

RESEARCH IN THE NEWS

Specific Gene May Preserve Hearing

Hearing loss is a serious public health issue. Nearly one-third of all 64-year-old adults have significant agerelated hearing loss and that number almost doubles to 64% after the age of 85. In relation, noise-induced hearing loss is one of the most common self-reported occupational injuries.

Researchers from Harvard Medical School have investigated age-related hearing loss and noise-induced hearing loss, which are the two most common types of hearing loss. Through their research, they have gained insight into the protective mechanisms of hearing loss.

The researchers investigated whether over expression of the ISL1-gene in the inner ear of mice could be effective in protecting the inner ear. The results showed that the gene protects the hair cells of the inner ear from degeneration during ageing and that it promotes hair cell survival after exposure to loud noises. This means that the hearing of the ageing mice or in the mice exposed to intense noise was significantly better than in mice without the expressed gene.

With the findings of the study, researchers hope to extend the results to humans and thus in the future to protect human hearing from age-related hearing loss and noise-induced hearing loss.

Hearing connections

In the study of the ISL1-gene, the researchers also discovered that the gene preserved the connections between the hair cells and the neurons in the inner ear.

Such a connection is necessary for hearing and it is the preservation of these connections that promotes hair cell survival, which may then minimize the hearing impairment that normally occurs with ageing and/or overexposure to noise.

About the study

The study was carried out by Dr. Zheng-Yi Chen, Dr. Mingqian Huang and a group of researchers from Massachusetts Eye and Ear and Harvard Medical School. The research and its results were published in the "Journal of Neuroscience".

Chickens Possess Ability To Restore Hearing

A study shows how chickens possess the ability to regenerate damaged hair cells after experiencing hearing loss. This is a not uncommon feat among animals, except in mammals – like humans.

A surprise

A research project, called The Hearing Restoration Project conducted by Hearing Health Foundation in the U.S., tested hearing loss among chickens. For 10 days, the researchers exposed laboratory chickens to a common antibiotic known to cause hearing loss.

On day 11, many of the chickens' hair cells had been lost and even more followed in the days thereafter. Surprisingly, three weeks later, when the researchers examined the chickens again, nearly all of the hair cells had been restored.

The secret behind the restoration of the chickens' hearing lies in the ability of the supporting cells found in the inner ear, which can replace hair cells damaged by load noises or other causes. The goal of the research is to translate this ability to humans.

Early success with mice

Even though mammals don't possess this feat, preliminary research with mice (conducted by the same research team) shows how it can be simulated to regenerate hair cells and partially restore hearing. This was done by using a drug that blocks the auditory pathway that prevents the restoration of hair cells in mammals. Once

blocked, supporting cells in the cochlea were able to grow back.

While much work remains, the preliminary research shows a proof of concept on how the regeneration of hair cells can occur in mammals.

Researchers hope to use this information to develop a cure for some types of hearing losses in the future.
