NEEDED * * GOOD LISTENERS!

Is the art of being a good listener slipping fastly from our "hurry-scurry" "push-button" generation? The world is so full of so many sounds, so many voices, all amplified it seems to catch our attention; televisions, radios, tape players of all descriptions, all with loud speakers with volume turned up demanding that we hear them. But I wonder, have we in all the confusion of noises and sounds become so adept at "tuning out" what we don't want to hear that we have also tuned out so many things that we should have given our full attention to.

Our youth are rebeling, turning to drugs, immorality, and what have you with the cry, "no one listens to me or has time for me". The main underlying complaint from the divorce courts of our day is "no communication - they quit listening to each other". The minister from behind the pulpit prays continually that "the people will hear as for time and eternity". The heart of the parent is daily concerned that their child will listen and heed the good advice of those who love him and have his welfare at heart. We all want to be heard. Who among us have not felt the uncomfortable feeling of trying to express ourselves to someone who although they were looking us straight in the eye and nodding now and then -- were really not listening to us at all. I am fully aware of the times that my children and my husband have tuned me out; but in all fairness I am more concerned at the present with the times that I have tuned them out, maybe at a moment when they needed me the most. Oh, it wasn't intentional, I was just so preoccupied with my tasks and the important things I had to do at the time and I thought I could listen to them later when I wasn't so busy - but those times are seldom recaptured, and I found that when I could find time they were too involved in other things. The opportunity to listen and really hear on that matter was gone. How often do we go to the House of God with our minds so cluttered with the cares of life that we're unable to recall any of God's word that was delivered to us and we fail to take home any spiritual food for our souls, which was really the primary purpose of our attending the worship service.

What a ministry there is waiting for the one who has time to listen, for there are burdened souls all around us needing desperately to be heard. In our years of pastoring churches I have watched with amazement at my husband's success in ministering to the sick and troubled as he visits with people in their homes, the hospitals, on their jobs or wherever he may find opportunity to be with people. Oh, he doesn't have the answer to all their problems but he knows One who does. He makes them feel that he cares and helps them to understand that most of all God cares. He listens, he hears. God listens! God hears! The world is a wide open field to the one who really hears. Several places in the four Gospels Jesus said, "He that hath ears to hear, let him hear." Luke 8: 8 and others.

First of all our ears should be opened to the Word of God and to His Spirit and then to the cry of humanity all around us. It all goes back to the little thought we teach our children in children's church, "God first, Others second, and me last". Someone has said joy is

BUS

I would like to give you a little information about the Apostolic Faith Bible College Bus. The board of the school along with five men from our movement, met in Oklahoma City, September 29, 1972, and decided to purchase a bus to furnish transportation for the college choir and any other movement functions. Since that time we have logged nearly 25,000 miles of service for our movement. It is scheduled for several trips this summer and has certainly been a blessing to our school.

We purchased the bus for \$13,000 of which we borrowed \$12,000. As of May 15, we have paid \$6,500 of the original cost and with interest figured we now owe \$6,881.23. There is no specific amount that must be paid each month, but we are certainly wanting to retire this note as soon as possible. If you have been blessed by the Bible College Choir or the Vibrations or in any other field in which the bus has served, and would like to help pay for it, we would be most happy.

May God bless you who have helped in this field of spreading the Gospel.

PRINCIPLES OF CHILD DISCIPLINE

A common defect in those who are first learning to drive an automobile is that they tend to oversteer. The car starts over to the left side of the road and the learner corrects its path by turning the wheel to the right, but too much. Then as the car heads for the right curb the new driver gets scared and pulls the wheel to the left, but again, too much.

Thus it is with many parents in disciplining their children. They are alternately too soft and too severe. The results that the child becomes confused, discouraged and sometimes even enraged because he has no consistent standard to go by.

The Apostle Paul admonishes us twice in his writings not to provoke our children to wrath (Eph. 6:4; Col. 3:21). This indicates that he had observed an abuse of discipline and there is nothing that will anger or discourage a child more than unfair and inconsistent discipline.

There are two aspects of discipline, the negative and

the positive. Negative discipline says "No". It makes prohibitions and prescribes and executes punishments. Positive discipline directs the activities of the child in a constructive and educational way. It requires an intelligent study of the character, interests, abilities and needs of each child and is, therefore, the more difficult.

Many parents err in the use of negative discipline and make little or no effort toward positive discipline. Both are as necessary as are the positive and negtaive poles to an electric circuit. In this article we are considering the negative aspect.

My wife and I have hammered out the following rules in the forge of rearing children. We trust that they will be helpful to others.

Parents Must Be Agreed

This is a prime requirement for good discipline in the home. If there is a difference of opinion between the father and the mother they need to work it out privately and come to an agreement. Before the children they must present a united front. Here perhaps more than anywhere else in life "united we stand, divided we fall."

Bobby asks his mother if he can go out and play ball. Mother says, "No, you haven't cleaned up your room yet today." Then Bobby runs to his father as he comes home from the office, "Daddy, can I go out and play with the boys?" Daddy says, "Yes." Then mother sees Bobby out playing and calls, "Bobby, you come here this minute! What are you doing out there? Didn't I—?"

"But Daddy said I could."

We parents have all been tricked into this sort of situation. Children soon learn to play one parent against the other.

Now who was in the wrong? Obviously Bobby was. But we would also say that both parents were wrong. Why? This is not the first time that Bobby has played one against the other — not if he is big enough to play ball with the boys. He has done it many times before and has gotten away with it.

The father should take Bobby aside and explain to him that when one parent makes a decision he is not to run to the other parent to get his way before the parents have had an opportunity to discuss it. Bobby is big enough to understand. Then the next time Bobby plays one parent against the other a little of the "board of education applied to the seat of learning" will help to drive the lesson home.

Sometimes a third party in the home such as a grandparent will interfere in the discipline of a child. The grandparent ought to know better. But if he does not, it becomes the duty (and a very unpleasant duty it is) of one of the parents to tell the grandparents kindly and respectfully — but firmly, to keep out of such affairs.

In child training, let your "Yea be yea, and your nay, nay," and let both parents always say the same thing.

Attack Lying-Never Deceive Your Children

"The heart is deceitful above all things, and desperately wicked," the Lord tells us in the Book of Jeremiah. Deceitfulness is a part of the old nature that we receive by heredity. It shows itself in children amazingly soon after birth. A child does not have to learn to lie, it is part of his nature.

Lying is not only a word spoken with the intent to deceive, it is any action that is designed to deceive. Some parents allow their children to deceive them. They shut their eyes to little indications of underhandedness. Soon the child becomes an expert at the art of deception. Every evasive answer or excuse should be followed as a detective would follow a clue until the full truth is discovered.

One Christmas I and my two brothers received a little red wagon. At the time we were eight, six and four years old. Two blocks from where we lived a new house was being built. One day we picked up a few bricks and brought them home in our little red wagon. The few bricks that some little boys could carry in their little red wagon were of insignificant value to the contractor. But when Dad came home from work and saw the bricks, he saw something more; he saw the moral value that was very significant.

"Arthur! Harold! Paul! Where did you get those bricks?"

"We found them."

"Where did you find them? Was it down there where they are building that house?"

Suddenly we found something very interesting to look at on the floor. But we had to confess the truth. We were told to take the bricks back.

"But the men might see us taking them back!"

We thought that Dad would forget, but the next day when he came home from work he called me, "Harold, did you take those bricks back?"

"N-no, I-I forgot." (I might have invented a more original excuse.)

We realized that Dad was not going to forget. Thus it was that three small boys like three puppies with their tails between their legs, unloaded some bricks off of their little red wagon behind a brick pile on the corner. We have never forgotten that lesson.

But many parents would have accepted the first evasive answer, "We found them." It would be much less trouble. But NO — attack lying decisively.

How can we teach our chilrren truthfulness if we lie? Did you ever send your child to answer the doorbell and tell him to say that his mother is not at home? Or tell your child that you were going over to the neighbors for a few minutes and that you would be right back, when in reality you were going to town? If so, do not be surprised when he comes up with an evasive answer, a weak excuse or a bold lie. Whatever you sow you will also reap.

Punishment in Proportion to the Offense

We have seen parents who would spank a child severely for breaking a dish, but would laugh to hear a swear word lisped by an infant tongue. To break a dish has no moral implications other than a minor act of carelessness, and usually not even that, it is merely an accident. A patient word of caution and instruction should be sufficient. But obscene speech has serious implications and should be dealt with immediately.

Chastise Decisively

Threats, nagging and little slaps do no good. If the offense is worthy of punishment, make it a punishment that the child will remember and will not want to receive again for a similar offense. Our daughter once grabbed her older brother by the neck and began choking him to force him to give her something she wanted. Her mother gave her a hard spanking which our daughter never forgot. "How cruel" some would say. But it would have been much more cruel to let her continue that little trick until some day in a fit of anger she might have choked her brother to death. This offense demanded decisive punishment, and got it. She never attempted to choke her brother again.

Did this provoke her to wrath? No! She understood very well the justice of the punishment. A child does not resent a fair punishment.

Do Not Punish When You Are Angry

The child understands whether its father or mother punishes him out of anger or whether they discipline him justly for corrective reasons. If it is merely to vent the parent's anger, in Paul's language, it provokes the child to wrath. When the parent is angry, the chastisement is likely to be much more severe than it should be. Therefore, if you are angry, wait until your anger has passed; then call the child and explain the reason for the punishment, and then discipline calmly and deliberately.

Use a Variety of Correctives

There are children whom whipping does not correct. One little boy was promised a whipping if he did something. His answer was, "Then I'll laugh." And he did. But if he is denied his dessert or kept in the house when the other boys are out playing, it cuts him to the quick. Our younger brother, Paul, was passing through the playing-with-fire stage. He would steal matches from the kitchen and build his little fires in the yard with paper and sticks and dry grass. Our parents whipped him repeatedly but to no avail. One day Mother found him building his fire right up against the house.

Finally Dad bought 12 dozen boxes of matches, the kind that had a wodden stick about 2½ inches long. Then he fixed a shield so that the wind would not spread the fire, and set Paul down to the fun of burning matches. At first it was lots of fun—but before long it became a task. Dad went off to work and left Mother in charge. Before long:

"Mama, I have lit enough matches."

"Oh, no, Paul, you just keep on lighting matches."

Soon Mother found him taking three, four, or five matches at a time to strike them.

"No, Paul, you must burn them one at a time, and let them burn clear down to the end."

By nine o'clock Paul was watching the matches burn through his tears. Mama phoned to see if she could stop the match-burning. (Note that both parents were together on this.) Father said for Paul to keep on. By ten o'clock the tears were putting out the fire. Another telephone call, and Dad ordered the burning stopped. Never again did Paul steal matches from the kitchen.

All that is needed is a bit of originality and imagination on the part of the parents to keep ahead of the children.

Correct Any Mistake You May Make

Since we parents are human, we sometimes make mistakes. When you find that you have done the wrong

thing, made an arbitrary decision, punished the wrong child, or lost your temper, go to the child you have wronged and make it right. This is only fair. We should not think that because we are adults we have a right to violate our children's sense of justice and fairness. On the contrary, because their senses are delicate and tender and in their formative years we should take the greater care not to hurt or warp them. And by admitting it when we are wrong we will keep their confidence and respect.

Scrupulously Keep Your Promises

If you promise a child a spanking, spank him. If you promise him an ice cream cone, give it to him.

"Now, Jimmy, if you do that again I am going to spank you!" Jimmy does it again.

"All right Jimmy, I told you I was going to spank you if you did that again. Okay now you know, if you do it again I am going to beat you within an inch of your life."

Jimmy's mother has already lost the battle. Jimmy knows that not the third time nor the tenth time he does it will he get punished. It is all threats and no action. The mother's mistake is in not keeping her word and spanking Jimmy the first time he repeated his offense.

"Now, Johnny, you stay home with your sister and with Ginny, and when we come home we will bring you some candy." So Johnny's parents drove off to the nearby city for a shopping trip.

When Johnny heard the car turn the corner a couple of hours later he ran to the door calling, "Here tomes Mama with my tandy, my tandy!"

His mother saw Johnny and heard his excited and happy expression, "Oh, Daddy, we forgot Johnny's candy. Don't stop the car, go on around the corner to the grocery store and buy Johnny's candy." It was unthinkable to disappoint Johnny. To him the candy represented his parents' word of honor.

John was three then. Now he is grown and married and has a little girl of his own. But he still has a deep respect and love for his parents. Why? That candy, and the same principle which his parents followed throughout the years.

Every child needs direction, correction and instruction, and above all he needs to have the security of a confidence in something bigger than himself. Parents who exercise firm, fair and loving discipline inspire this kind of confidence. By keeping their word, and by establishing and requiring observance to sound rules in the home, parents can provide the stability and source of confidence which is a fundamental need of the mind of the child.

"Children, obey your parents in all things: for this is well pleasing unto the Lord" (Col. 3:20).

"He that spareth his rod hateth his son: but he that loveth him chasteneth him betimes" (Prov. 13:24).

If we apply the rod of correction according to these rules we will do it in a way that will be for the good of our children. With the Holy Spirit's guidance and working in our lives and the lives of our children we will rear children who will be a joy to us not only at the present time but also in the years to come.


