The older I get, the faster time seems to go by. I'm looking at June already and wondering where has the time gone. It's not just the last six months, but a lifetime as well. This June my father will be 85 years old. He is the last of 11 children born to my grandparents. He has children, grand children, great grand children, and a great – great grandchild. Thankfully he is still quite active around the house and yard, in church, the legion, and the grange. He still worries about me and my sister and how we are getting by in life.

Today I look at him with his now white hair, weathered face, hands not as steady, a little hunch over when he walks, hearing aids, and reading glasses, and I wonder what happened to that tall standing, dark haired, steady hand, highly active, man I used to see. I can't help in remembering the many days he got up at 4:00am and worked in a factory all day, and then on the farm when he got home, stopping only for meals, and to finally sit in his chair around 8pm, then to bed by 9pm. And even with all that, he still had time for the family. Holidays, summer picnics, whatever, we still did things as a family. Family was important to him and it still is.

Yes, he's older now, but I will always see him young and strong. Like the days we broke a mule to the buggy – not easily I may add as I can still see the time the mule dragged him through the garden, dad yelling "WHOE, WHOE, **&%#@* - I SAID WHOE!!" (Dad did let loose of the reins.) Afterwards, the mule ran around and turned over with the buggy on the lawn. Dad's real strength came out, he didn't yell at the mule, or hit him, but rather he talked softly, had me hold the bridle while him and mom got the mule free of the traces. The lesson wasn't over, for the mule or me. Dad had me lead the mule by the barn where dad and I removed the harness then, let the mule drink a little and we brushed him down and walked him a bit, all the while talking to the mule. The bigger lesson, yup everything went wild for a moment, but calmness returned, no one was hurt, smile, make friends and move on. This holds true in many of life's situations.

And yes, there have been times when dad and I went against each other but, we got by them all. We still sometimes disagree but, get over it. And I think about how he is older, and so am I and we both learned of life and its ups and downs. And one lesson I learned was how lucky I was to have had a loving dad and I tell him so occasionally, like Fathers Day. Thank You Dad, for just being you. **Xathy Peckham*.

New - Easy Tithe

What is it?????????

Have you noticed a new link on the Church website? Brewerton UMC is participating in a new option for financial giving. You can now make an Offering to the Brewerton Church and any of its Funds (Pantry, Capital, Trustees, etc.) through an online site called Easy Tithe.

You can set up your offering to be split into the funds that you select and to be completed automatically as a recurring item, if you choose. Your pledged amount arrives at the same time even if you are not able to be at church.

You can use a debit card or a credit card. We would you prefer you not to go into debt to give an offering, but if you pay off your bills every month this is an option. Some credit cards offer cash back bonuses. You can even download the mobile app on your smart Phone to send your offering electronically while you are in church.

How????

Go to the Brewerton UMC Home page, click on the link on the right hand side of the screen titled "Easy Tithe for BUMC". Follow the directions to set up your account and you will be ready to start giving using Easy Title. You will notice there is a spot at the bottom of the giving screen that allows you to pay the processing fees for this service. If you want to cover the associated fees just check the box. (On a \$10 offering it is \$.60, on \$100 offering it is \$3.30 and so on.) If you want to use your phone download the app and go from there.

You also have access to reports of your offerings. All offerings will also be put into the church tracking system so we can print your giving statement at the year end.

If you have any questions please contact any of the Finance committee and they can answer them for you.

And!!!

Aside from this new service and the traditional method of putting the money in the plate, most banks offer bill pay in which you have them send the offering directly to the church. This also can be set up to be recurring with your offering arriving at church on a scheduled date, whether you are in attendance or not. There is no charge to the church for this and most banks offer it as a free service to the account holder.

Introducing ... Rev. Justin M. Hood

Dear Friends and Members of the Brewerton United Methodist Church, It is with humility and with great joy that I take this opportunity to introduce myself to you as your pastor this coming July. My first trip to Brewerton, meeting with the dedicated folks of your Staff-Parish Relations Committee has me very hopeful for our time together. Additionally, I feel that I know so much about you already (and look forward to learning more!) but you probably don't know much about me yet.

As a way of introduction, let me share with you a bit about my journey: I was born and raised in Sidney, New York and attended Hartwick College in Oneonta, New York where I studied History, Religious Studies and Music. During my undergraduate studies, I worked closely with the United Methodist Church, serving as a voting delegate to the Upper New York Annual Conference, as well as various missional efforts such as UMCOR, Habitat for Humanity and served as a youth counselor. I also met my partner, Emma who will be joining me in moving to the Brewerton area and has accepted a position as a High School Mathematics teacher at Jordan-Elbridge High School.

After completing my undergraduate studies, I attended the Boston University School of Theology. During my first two years in Boston, I served as the Christian Education Director at an Episcopal Church in Newton, Massachusetts. During my tenure there, I worked closely with the various committees of the church and reconstructed their youth program to serve a larger amount of students and to better integrate the youth into the general congregation's body and the church's various committees.

This year, I have served as the Pastor of the Mount Upton, Unadilla Center and Sand Hill United Methodist Church communities while completing the final year of my seminary education. I have worked towards building a youth group in these churches for the first time in over 25 years. We have increased our youth attendance in the church from an average of 2 or 3 young people in my first month to a current number of 10 or more on most Sunday mornings. Additionally, I have led Bible studies on the History and Theology of the United Methodist Church, the Gospel of John and new approaches and understandings of Advent. We actively responded to hunger issues by providing a community food pantry that reaches dozens of families each week.

I am eager for the opportunity God has blessed me with to share in ministry with you. I believe that together we can open ourselves to the leading of the Holy Spirit so we may know God's will and follow with generous hearts. I look forward to meeting you all and learning the wonders of your life and faith stories. In the weeks ahead, I welcome hearing your wisdom, insights and concerns.

FROM THE ADMINISTRATIVE COUNCIL

The first half of 2016 has been a very busy one for the Administrative Council. I wanted to provide you with this update on our activities to date:

Mattydale Parsonage. As many of you are aware, we acted on a recommendation from the Trustees to sell the Mattydale Parsonage. Two separate Charge Conferences unanimously approved that action. The sale is in progress and is expected to net \$67,000, which will be placed in the BUMC Capital Improvements Fund.

Path of Life Mission Center. The Conference has reconfirmed our clear ownership of the PoLM building and has told us as the owners we have sole control over the future of that facility. As you know, there are important missions that take place there, including the Easter Morning Clothing Closet, the monthly Mattydale Community Dinners, AA groups, Bible Studies, etc. In addition, PoLM continues to provide worship and office space for two separate United Methodist New Faith Communities: "New World," which is made up of Sudanese refugees; and "Good News and New Hope," which is a larger congregation of Southeast Asian Karenni immigrants. The two NFCs are very interested in keeping their space in the building and continuing to grow their faith communities. We are very interested in maintaining the missions taking place there that we sponsor. We are now involved in meetings aimed at reaching an agreement whereby the NFCs will support the continued operation and operating costs of the facility. We will keep you posted on the progress of those talks.

Child Care Program. We are working closely with the Child Care Board and BCCC Director Beth Chiasson as they continue their efforts to build the enrollment, the fiscal security, and the overall success of that important mission of our church. They have been doing a great job in that regard and we appreciate their hard work.

Pastoral Transition. The leadership is working closely with Rachel Windover and the SPRC as they plan for our upcoming transition of pastors.

The Administrative Council meets regularly the third Tuesday of every other month, at 7:00pm. The next scheduled meeting is July 19. Any special meetings are announced in the weekly bulletin. All church members are always invited to attend these meetings and to offer your input and advice. We thank you for your support!

Networking Opportunities at the Food Bank Annual Conference

On May 6th, volunteers from our pantry joined pantry & soup kitchen volunteers from 13 counties around Upstate New York at the 27th Annual Partner Agency & Community Awareness Day. The Food Bank of Central New York hosted the event for the first time at the SRC Arena on the Onondaga Community College (OCC) Campus. The growing popularity of the event over the years made it necessary to move to a larger venue! This year's theme was "Collaboration in Your Community." Keynote Speaker Richard Ball, Commissioner of New York State Department of Agriculture & Markets, gave an inspirational message addressing the value and importance of agriculture in our communities as we work together to confront food insecurity. Commissioner Ball shared his unique perspective as the owner and operator of Schoharie Valley Farms in Schoharie NY where he plants and harvests a wide range of vegetable crops, small fruits and greenhouse crops on his 200 acre farm. He is putting his life experiences on the farm to good use as he "connects the dots" to: "Grow Upstate," "Seek Food Justice" for all and bring life to "Food Deserts" in his work on the Antihunger Task Force & the Upstate/Downstate Summits. His work extends to food safety, product labeling, and climatechange, education, best practices and the marketplace. He is committed to tackling the issues that most directly impact our communities' ability to provide healthy food options and education to our neighbors in need.

Conference participants were engaged in various workshops throughout the day, with topics ranging from collaborating with colleges and universities, engaging with elected officials, to child hunger in CNY, food safety and new dietary guidelines. It was a great networking opportunity for all in attendance.

Looking Ahead to Summer in the Pantry...
