VENTURING CREW

Venturing crew keeps the heat on

Summer is winding down, but it saw Venturing Crew 1785 of St. Paul's continuing to lead the adventure

In June, we learned about kayaking at Wicomico Shores before the crew kicked off the summer with a campout aboard NAS Patuxent River for an aquatics-themed campout. We kayaked, fished and crabbed in Goose Creek and went swimming in the base pool. Additionally, we got a tour of the highest point in Southern Maryland, the base's airport control tower, and played some basketball and Ping-Pong in the Drill Hall.

Summer camp was our big activity in July. The crew participated in the Ranger Experience at Camp Marriott at the Goshen Scout Reservation in western Virginia for a week over the 4th of July. While there, our Venturers engaged in a variety of activities that fulfilled requirements for their Ranger award including: First aid & CPR, wilderness survival, .22 rifle shooting, more kayaking, a COPE (challenging outdoor personal experience) course, backpacking, climbing & rappelling, land navigation and ecology. Additionally, the crew jointly prepared all its own meals (breakfast, lunch & dinner daily) and cooled off on a couple trips to a nice swimming hole in the nearby Maury River. We attended an evening Protestant church service led by a visiting chaplain from the Virginia Military Institute and had a curious black bear visit our campsite.

Finally, the crew enjoyed watching 4th of July fireworks over Lake Merriweather and celebrated its first birthday with a chocolate frosted cake that we baked over coals in a Dutch oven and also completed service projects establishing a bottle and can recycling program at Camp Marriott, screen window repairs, picking up trash along a trail and cleaning a drinking water fountain. The crew was recognized at the camp's closing ceremony as Camp Marriott's Unit of the Week.

We concluded our summer activities with a campout in late August at Prince William Forest National Park in Quantico, VA. The weather was spectacular and in between running through the woods with a map and compass on a couple of their permanent orienteering courses in the morning and evening, we visited the National Museum of the Marine Corps in nearby Triangle. If you have not visited it yet, it is an outstanding museum. The immersive exhibits and artifacts on display chronicle the history of the US Marine Corps from its founding through Vietnam. New exhibits covering its history since Vietnam will open later this year.

A View from the Pew Some thoughts on sharing the Good News---"Do you have the courage?"

In 2015, I offered a portion of this article regarding our missionary friend and his ministry to Muslims. Over the years Marlen's (named after Carl Marx & Lennon) has followed God's directives to many parts of the world. Marlens' zeal for sharing Christ's salvation to his Muslim brothers and sisters has never diminished. Please refresh your memory of his story and my perceived failures.

Some time ago June and I received an email (titled "Let my people go") from our missionary friend Marlen Zharmenov. Marlen and his family (formally Muslims) live in Amity Kazakhstan where he proclaims the good news of Jesus Christ to his Muslim neighbors. I have related stories to some as how this godly man received Salvation and was enabled to proclaim the truth of the gospel (without being killed) to his Muslim neighbors. I know that God will do great things through His servant. June and I have been blessed by his visits; once with his wife and four daughters and at each parting, I cried. They were tears of joy and thanksgiving and then later tears of my failings in proclaiming God's word to the unsaved. Why can't I be like Marlen?

What keeps us from telling others about Christ? We openly proclaim Him each Sunday in worship together, but alas the week begins and then the cares of my world begins to flood my thoughts. I like to verbally proclaim Dr. Halverson's (former Senate Chaplin) prayer "You go nowhere by accident", but does my daily walk with Christ demonstrate this proclamation? Please remember God has something He wants to do thru us where we are each day. I guess I want my "witnessing" to be like Phillip as he preached to the man of Ethiopia in Acts 8:35 "Then Phillip opened his mouth and beginning at this Scripture, (Acts 8:32) preached Jesus to him." The eunuch believed and was baptized. Read the full account in Acts 8:26-40. My brothers and sisters in Christ, we may never witness instant conversions, but it would be wonderful if we
