County as a place to make our home. We bought a house on Viola Road and Rabbi and Leah Chanofsky lived next door. We just fell in love with them and with the shul. On Friday nights, the Rabbi would come to our house and knock his special "Shabbos Knock" and my husband and the children would walk over to the

synagogue with him. Both my children attended Hebrew School at MJC.

JF: What are your hobbies?

AF: Hat shopping, spending time with my grandchildren and going to the gym.

JF: Tell me about a life-defining moment.

JF: If money were not an object, what would you do?

AF: I would travel in the US and see all of our states. There are many places I've never been to such as the Dakotas, the Midwest (with the exception of Chicago) and many, many other places.


