
The James M. Slay Detachment Honor Guard

Houston-Holicky-Sitter Luncheon

Slay Detachment and Vietnam Marine

I grew up in Upper Nyack, a small town on the west side of the Hudson River in 'upstate' New York and attended Hamilton College in Clinton, NY as a pre-medical student.

During my junior year, I decided my GPA wouldn't be good enough to get into medical school, and I didn't have the energy at that point to change majors. The war in Vietnam was escalating and most still considered serving in the military, as their parents had during World War II, a rite of passage and a duty. I decided to enlist, rather than be drafted or miss the opportunity to serve during wartime.



In the fall of 1966, I enlisted in the Marine Corps for 4 years. After boot camp at Parris Island and ITR at Camp Geiger, I continued on to NAS Jacksonville to Aviation Ordinance School. My first duty station was with MAG 32 at MCAS, Beaufort, SC as a 6511.

It was there that my third application for OCS was finally approved. When I was commissioned a 2nd Lt in October of 1968, I was simultaneously given an Honorable Discharge as a Corporal. After The Basic School for 2nd Lieutenants, I was given a crash language course in Vietnamese, and then headed for Vietnam where I was assigned as 1st Platoon Commander, Fox 2/4, in Northern I Corps.



On May 31, 1969, my 23rd birthday, I met my platoon on Hill 691 near FSB Cates, in the northwestern corner of South Vietnam, a few clicks south of the DMZ. Ironically, it was primarily for actions that night that I was awarded the Bronze Star with Combat "V," Combat Action Ribbon, and RVN Cross of Gallantry with Silver Star. Just 5 months later in November 1969, the 4th Marines were withdrawn from combat and redeployed to Okinawa where I was XO and then CO of Fox 2/4 as a 1st Lieutenant.

When I returned to the "World," I was assigned to the Marine Corps Supply Activity in Philadelphia, PA where I was selected by its CO, a Major General, to be his Aide-de-Camp. A year into this great duty, I was granted a 'school cut' to attend Columbia University as an economics major on the G.I Bill. In 1973 when I resigned my commission, I received an Honorable Discharge as a Captain.

I worked for three very large banks in New York City. All were subsequently acquired by larger domestic or international banks and no longer exist as I knew them. Following graduation from Columbia, I was hired by Bankers Trust Company for its Executive Training Program and was assigned to cover the automotive industry in Michigan. Five years later I was recruited by Irving Trust Company to manage its business with Fortune 500 companies headquartered in Chicago. Two years later, I found myself heading up its business with multinational corporations headquartered in New York City. A string of assignments followed where I was responsible for its business with foreign multinational corporations headquartered abroad. Irving Trust Company was acquired by The Bank of New York in a hostile take-over. My last assignment with The Bank of New York was as Manager of International Corporate Finance and a member of its International Management Steering Committee.



During the last ten years of my career in finance, I worked for Northwestern Mutual Life Insurance Company as a financial planner and salesman. It was during those years that I learned about personal finance as opposed to corporate finance and practiced religiously what I preached to my clients. While I had my fair share of misfortune, on balance I attribute my ability to retire early to lessons learned as a Leatherneck, to leading a frugal life, to planning responsibly for the future, to investing prudently, and to some lucky but educated guesses on major moves in the stock and bond markets.

My autobiography, *Navigating with A Few Good Men*, is a tribute to the Marine Corps.


