



Bill's Brewster

Our 1934 Brewster was made for Lily Pons, Metropolitan Opera, main Soprano for over 20 years. Her husband was Andre Kostelanetz. Brewster was a carriage maker for the very wealthy since the early 1800s. The grand families had their own color scheme that could not be used for anyone else. We have a Brewster buggy made in 1828 for the Vanderbilt family with a maroon body color with muted orange pinstriping. It was restored by an Amish buggy restorer to its original condition (See picture)

In the 1900s Brewster began making bodies for very high end manufacturers like Rolls Royce and others. A frame, engine, and driveline would be made by a manufacturer, like Rolls Royce, and a Brewster body would be made on that chassis. These were named as Rolls-Royce Brewster.

In 1934-1935 Brewster began making their own cars. Like ours. This was the Depression and many high end car manufacturers were going under. So they built our car on a 1934 Commercial Ford chassis that was extended by 15". Ford flathead 95hp engine was the powerplant. The car sold for \$3500 that was less than 1/3rd price as the major high end manufacturers.



Several features are the basketweave on the rear and sides. This was done, by hand, with a tiny cake decorator nozzle in raised patterns. The stunning heart-shaped grill was designed by Inskip who made very high end fountain pens. I gave this car to my wife, Anne as a Valentine day present.

Our car was featured in many high end collections and museums, and won 2nd place at the 1998 Pebble Beach Concourse, that finally was purchased by S. Truett Cathy, founder of Chick-Fil-A. Five years ago after negotiating with the Estate of Truett Cathy for six years they decided to sell it to me.

Bill & Anne have an extensive collection of Antique & Classic Cars. Make sure to check them out at the area shows. They are normally at the Stone Mountain Village Cruise-Ins, or cruising around Stone Mountain Park.

Steve & Karen O'Neal's '69 AMX (if it's running, it's hers)

As many of you know I am retired. I sold our Black AMX for funds and started the process of bringing our Red AMX back to life. This starts with a nice looking rolling chassis from a previous body shop failure.

Body: Went in for a paint job, since it had 3 paint layers it had to be stripped and this was found - WTF jackleg would put 4" of bondo to cover all this up! I guess one can't push a shop with this much repair, 1 year & 9 months later...







Hit pretty hard on pass side quarter, rust on drivers side quarter and front and rear glass channel corners, inner structure cracking and bad dent repair on hood. Lower quarters replaced, upper sail panel custom bent and replaced, hood structure cut out, repaired, now that they could get to it the skin was beat back out and everything welded back up. Skim coat - NO BONDO type stuff used. Got it back, pretty amazing and the back end doesn't droop with all that bondo gone.



Engine: This was built 7+ years ago and dyno'd at 325 hp and 525#' torque all under 4500 rpm. Now it needs to be checked and re-done for fuel injection, AC, larger alternator and the new PS pump. This picture shows much of it but top end and accessory pulley alignment is not finished yet. It is sitting on the new suspension cross member and will be installed complete by lowering the body onto it.

Suspension: All new Control Freak tublar front suspension with power rack w/2 way adjustable coil over shocks and Wilwood big brakes. Front will be going in with the motor shortly. Rear will be 4 link.

Wiring: With all the electronics it will have new complete wiring system with some custom COmponents I still have to plan out as they just don't make what is needed. *Project completion date unknown but I'm working on it!* Cool 😍 TIMES

Studebakers on Mackinac Island...

In June 2019 my wife Rochelle and I took a two and a half week vacation which included a 10 day cruise of the Great Lakes. The cruise started in Chicago and ended in Toronto. Included on the cruise itinerary was a day on Mackinac Island, Michigan. Just before we left Atlanta a friend from the local Pontiac club contacted me to be sure I was aware that on Mackinac Island there was a carriage museum which had a Studebaker wagon in it.

My friend is very familiar with Mackinac Island since he and his wife were married there many years ago. In addition, they have celebrated most of their wedding anniversaries by going back there.

I knew Mackinac Island was noted for the fact that it has no motorized vehicles. However, had my friend not alerted me to the Studebaker vehicle there, we would have missed it completely since that museum was not on our Mackinac Island tour.

When we got to the island, I asked our tour guide if she knew where the museum was. She did and told me where on the tour we would be closest to it and that if I hurried, I could get to the museum and back to the tour group. So that's exactly what I did. I only had a few minutes but I did snap a few pictures.

When I got to the museum, I was delighted to find there was not one, but three, Studebaker vehicles there. In addition to getting pictures of the vehicles I also took pictures of the descriptive plaques and some of the Studebaker automobilia they had on the walls. One vehicle was a "Rumble Seat Trap". I had heard some types of horse drawn carriages referred to as "traps" but never knew why, until I read the informative sign. In order for passengers to get into their seats the driver had to lift his seat up and allow the passengers to enter the carriage. At that point, the driver would put his seat back down. The passengers then found themselves "trapped "until he moved the seat up again to allow them to exit.

Another of the Studebaker vehicles was a Victoria Carriage, noted for its low step and wide entrance. The third vehicle was a Two-Seated Pony Runabout.

As an aside, as I mentioned earlier, I knew that Mackinac Island was known for having no motorized vehicles. It really was different being in a place where all transportation was non-motorized. However, I did wonder if there were absolutely no motorized vehicles. I asked some questions on the topic and it turns out they do have two or three motorized police vehicles. In addition, as they talked about how much snow they get every winter that has to be plowed off the roads and streets I said, "... And all those plows are pulled by horses?" The answer was "no" since they actually do have mo-

torized snow plows.

Knowing that there were a few motorized vehicles lurking around, in no way diminished our enjoyment of this unique island.

And to think, I would have missed these two Studebaker vehicles if it hadn't been for a friend from the Pontiac club!
