2 BOOKS... 2 PARTIES... 75 YEARS!


It will be an eventful fall for the 75-year-old Norwell Historical Society.

On **Thursday, October 28**th, the Society will hold its **75**th **Annual Meeting** at the site of its first Annual Meeting: The James Library in Norwell Center. Along with the usual annual update by the secretary and the treasurer's report, there will be speakers and a celebratory birthday cake!

With the surge of interest in farming now that the Jacobs fields are being worked, the Society will feature speakers on the history of farming in Norwell, the role of the Jacobs farm in that history, and the current state of industry in our town. In 1850 (at the time of our "Big Split" from Scituate) farmers outnumbered shoemakers 147 to 129. How has earning a living changed since then? And what does the future of Norwell industry look like? Speakers on this subject will include Jennifer Freidrick, the principal farmer at the Jacobs Farmhouse Community Supported Agriculture Project, Cliff Prentiss, long-time member of the Conservation Commission and amateur farmer, and Rick Merritt, current Chair of the Norwell Board of Selectmen.

On **Friday, November 12**th, the Society will sponsor a **Book Release Party** at the Cushing Center in Norwell Center. This event will feature Gertrude Daneau, author of *The ABCs of Norwell* and Samuel Olson, author of *A Narrative of South Scituate-Norwell (1849-1963): Remembering its Past and the World Around It.*

Gert's book will break down the history of our town into 26 easy-toremember topics (A to Z). With Betty Butterfly leading the way, we learn about Norwell's Almshouse (A), the Half Way House (H), the Litchfield Shoe Factory (L), and many prominent citizens. What was Ridge Hill





Grove (R)? Where was the Valley Swamp (V)? These questions and more will be answered in this easy-to-read paperback that can be used as a coloring book, as a text for teaching budding historians, or as a

quick guide to Norwell's many famous personalities and historical features.

Sam's book chronicles the life and times of our town through a collection of articles previously published in *The Norwell Mariner*. As the shipbuilding industry on the river waned, farmers, shoe makers and summer residents

revealed their rugged individualism and their socially-progressive beliefs. Discover how the Norwell we know today was knowingly sculpted by the town's forefathers. By rejecting new-fangled ideas such as the railroad and other "big city"

ways, Norwell has retained its solitude and rural landscape. This book is a beautiful coffee table book, but also a useful tool for learning more about our town's rich history.

Dr. Chase's Recipes

In the 1860s with Medicine Shows and general medical quackery, the prices of curative recipes as they were called were very expensive. People were willing to pay anything for a cure. A man named Dr. Chase felt this was wrong, so he traveled the country collecting recipes and other information he felt would be helpful until he had enough material for a book. The good doctor thought that in this way the information would be readily available and much less expensive for the average family.

The cost of his book was \$1.00 with a paper cover and \$2.00 with a Morocco Gilt cover. The book was a wonderful success: first published in 1867, it was in its tenth printing in 1870. The working title was Dr. Chase's Recipes. On the title page, however, the full title was: Dr. Chase's Recipes or Information For Everybody: An Invaluable Collection of About Eight Hundred PRACTICAL RECIPES for Merchants, Grocers, Saloon Keepers, Physicians, Druggists, Tanners, Shoemakers, Harness Makers, Painters, Jewelers, Blacksmiths, Tinners, Gunsmiths, Farriers, Barbers, Bakers, Renovaters, Farmers, and Families Generally, To which has been Added a Rational Treatment for Pleurisy, Inflammation of the Lungs and Other Inflammatory Diseases and also for General Female Debility and Irregularities, All Arranged in Their Appropriate Departments.

Since Halloween is fast approaching and it is the time of ghosts and goblins when witches boil up potions with eye of newt and toe of frog, here are two examples of Dr. Chase's Recipes. In keeping with the season, both have to do with toads.

Spavin

(This is an American Indian cure for a horse complaint called Spavin, which appears to be a calcification of the leg.)

Bind a toad Upon it; or two, if one does not cover it, and keep on for 8 to 10 days.

Dr. Chase's comment: "An Indian cured a horse in this way, near St. Louis. This cure proved to be permanent." My comment: I'm not sure if a horse would agree to have a toad tied to its leg for 8-10 days!


Toad Ointment

(For sprains, strains, lame back, rheumatism, etc.)

Good size live toads, 4 in number; put in boiling water and cook very soft; take them out and boil the water down to ½ pint, and add fresh churned unsalted butter 1 pound and simmer together; at the last add tincture of arnica 2 ounces.

Dr. Chase's comment: This was obtained from an old Physician who thought more of it than any other prescription in his possession. Some persons may think it hard on the toads but you could not kill them quicker in any other way. *My comment: we do it to lobsters!*

Remember the butter must be newly churned and unsalted. Happy Halloween!



Did You Know?

...the answer to the last issue's Trivia Corner Question? The question was: One of the oldest graveyards in Norwell was established in 1644 at the site of the Second Parish Church meetinghouse. The cemetery was heavily vandalized in the early 1800s. No gravestones remain today, but a large boulder marks its locale. Where in Norwell is this burying ground?

The answer is: On the corner of Main Street and Old Meetinghouse Lane. No sign of this grave-yard remians today except for a boulder on the edge of Main Street commemorating the site of the Second Church in 1642. Gravestones that were found on the site include one for Thomas King, who died in 1691, and another for Cornelius Briggs, who died in 1694.


