I hope you all had a beautiful Christmas and a Happy New Year!

Now that the holidays are over, many charitable organizations are facing their most difficult time of year. It is common for them to get large numbers of donations at the end of year, but the first few months following that outpouring are often very dry in terms of both monetary and in-kind donations, requiring them to fall back on money or items they have been able to save up. That makes this the perfect time of year to plan a donation drive!

Donation Drive Do's and Don'ts

DO choose a focus that resonates with you and your group and choose a charitable organization accordingly. I would recommend praying about this! If you want to focus on a particular kind of item (your group loves making handmade cards and would like to donate some), make sure that you're planning to donate them to a group that can use them, rather than assuming that any charity you donate them to will know what to do with them (check out Cards for Kindness at https://www.creativekindness.org/cfk-instructions if that specific idea really resonates with you). Conversely, if you feel led to donate to a specific group, check with them in advance to see what they actually need and use their needs list to guide your giving. DO advertise your donation drive! Check with the organization you are gathering donations for to see if they have marketing materials you can use. If not, you can easily create your own using a free tool – I like Canva (https://www.canva.com/, also available as an app in the App Store or Play Store). Consider creating a flyer that includes information such as a brief description of the organization's mission, what kinds of items you're collecting, where items can be dropped off, and a QR code or website for people who prefer to donate money. And don't be afraid to go big! Call up your local newspaper or radio station to cover the event, post it on your group's social media pages, get it in your parish bulletin - whatever it takes to get the word out! DON'T pass along just anything. If you get items donated that the organization you're collecting for can't use, either because the items are used and at the end of their functional life or because they don't fit with the normal operations of the organization, have a plan to get rid of them another way (recycling them, donating them to another organization that can use them, or in as a last resort, throwing them out).

DON'T try to do it all on your own. Form a team to help with planning, advertising, and collecting and delivering donations. Your team might include members of your council, others in your parish, family members, or even volunteers or staff at the organization you are collecting donations for. Many hands make light work!

In addition to being a real boon for the receiving institutions, donation drives are a great way to build community, because vividly demonstrate how working together can create a huge positive impact in the world. Please let me know if you decide to organize a drive of your own, so that we can participate as well!
