RAC Library Leaves



La Joya's City Water Undergoing Changes

The Annual Meeting of the La Joya Mutual Domestic Water Consumers Association (LJMDWCA) was held on Sunday, February 23rd. Although the Association focuses primarily on serving the village of La Joya, they have served as a model to many other farming communities throughout New Mexico regarding the power of cooperation and provision of public services.



At this annual event, Mr. Marcello Abeyta announced he was stepping down as president. Mr. Henry Chivera was named Interim President, and will hold this position until the next election in 2019.

Also stepping down was Mr. Ernesto Cordova due to health issues. Lastly in Board changes was the announcement that Father Eli Felipe Valadez was replacing Father Phillip and Father Dennis.



After review of the past year's issues and new challenges being faced, it was evident that the water tank and many of the fixtures and

equipment needed replacing. Rates had been held at \$20 per month per household for several years despite escalating costs for maintenance and equipment. Since costs have continued to exceed revenues, it has not been possible to acquire a loan to do necessary upgrades and replacements. As a result, it was voted to increase water rates effective April 1, 2016.

The standard household rates will be raised to \$25 per month for the basic rate and \$3 per 1,000 gallons thereafter.

It was also voted that landlords be responsible for water costs unless specified in the tenant's lease. New tenants are required to pay a \$25 deposit to initiate services in their name, and if they move without paying their water bill, the deposit is forfeit and the water will be shut off until paid in full.



Additionally, landlords will be required after the first switch to their name to pay a \$50 administrative fee each time. It is hoped that landlords will choose to retain the bill in their name versus having to constantly incur administrative expenses to switch the paperwork back and forth.

Lastly in new charges to consumers will be late fees and hook-up costs to re-initiate service if the water is turned off due to nonpayment.

Until April 1, 2016, LJMDWCA will continue to absorb all the costs for financing services to nonpaying customers and the constant administrative expenses for fluctuating accounts.

Also discussed at the annual meeting was the possibility of expanding services to a wider area, which will be possible if a grant and/or loan is acquired. Although present facilities are requiring extensive repair and replacement, it is projected that with consumers helping to absorb the standard operating costs, it will be possible to begin work.

Although no one likes to pay more on their bills, it is noted that this water association will continue to offer the most economical public water resource in New Mexico! **

Disaster Preparedness

In November 2015 a public hearing was held regarding the Socorro County Multi-Jurisdictional Natural Hazard Mitigation Plan. In short, the hearing was to determine whether the Rio Abajo community has the potential for any natural disasters. The outcome was, YES. We have a higher earthquake rating than

California, there is danger of fire and flood, and the biggest danger – the potential of a railway disaster. We have a major railway line going through the heart of our community, with cargos varying from produce and cars to toxic waste (including radiation and chemicals).

This past January a Disaster Preparedness Workshop was held at the Univ. of N. Mexico by the NM Department of Health. The focus of the workshop was the establishment of PODs (Point of Dispensing). These are centrally-located sites (usually schools) where emergency medications and vaccines are available.

In short, other than the trained, Dept. of Health medical personnel that screens everyone, all other work is conducted by community volunteers in order to meet the demands of the disaster. This is also the site that usually serves as a focal point for coordinating all other disaster relief services, such as Red Cross, Salvation Army, etc.

At this point in time, the Rio Abajo community does NOT have a site for a POD or Disaster Command Center. If a train derails with toxic waste that affects everyone, we will have to run to Socorro for medical attention, and good luck with any other needs.

Efforts are being made to establish a POD and Command Center site in northern Socorro County (presumably at the La Promesa School or Senior Center), and to begin work in coordinating and training community volunteers in disaster relief.

Although we hope and pray we never have a disaster, it would be in all of our best interests to be prepared!



Fruit Eating Secrets

We all think eating fruit means cutting it and just popping it into our mouths, but it's not that easy. Did you know there's a correct way of eating fruit? It means not eating fruits after your meals! Fruits should be eaten on an empty stomach.

If you eat fruit like that, it will play a major role in detoxifying your system, and supply you with a great deal of energy for weight loss and other life activities.

If you eat two slices of bread and then a slice of fruit, the fruit is ready to go straight through the stomach into the intestines, but it is prevented from doing so. The minute the fruit comes into contact with the food in the stomach and digestive juices, the entire mass of food begins to rot, ferment, and turns to acid. So please eat your fruits on an empty stomach or before your meals!

Some people complain: "every time I eat watermelon, I burp, "when I eat a banana I feel like running to the toilet," etc. This won't happen if you eat fruit on an empty stomach. The fruit mixes with putrefying food and produces gas and, hence, you will bloat!



All fruits become alkaline in our body, even oranges and lemons. Graying hair, balding, nervous outbursts, and dark circles under the eyes will <u>not</u> happen if you eat fruit on an empty stomach. If you master this, you have the Secret of beauty, longevity, health, energy, happiness and normal weight.

Eating a whole fruit is better than drinking the juice. When you need to drink fruit juice – drink only fresh juice, NOT from the cans. Don't even drink juice that has been heated up. Cooking destroys all the fruit's vitamins.

If you do drink juice, drink it mouthful by mouthful slowly, and let it mix with your saliva before swallowing. You can go on a 3-day fruit fast to cleanse your body. Just eat fruits and drink fruit juice for three days and you will be surprised when your friends tell you how radiant you look!

KIWI: Tiny but mighty. This is a good source of potassium, magnesium, vitamin E



& fiber. Its vitamin C content is twice that of an orange.

APPLE: An apple has a low vitamin C content, but has antioxidants & flavonoids which enhances the activity of vitamin C thereby helping to lower the risks of colon cancer, heart attack & stroke.

STRAWBERRY have the highest total antioxidant power among



major fruits & protect the body from cancercausing, blood vesselclogging free radicals.

ORANGE: Sweetest medicine. Eating 2-4 oranges a day may help keep colds away, lower cholesterol, prevent & dissolve kidney stones as well as lessens the risk of colon cancer.

WATERMELON: Composed of 92% water, it also helps boost our immune system and has a key source of lycopene – the cancer fighting oxidant.
Watermelon also provides vitamin C &

GUAVA & PAPAYA are the clear winners for their high vitamin C content. Guava is also rich in fiber, which helps prevent

constipation. Papaya is rich in carotene; this is good for your eyes.

Drinking Cold water after a meal = Cancer! It may be nice to have a cold drink after eating, but cold water solidifies the oily stuff that you have eaten and slows down the digestion. Once this 'sludge' is in your stomach, it will break down and be absorbed faster than solid food and line the intestine. Very soon, this turns into fats and leads to cancer. It's best to drink hot soup, warm water or a warm beer after a meal.


Coining mystery solved!
