From The Board:

On behalf of the Sugar Mill Board of Directors, we would like to wish each and every one of you a wonderful holiday season. Give each family member and friend a big hug, and reach out to those who have drifted away. It may have been another tough year for many of you in the energy industry and our hearts go out to you. Hop in your cars (and boats) and look at all the gorgeous holiday displays our residents have worked so hard on. They are sure to bring a smile to everyone's faces! We wish you all the very, very best that life has to offer!

Short-Term Rentals — Hom eow ners across the country have discovered they can earn extra money by renting out part or all of their homes to people passing through town (such as for the 2017 Superbow I). However, offering short-term rentals in SugarLand is not allowed. Hosting a short-term rental is a violation of the City's residential zoning districts that could result in a fine up to \$2,000!! Residents who know of a short-term rental within the City are asked to contact the City's Code Enforcement Department at (281) 275-2170.

Shrubs, Trees, or Plants on a comer lot, may never obstruct views for oncoming traffic. Any plantings that are located within 10 feet of where the road begins at an intersection must be groom ed so that they are under 2 feet in height, and/or at least 6 feet above the roadway. In addition, regardless of whether or not your home is located on a comer lot, trees must always be kept trimmed so they are at least 12 feet above the roadway and 8 feet above the sidewalk on all residential streets, per City ordinance.

Do You Have Jars of Change Cluttering Your Closet Floor? Go to www.coinstar.com and search for a nearby Coinstarm achine. The machine will sort and count coins for you, and cashing them in is free if you redeem the money as a gift card from companies such as Amazon, BestBuy, Starbucks, HomeDepot, or Lowe's. Near us, you will find machines at Food town on Eldridge and Walmart on Highway 6.

Bulkhead Numbers: If you live on the lake, it is really useful if you have your house number on your bulkhead. We recommend stickers or paint applied to the lake side face of the bulkhead. It assists Lake Management when they want to help identify the location of a problem in the lake. It is also useful when someone is boating and finds an animal or a loose boat floating in the lake and they want to describe where they found it in a Nextdoor.com alert to everyone.

Be Courteous to Those With Wheelchairs or Strollers. If you are walking along the sidewalk or one of the walking paths behind our subdivision, please be courteous to those with strollers and wheelchairs. Please yield to them and walk on the grass to go around them. It is much more difficult for someone with a stroller or a wheelchair to have to navigate the grass!

Contractor Signs: Just a rem inder that contractor signs are never perm itted within Sugar Mill, even if the contractor is currently doing work on your property. Please advise your contractors not to place signs on your property.

Dual-Family Living -W ith in Sugar M ill, it is also a violation to rent a room or apartment with in your home, garage or attic, regardless of how long the lease is for. Only single-family dwellings are permitted with in Sugar M ill, and each single-family dwelling may only be occupied by one family consisting of one or more persons related by blood, marriage or legal adoption, or by no more than two unrelated persons living and cooking together as a single housekeeping unit.

Moss on trees (as researched by the University of Florida): There are two different types of moss that you typically see on trees. Ball Moss appears as clumps typically on Oak trees. The second type of moss is commonly referred to as tree hair, or old man's beard, but is actually called Spanish Moss. It is most commonly found on Oak or Cypress trees. Both species of moss are in the Brom eliad family, so they get their nutrients from the air, and not the host tree. Moss attaches to the tree for support, but does not feed off of the tree. A lthough many hom eow ners think that moss kills trees, this is not typically the case because moss is not parasitic. The fact that ball moss can survive on utility lines, fences, rocks, and other non-plant substrates proves that this plant is not parasitic. If your tree is suffering after a heavy moss infestation, it is usually because of something else. An unhealthy tree can actually invite moss grow that as the canopy thins and it lets in more sunlight for the moss to grow. A ccording to the City of Houston Parks and Recreation Department, the only damage that moss can cause to a tree is if it gets so thick that it prevents sunlight from reaching the leaves and buds of its host tree or plant, and in addition, the weight of the moss can also cause tree branches to break, especially during rains or wind storms. Moss is most commonly spread from one by pieces of the plant being physically moved by birds, an in als or wind storms and by seed. While many of the copper based fungicides or herbicides will kill Moss, there is nothing they know of that can be sprayed on plants to prevent its grow the before it is established. Physically removing it by hand is an alternative, but very labor intensive!

License Plate Recognition Cameras (LPR's) — in 2009, the first Sugar Land LPR 's were installed in North Sugar Land, at major intersections entering our C ity. They are also active at Sugar Land Town Square, First Colony M all, and Cullinan Park. These are NOT red light cameras. Since they have been installed, 38 stolen vehicles have been recovered. Whatmost people don't realize is that crim in als are stealing cars in Houston, and then burg larizing Sugar Land homes with these stolen cars. By stopping these cars as they enter our City, we are preventing burg laries as well. These cameras have also been instrumental in helping the Police investigate leads, deter criminal activity, apprehend people with outstanding warrants, catch M all shoplifters, and find missing persons. The City of Sugar Land's goal is to eventually install LPR's at major intersections throughout our City. This is how the camera's work: A crime occurs. A witness then provides the police with a vehicle description and all or part of a license plate number. A designated police staffmember (who is authorized to access the system) searches the database for the suspective hicle and its license plate number. The driver cannot be identified, but the license plate is recorded for up to 30 days. This information is then purged, unless it is needed as evidence as part of a criminal investigation. Information will not be shared with the public unless required by law in certain legal matters. The use of the LPR system will be consistent with privacy laws and the constitutional rights of individuals. City Council will review findings from the pilot program report at an upcoming meeting and discuss their next steps.

Holiday Reminders: Christm as decorations m ay only be displayed after Thanksgiving, and m ust be taken down one week after the holiday (typically New Year's Day). For all other holidays throughout the year, decorations m ust be removed within one week after the holiday passes. Please be mindful not to shine any spotlights at your neighbors'windows, and be certain that security lights are on a motion detector and not left on. Please test your security lights to make sure when they do come on, they are not shining on neighbor's homes.

Keep Unsupervised Animals Inside! The C ity of Sugar Land prohibits an in als from roaming freely—including cats. Keeping your cats inside will prevent them from bringing their prizes (mice, birds) inside your home as gifts for you, and it will also prolong their lives. Cats that roam have a greater risk of catching diseases, getting into deadly fights with other cats, and falling prey to the many coyotes, hawks and bobcats that are being pushed out of their habitats and into our backyards by all the recent commercial and residential developments. These wild an in als have been seen in Sugar Mill, and have been responsible for the death of many ducks and cats within our community. Keep your an imals inside and buy them a few more toys to keep them happy!

The City of Sugar Land has advised us that the following crimes are on the increase:

- "Jugging" this is where crim in als follow you as you leave the bank and follow you home to rob you.
- "Sliders" this is where a crim in al slides in through your driver-side door to steal your purse while you are pumping gas.
- "Car Burglaries" crim in als are opening unlocked car doors and stealing items. They can also open your garage door if you keep your garage door opener in your unlocked car. Lock your car!! Car burglaries can also occur by breaking the window or breaking the lock to the vehicle, so please do not leave valuables visible, better yet—don't leave them in your car!
- "Valets" you go to a restaurant and valet park your expensive car. The valet notifies their buddies that a fancy car just pulled up to the restaurant. They give them the license plate number, which they plug into a public app. The app gives them your home address. They know they have at least one hour to rum mage through your home. These same criminals are also watching for fancy cars parking at worship centers, so be careful!

W hat does "A tLarge" mean? It means they represent all of Sugar Land, as opposed to just one district. Sugar Land operates under the "council-manager" form of government. Under this system, City Council appoints the City M anager, who acts as the chief executive officer of the government. The City M anager carries out policy and adm in isters city program s. A 117 Council M em bers (M ayor, 4 D istrict M em bers, and 2 At Large Positions) have equal voting rights. All department heads - including the C ity A ttomey, Police Chief and Fire Chief - are ultimately responsible to the City M anager.

Marion's Fishing

At long last, a change is in the air.....

As we do every year at this time, I'd like to talk a little about the "fall turnover". For anyone who may not know, turnover is a phenomenon that occurs every year at this time to all of our area lakes and reservoirs. This is how it normally occurs: As our average daytime and nighttime temperatures go down, the top layer of water in the lake begins to cool. The advent of shorter days and longer nights accelerates this process. With cool water being heavier than warm water, the cool upper layer will eventually "sink" to the bottom of the lake. This in turn forces the warmer bottom layer to the surface. As this all occurs, it disturbs silt and sediment from the bottom of the lake and normally causes the water clarity to decrease. Also, dissolved oxygen levels are affected. All of these factors combined will usually disrupt the fish's feeding habits. The combination of unstable oxygen content, murky water, and changing PH levels will usually negatively affect fishing success for a while. Luckily, the affects of the fall turnover only last a short time. After several days of stable weather, the water conditions should improve and the fish will get back to their normal feeding patterns.

Turnover is a normal occurrence that happens to all lakes in our area. It is a short-lived interruption to some otherwise very favorable fishing conditions. So when these less-than-ideal conditions exist, just be patient and give the lake a few days to stabilize. Overall, the fall of the year is still my favorite time to be on the water.

Remember to catch and release, because a bass is far to valuable of a resource to catch just once. Good luck, Marion. Article written by Marion Raska who has lived in Sugar Mill and fished on Misty Lake for over 24 years.

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
