Beloved Partners in Ministry,



April 1st marks the beginning of the liturgical season of Easter which lasts for the 50 days from our celebration of the Resurrection to Pentecost Sunday. While stores immediately put their Easter candy and decorations on clearance on April 2nd, in the church we are just beginning to celebrate Jesus' resurrection and what it means to us as Christians.

During Easter our texts for worship include the disciples and the early church's reactions to the resurrection event and their new life as a community of believers left to carry on the kingdom work that Jesus started. We move from the risen Jesus visiting Thomas and the other disciples who are hiding in a locked room, to other appearances of Jesus before he ascends into heaven.

What we celebrate this time of year is the dramatic actions of God whose kingdom is radically different from the way in which this world works. Our denomination's "Companion to the Book of Common Worship" says this about our resurrection faith:

Resurrection shouts "no" to everything in our world that works against God's will, and "yes" to God's victory. What Christ accomplished on Easter is a glorious revelation of the future, for resurrection implies a totally new world order. "We will be changed," writes Paul. "So if anyone is in Christ, there is a new creation: everything old has passed away; see everything has become new!"

God reversed the judgement on us by raising Christ from the dead. Ephesians tells of Christ breaking down the walls that separate us from each other and from God, to make us one people. Out of a divided humanity, Christ formed a new humanity that transcends differences in race, religion, nationality, politics, and economic class. Christ's resurrection not only absolved humanity from sin; it established a new reality.¹

This new reality was a new way of life for the early church, which lived together in close knit communities, sharing their resources and spending time in prayer and worship with one another. As we continually attempt to align our lives and our community of faith with God's will we will progress toward the kingdom that Jesus ushered in and preached while among the disciples. That radically different kingdom of peace, unity, and a shared sense of God's love for all of creation should always be the focal point of our lives. Let us continue to model the early church as we pray and praise God together, working closely to bring about a unified kingdom where all are welcome and accepted. Happy Easter!

THE SCOOP ON SHINGLES

Should you get vaccinated? Yes, if you are 60 or older, with some exceptions, such as if you have a weakened immune system from HIV or certain cancers. Immunization is safe and it's highly effective.

Know the warning signs: Unexplained jolts of pain or itching in a band on one side of the torso or above the eye are classic warning signs of shingles. These can occur days or a week before he rash.

See your doctor as soon as possible. When you think you have shingles it's a medical emergency!

What is the treatment? While there is no cure, getting antiviral medication early can help reduce the severity of shingles and the damage it causes. Talk to your doctor about ointments to ease the itch and pain. Keep the area clean to avoid infection.

Can you spread shingles? No. while the blistering sores from shingles can spread chicken pox, you catch shingles from yourself.

What harm can shingles do? Shingles is a really disabling disease. It can leave you with terrible pain for months or even years afterward.
