Classical Chinese:

- Often character have rich, complex meanings, with any number of English translations being reasonable translation, none of which capture the entirety of the meaning
 - o Have to look at multiple English translations
 - o Context sentence, text, author, field, era
- Dictionary definitions come from research of textual use, e.g., how they were used in actual writings
 - Actual meanings may vary:
 - within medical context
 - author
 - era
 - style of medicine
