For over 30 years, The Doe Fund has provided paid work opportunities, career training, housing, and supportive services to over 28,000 homeless and formerly incarcerated individuals in New York City.

Our *Ready, Willing & Able* program is proven to reduce recidivism by 62%, improve public safety and quality of life in city neighborhoods, and foster permanent economic independence for people caught in cycles of homelessness, poverty, addiction, and incarceration.

The Doe Fund owns and operates over 800 units of supportive and low income housing, with over 240 more in development.




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The Work Works Model: A Holistic Solution

- Work Works invests in human capital. The model provides:
 - Paid work in social enterprise such as street cleaning, pest control, and culinary arts
 - Transitional housing
 - Supportive services such as case management, career training, addiction recovery and adult



A HOLISTIC MODEL



Steps of the Work Works Model



Commit to Change (Month 1)

Work Works participants receive paid work (\$15/hr) in the program. Trainees receive 1-on-1 support from case managers to establish long-term education and occupational goals.



Reenter the Community (Months 2-4)

Trainees join the Community Improvement Project, performing paid cleaning services (in *Ready*, *Willing & Able*, across 115 miles of NYC streets daily). At night, they receive computer and education training to prepare for the modern workplace.



Build a Career (Months 5-8)

Trainees transition out of street cleaning to focus on full-time, paid occupational training. Workforce Development courses offer multiple career tracks, each with their own certifications and professional licenses.



Secure Independence (Months 9-12)

Trainees work with housing placement specialists and career coaches, who assist with creating resumes, searching for jobs, and preparing for interviews. **Each** trainee secures full-time employment and permanent housing before graduation.

Where Work Works


The Problem

- Homelessness is at an all-time high: Over 560,000 Americans experience homelessness on any given night.
- Lack of housing opportunity: 75% of people experiencing homelessness are ineligible for supportive housing vouchers.
- Racial injustice: Black Americans make up 40% of the homeless population and nearly 40% of the prison population.
- **Drug epidemic:** Drug overdose deaths increased by 30% to 93,000 in 2020
- Economic exclusion: Lack of opportunity after prison leads to a loss of 1.7-1.9 million workers and \$78-\$87 billion in GDP yearly.



The Opportunity

- America is recovering and rebuilding post-pandemic.
- Congress is considering major investments in infrastructure and job creation. We must also invest in human capital.
- Cities and states are investing in creative housing solutions.
- Our country is seeking inclusive solutions to tackle addiction and inequality

Work Works: Outcomes

 Model programs in seven unique communities

Over 28,000 served in NYC

 In NYC, graduates' recidivism rates are reduced by 62%

• In Colorado, 72% of trainees graduate to mainstream employment and housing

 In Georgia, 70% of trainees graduate; 80% of graduates retain their original jobs and housing
