Dear Brothers and Sisters,

Greetings to you in the mighty and holy name of the Lord Jesus Christ. I pray this letter finds you in good health and spirits.

Political rancor and unrest here in the United States and abroad, divisive political rhetoric, heightened tension between ethnic groups, loss of confidence in truth in reporting, disdain for democracy, corrupt political leaders, the Israeli and Palestine conflict, and Russia's war against Ukraine, coupled with our personal trials and those all humans face daily, may make it challenging to look for silver-linings and give thanks. Yet that is what Philippians chapter four, verse eight, instructs us to do. Is it not just like God to ask His followers to do what seems impossible while reminding them, us, that with Him and because of Him, all things are possible, and nothing is impossible?

Philippians 4:8 challenges readers to look beyond circumstances and daunting conditions and focus instead on the good in life. The passage reminds us that we may not have power over events. Praise God, the author of Philippians 4, reminds us that empowered by the Holy Spirit, trouble, no matter how painful or extensive, is a snapshot or snippet in the larger picture of life. Moreover, the passage urges readers to practice the power of positive thinking - "focus on what is true, honorable, correct, pure, lovely, and admirable" while engulfed in trouble. This thinking helps us cope and thrive and gives us perspective beyond our trials.

As we approach the Thanksgiving season, I invite you to join me in dedicating a little time each day to prayers of thanksgiving and praise. Focus on something you are grateful for, no matter how small or insignificant it may seem. Then, spend time thanking God for it.

Happy Thanksgiving, and Godspeed!



THANKSGIVING November 23, 2023

Is Thanksgiving a Christian Holiday?

Thanksgiving is not only a holiday that began with Christian origins; giving thanks is a requirement central to the Christian

faith! Rev. Marjorie Nunes of Hicksville United Methodist Church explains the connection of this American holiday with Christianity, saying: "Thanksgiving is definitely a religious holiday rooted in the Christian tradition of our country. Even though the secularism of our present culture may have turned the focus somewhat, we ought not to forget the history and the religious significance of this American holiday.

Actually, the first Thanksgiving Day observance originated in Virginia.

On Dec. 4, 1619, 38 English settlers arrived at Berkeley Plantation on the James River. The settlement's charter required that the day of arrival be commemorated with thanksgiving to Almighty God. After they arrived on the shores of the James River, the settlers got on their knees and gave thanks for their safe passage. Hence, America's first Thanksgiving was about prayer and thanksgiving to God."



Why Do We Celebrate Thanksgiving?

As you can guess by its name, the annual holiday of Thanksgiving centers around a tradition of giving thanks for the people, prosperity, and divine blessings in our lives. Christianity.com explains the historical origins and development of this renowned celebration: Pilgrims and Puritans who migrated in the early 17th century from England brought the tradition of "Days of Fasting and Days of Thanksgiving" with them to the New World of America. The present Thanksgiving holiday custom is inspired by a notable gathering from 1619 in Virginia and a lesser recorded 1621 festival at Plymouth in modern Massachusetts.

In 1619, English settlers arrived in Virginia rejoicing a successful journey with a celebration of thanksgiving as directed by the group's charter from the London Company. The charter then ordered that the date of their arrival to Virginia "...shall be yearly

ELECTION DAY—November 7, 2023

Why Voting Is Important

"Voting is your civic duty." This is a pretty common sentiment, especially each November as Election Day approaches. But what does it really mean? And what does it mean for Americans in particular?

Why Your Vote Matters

If you ever think that just one vote in a sea of millions cannot make much of a difference, consider some of the closest elections in U.S. history. Your vote may not directly elect the president, but if your vote joins enough others in your voting district or county, your vote undoubtedly matters when it comes to electoral results.

A History of Voting in the United States

Today, most American citizens over the age of 18 are entitled to vote in federal and state elections, but voting was not always a default right for all Americans. The United States Constitution, as originally written, did not define specifically who could or could not vote—but it did establish how the new country would vote.

Article I of the Constitution determined that members of the Senate and House of Representatives would both be elected directly by popular vote. The president, however, would be elected not by direct vote, but rather by the Electoral College. The Electoral College assigns a number of representative votes per state, typically based on the state's population. This indirect election method was seen as a balance between the popular vote and using a state's representatives in Congress to elect a president.

Because the Constitution did not specifically say who could vote, this question was largely left to the states into the 1800s. In most cases, landowning white men were eligible to vote, while white women, black people, and other

disadvantaged groups of the time were excluded from voting (known as disenfranchisement).

While no longer explicitly excluded, voter suppression is a problem in many parts of the country. Some politicians try to win reelection by making it harder for certain populations and demographics to vote. These politicians may use strategies such as reducing polling locations in predominantly African American or Lantinx neighborhoods, or only having polling stations open during business hours, when many disenfranchised populations are working and unable to take time off.

It was not until the 15th Amendment was passed in 1869 that black men were allowed to vote. But even so, many would-be voters faced artificial hurdles like poll taxes, literacy tests, and other measures meant to discourage them from exercising their voting right. This would continue until the 24th Amendment in 1964, which eliminated the poll tax, and the Voting Rights Act of 1965, which ended Jim Crow laws. Women were denied the right to vote until 1920, when the long efforts of the women's suffrage movement resulted in the 19th Amendment.

With these amendments removing the previous barriers to voting (particularly sex and race), theoretically all American citizens over the age of 21 could vote by the mid 1960s. Later, in 1971, the American voting age was lowered to 18, building on the idea that if a person was old enough to serve their country in the military, they should be allowed to vote.

Today I will celebrate the mystery of God.

[God said to Job,] "Where were you when I laid the earth's foundation? Tell me, if you understand." - Job 38:4 (NIV)

I know the basic principle at work when I place a dish of food in the microwave — atoms and energy create waves that vibrate to heat my food — but I cannot pretend to fully understand the complex science behind it. However, this lack of knowledge does not prevent me from using my microwave. I am just happy my food warms quickly!

Similarly, I do not understand the mysteries of God, but my lack of knowledge does not prevent me from trusting God. In today's scripture reading, God poses a series of questions to Job concerning the complexities of creation. Like Job, I don't understand how God created our world. I don't understand exactly how my belief in Jesus gives me a personal relationship with an unseen God. I don't understand how the Holy Spirit intervenes in my life, offering abiding peace through scripture and prayer. As the apostle Paul said, we see things dimly now, like a cloudy reflection in a mirror, but someday we will understand (see 1 Cor. 13:12).

I do not have to understand something to know that it is so. My immediate surroundings hold countless instances of mystery that nudge me toward the awesomeness of God. In spite of incomplete understanding, spiritual life is born in and nourished by faith.







CHILDREN'S CORNER

Parents, please read this to your younger child(ren)

Practice What You Preach

Theme: Do what you tell others to do.

Object: none

Scripture: Matthew 23:1-12



Lead kids through a couple rounds of Simon Says. In Simon Says, the leader tells kids things to do but they have to listen closely. If you say, "Simon says," then kids do the motion. If you don't say, "Simon Says," kids don't do the motion.

After a few rounds of Simon Says, say: You guys did a great job playing Simon Says. Let's play it the opposite way. You still need to listen to me say, "Simon Says" before you do a motion. But, in this Opposite Simon Says, you will do the opposite of what I say. If I say, "Simon says, 'don't touch your head,' you will do the opposite and touch your head." Let's try this.

Simon says, "don't clap your hands." (Kids should clap their hands because they're doing the opposite thing.)

Say these things for kids to do the opposite:

- "Simon says, 'Stand up.' " (Kids will sit.)
- "Stand up." (Kids should not move.)
- "Simon says, 'Sit down.' " (Kids will stand up.)
- "Simon says, 'Don't pat your head.' " (Kids will pat their head.)
- "Simon says, 'Don't stop patting your head.' " (Kids will stop.)
- "Pat your stomach." (Kids should not move.)
- "Simon says, 'Don't practice what you preach." (Kids will be confused.)

Have kids sit down.

Practice what you preach. What does that mean? (Pause.) I think it means that if you tell someone to do something, you need to do it, too. Practice what you preach means don't do the opposite thing that you say. Instead do what you say others should do.

In our Bible lesson today, Jesus had something to say about "practicing what you preach." Jesus was talking about the teachers of the law and the Pharisees in the synagogue where people went to worship. Jesus said that everything that they did was done so that others would see them and think how great they were. But they didn't do what they told other people to do. In fact, they did the opposite!

What did Jesus tell us to do about teachers like these? (Pause.)

You might think Jesus would say, "Don't listen to them! You don't have to do what they say." But He didn't. Jesus said, "Obey these teachers and do everything they say. But do not do what they do, because they do not practice what they preach." When it comes to living the Christian life, we need to make sure we do what we say.

Here's a little poem that would be good to remember.






