• First Jesus states that they are ignorant of the ____ and of the ___ of God. He then gives an answer based on these two principles. First, Jesus made clear the proposition

that the Old Testament plainly taught the life after death and that the Sadducees had been so enamored of their pagan philosophy and skeptical conclusions that they had neglected to study the revelation that God had given. <u>Furthermore</u>, they did not know the power of God; they supposed that God would be compelled to continue in Heaven the relations of earth and did not take into account that God would be able to make Heaven more blessed than earth.

■ After answering the puzzle about the seven husbands and one wife Jesus offered just one passage from the Old Testament to prove that it teaches the future life. And what an extraordinary passage. He does not quote Daniel, Isaiah, or the Psalms; He quotes from the words of God to Moses, recorded in Exodus 3:6. His argument is this: Abraham has been dead many years, also Isaac and Jacob; but God does not say to Moses, "I was the God of Abraham" but, "I am the God of Abraham;" he is alive now, for a dead person who is no longer in existence can have had a Creator, but he cannot have a God

<u>NOTE</u>: The only key to this enigma is the two-folded nature of the Messiah - a "son" or descendant of David and also "Lord" or sovereign of God. This doctrine had been lost among the Jews and so the confusion. They understood the first concept, but failed to grasp the latter.

SUMMARY: In these questions was the hope that Jesus' credibility would be damaged or destroyed. But to the contrary, Jesus' credibility was enhanced and the Jew's plot failed. He spoke as One with authority.
