Professional golfer and Richmond native stresses character

Bo Van Pelt, a Richmond native currently on the Professional Golf Association (PGA) Tour, spent some time with Centerville-Abington Elementary School students on October 18 to promote character education.

Mr. Van Pelt helped initiate and promote the use of The First Tee program in Wayne County. The school program promotes the nine core values of respect, courtesy, responsibility, honesty, sportsmanship, confidence, judgment, perseverance and integrity. Physical education teachers across the county have been invited to teach The First Tee program in their classes.

Physical education teacher Julia Charlton is in her third year of teaching this program to Centerville students in grades 3-6.



"I had to take an online course first, and then we were able to get the equipment donated through the efforts of efforts of Vicki DeMao," said Ms. Charlton, adding that the First Tee program consists of two parts: the nine core values and golf skills. "We as a school teach those values all year long, so I just incorporated the golf skills into my curriculum since it is a Life-Time Sport." This part of the curriculum usually takes two to three weeks.

Centerville Elementary School donated \$250 to the First Tee Program and another donor donated \$50. Warm Glow donated a basket with items from Warm Glow, Silver Town, and Centerville Elementary School.

Art on display



Rose Hamilton students displayed their art work at a special exhibit held in the gym during parent-teacher conferences on October 15, 16 and 17.

Emphasis has been placed on a study of color, and students have become familiar with primary and secondary colors, warm and cool colors, and neutral colors. Kindergartners have worked on coloring patterns on grids and decorating letters of their name, solid-color abstract designs, and using scissors for cutting curved lines. Collages using overlapping, rounded shapes in cool colors were also a part of the exhibit.

Ms. Brooks said first graders were very successful with a line study. Using broken crayons so that they could also draw wide lines by using them sideways, they impressed the second graders with their straight, wavy, zig-zag, jagged, dashed, dotted, and curved thick and thin lines. They also used warm-

colored paper "tiles" to form a mosaic and discussed mosaics that they have seen in our community, including the ice cream cone at Dairy Queen.

Paper craft was the first project in the second grade. Students were asked to follow specific rules for cutting and arranging pieces of black paper on a brown background. Their second "black on brown" project was more challenging, and some students completed a third one. Then they began working on face collages, following the examples by Paul Klee, which they studied in their art text.

The Bulldog Connection

Junior high students are using the new Bulldog Connection computer lab to do remediation work, take makeup exams, work on current or missed homework, and more.

The lab, up and running since mid-August, is supervised by Laurie Shadle, a licensed teacher.

"I think it is going pretty well," she said, adding that it is a new process and she is still working out the details.

Some students are using remediation software in the lab called Study Island, the same software that has been used by our elementary schools, which helps with consistency of instruction and preparation for future ISTEP tests. These students usually come down every other day during an SRT period. The goal is for each student to complete two sessions of Study Island each time they come. These sessions include ten questions covering a particular topic and


