#### A Note From Your Rabbi,

A beloved part of our activities at Beth Shalom has been the movies. Jewish in some respect is our criteria for the movies we watch as well as movies that likely will generate lively discussions and idea exchange. The last movie we watched together was Gett, the mostly unknown story of how hard it is for women to obtain a Jewish (religious) divorce, gett. In our discussion following the movie, I shared that no one is ever allowed to witness the rabbinical courts proceedings, thus no one other than the Bet Din (rabbis of the court) and the couple, know what goes on in those

courts. Gett, the movie, is an attempt to show what these proceedings truly look like. The movie is based on a collection of stories from eye witnesses, lawyers and rabbis, who described to the writers/directors what their experiences have been in the rabbinical courts.

The movie generated great attention and discussion in the Israeli public. Eventually there was a special screening of Gett at an annual meeting of Dayanim/Bet Din judges in Northern Israel with the Chief Rabbi David Lau in attendance. For the first time dayanim were confronted with the way they are perceived by the general public as the movie sheds light on the difficulties of obtaining a gett in Israel, especially for women. The social discussion of the movie brought on a public demand to begin changing this unfair reality and find ways to establish additional marriage options such as Israeli civil marriages.


The movie Gett was created and directed by brother/sister team - Shlomi and Ronit Elkabetz. It won numerous awards and was nominated for the best foreign language film Golden Globe in 2015. This movie is added to Ronit's already long list of excellence in films, who has been an influential feminine voice on the Israeli cultural scene.


In a strange stroke of fate, as I was preparing to write about the next movie event at Beth Shalom, it was announced that Ronit Elkmbetz has died aged 51 from cancer.

In a statement, Former Israel president Shimon Peres, said that Elkmbetz was "an extraordinary cultural ambassador for the state of Israel" and that "on various stages of the world, Ronit represented the citizens of Israel and the state of Israel with great pride, creativity and beauty." May her memory be an eternal blessing for us all.

#### Tabernacle and Temple

Our first Temple (Bet HaMidash) was built by King Solomon and represented the focal point of the Land of Israel in the city of Jerusalem. It stood for 410 years until it was destroyed by Nebuchadnezzar and his Babylonians. Seventy years later, the second Temple was built by Ezra. According to history, it stood for



420 years until it was razed by the Roman legions under Titus.

Many of us think of the Jerusalem Temple as being a synagogue; however, it was a unique structure. G-d commanded shortly after the Exodus from Egypt that the Israelites build a Tabernacle (Mishkan) in the desert. G-d said, "They shall make me a sanctuary, and I will dwell therein." [Exodus 25:8]

Through this Tabernacle G-d's presence would dwell in the heart of each Jew. [Zohar 1:129 in Midrash Ne'elam] The Tabernacle thus represented our partnership with G-d in bringing the world toward its final goal. In a sense, the Tabernacle paralleled G-d's own act of creation.

The Tabernacle was probably the world's first prefabricated structure. It was large: 20 feet high,. 24 feet wide, and 64 feet long. The entire structure could be taken apart and transported from place to place. It accompanied the Israelites in their wandering in the desert. After they entered our Holy Land, it was occasionally moved from place to place. It stood in Gilgah for 14 years, in Shiloh for 369 years, in Nob, and then in Gibeon for a total of 57 years. [Samuel 21:2, 1 Kings 3:4]

There was also a commandment to build a permanent Temple. As the Torah states, "You shall seek (G-d's) habitation." [Deuteronomy 12:5] This could only be accomplished when the Israelites occupied the Promised Land, appointed a king, and attained a state of peace. Of significance, the Torah continues, "When you cross the Jordan, dwelling in the land which the L-rd your G-d gives you to inherit, and He gives you rest from all your enemies round about so that you dwell in safety; then there shall be the place which the L-rd your G-d will choose to make His name dwell there." [Deuteronomy 12:10] Such peace was not obtained until the time of David and Solomon. Only then could the Temple be built.

#### Key Temple Features

An important feature of the Temple was the Great Altar (Mazbeach) upon which all sacrifices were placed and the only place in the world where a specific sacrifice to G-d could be offered. Today a central platform, called a Bimah or Almenar, is built in the synagogue. That platform is where the Torah is read. It parallels the Great Altar, which was located in the center of the Jerusalem Temple. On the festival of Succot, we march around the platform, just as our people once marched around the Great Altar of the Temple.

The Temple also had an inner chamber called the Hechal, containing three main features. The best known of these was the golden Menorah, a huge seven-branched candelabrum taller than most NBA basketball players. Six of the seven lamps were kindled each evening, while the middle lamp burned constantly as the Eternal Light. This was the Menorah that was lighted during the miracle of Chanukah in the time of the Second Temple. Beside the Menorah, this inner chamber contained a golden altar for incense and a special table upon which the show-bread was placed. [Exodus 25:11-30, 30:1-10]



Past this chamber was the Holy of Holies, the innermost chamber and focal point of the Temple. No one was ever allowed to enter it other than the High Priest (Cohen Gadol) and only on Yom Kippur. Jews from all over the world gathered in Jerusalem to see the High Priest emerge in peace after having worshiped in this inner sanctuary. [Leviticus 16] Even today, one of the most dramatic portions of the Yom Kippur service is the portion in the Mussof which recounts how the High Priest would enter the Holy of Holies.

In the center of the Holy of Holies stood the Ark of the Covenant, which was made of wood covered with pure gold. Attached to the cover were two gold Cherubim that were made under the personal supervision of Moses. [Exodus 25:10, 17, 40:18]

The Ark's contents included objects that were most sacred to Judaism: the two Tablets inscribed with the Ten Commandments, which G-d had given to Moses; and the original Torah that Moses had written as dictated by G-d. The present location of the Ark and the significance of the Western Wall will be discussed in next month's *Mishpacha*.

### Daniel Cohen, Author of Single Handed, the Story of Tibor "Teddy" Rubin



What a triple treat we had Sunday, April 17. Treat number one was the food. The morning started with a brunch provided by Sisterhood that was both delicious and beautifully prepared. That was followed by treat number two - the amazing story of Tibor "Teddy" Rubin who was fourteen when he was captured by the Nazis and sent to Mauthausen Concentration camp. Liberated a year later by the Americans, he vowed, if he ever made it to the U.S., he would enlist in the army to repay the debt. Penniless, barely speaking English, and experiencing horrendous prejudice in the army, he was discharged without recognition for all of his heroic deeds in battle and as an inmate in a Chinese Prisoner of War Camp. The survival skills he learned in Mauthausen helped keep him and many of his fellow POWs alive in the camp. Finally, at the age of seventy-six, after heavy lobbying by fellow veterans and the Jewish War Veterans, he was finally awarded the Medal of Honor. And what was treat number three? Dan Cohen's presentation itself. We knew he was an award winning film maker, a journalist, and a film critic, but the secret to his amazing presentation that kept us spell-bound was his experience as a stand-up comedian. We ended the morning with three Wows - one for the food, one for Teddy Rubin, and one for Dan Cohen! Dan's book, "Single Handed, The Inspiring True Story of Tibor "Teddy" Rubin - Holocaust Survivor, Korean War Hero, and Medal of Honor Recipient" is available in the Synagogue Gift Shop or on Amazon.com.



#### 1st Night Passover Seder



Young and old, familiar and new faces gathered at the Seder tables to hear the story of Passover, the freedom of our ancestors in Egypt long ago. Each table had the familiar Seder Plate with parsley, haroset, roasted egg, shank bone and horseradish. As well as other ritual items matzot - the cracker like bread, salt water - the tears of the Israelites to dip the parsley in and wine (or grape juice) for the four cups to be drank during the Seder.

One topic of the evening was the strength of the horseradish, it was HOT, I took one bite and left it for others much braver than myself. Dinner was absolutely delicious matzot ball soup with a light and delicious matzot ball, chicken with roasted potatoes and vegetables, ending with a plate of various desserts. The evening was filled with the laughter of children, conversations among the tables and our Jewish family coming together to celebrate the holiday of freedom for our ancestors. 




