

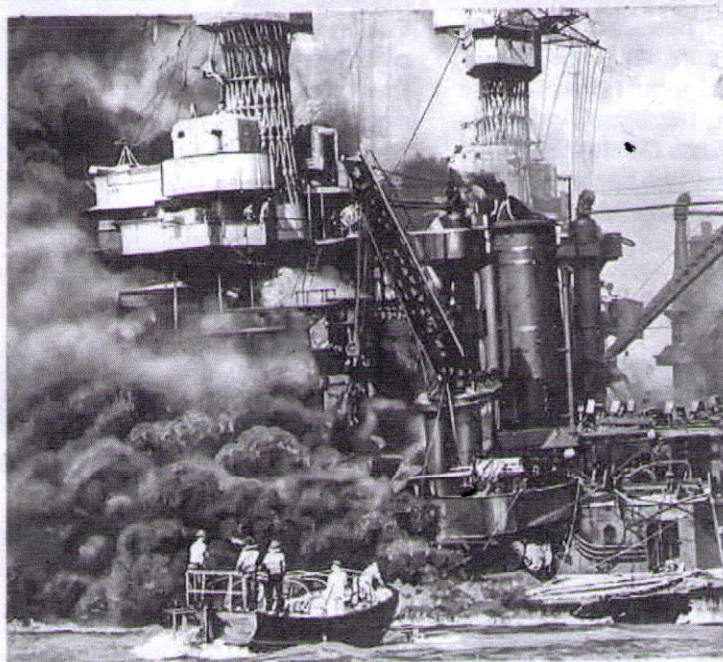

PEARL HARBOR HAWAII 0800**

77 years ago, Japan launched its surprise attack on Pearl Harbor killing 2,433 and wounding 1,178; the United States lost 18 surface warships (sunk or seriously damaged); 188 aircraft destroyed and 159 damaged

The next day, 8 December 1941, Congress, President Franklin Roosevelt addressed a joint session of Congress, describing the attack on Pearl Harbor as, "A Day which will live in infamy ---." The United States declared war on Japan.

The Armistice of 11 November 1918, also known as the Armistice of Compiègne from the place where it was signed, was the armistice that ended fighting on land, sea and air in World War I between the Allies and their opponent, Germany. It came into force "the eleventh hour of the eleventh day of the eleventh month" at 11 AM Paris time on 11 November 1918 and marked a victory for the Allies and a complete defeat for Germany. On 11 November 1919, President Woodrow Wilson proclaimed 11 November to be a National Holiday named Armistice Day. President Dwight D. Eisenhower signed a bill into law on May 26, 1954 changing the name from Armistice Day to Veterans Day in celebration of all veterans of American wars. On 11 November 2018, we celebrate the 100th Anniversary of Armistice/Veterans Day. 🇺🇸

USNSCC is a national youth leadership development organization that promotes interest and skill in naval disciplines while instilling strong moral character and life skills through leadership and technical programs modeled after the Navy's professional development system.

USNSCC is comprised of two programs. The Naval Sea Cadet Corps (NSCC) program is for young people ages 13 through the completion of high school. Also included under the USNSCC umbrella is our junior program, the Navy League Cadet Corps (NLCC), for young people ages 10 through 13.

LAUNCHING CEREMONY

The breaking of a bottle of wine on the bows of a ship during the launching or christening ceremony has not always been the custom. This story is UK-derived, but many of the US customs have followed suit. Before 1690 the ship's health was drunk from a silver cup which, after use, was thrown

into the sea. After that date, the present day method was introduced. Until 1811, the event was always performed by a royal personage or a dockyard commissioner, but in that year the Prince Regent suggested that a lady should have the honor – a custom that remains to this day.

Securing the bottle of wine to a lanyard is said to have originated because of an accident in which a lady performing the launching ceremony threw the bottle at the bow of the ship, but missing, hit a spectator, who received serious injury and sued the Admiralty for damages.

On a gruesome note, it has been suggested that the practice of splashing a new ship's bows with wine is a relic of the splashing with blood arising from the ancient Norse practice of launching a ship over the bodies of sacrificial victims. ✍

HIGHEST RANKING CASUALTY AT PEARL HARBOR



Isaac Campbell Kidd was an American Rear Admiral in the United States Navy. Kidd was killed on the bridge of USS Arizona during the Japanese attack on Pearl Harbor on 7 Dec. 1941. He became the first U.S. Navy flag officer killed in action in World War II as well as the first killed in action against any foreign enemy. He was a posthumous recipient of his nation's highest military honor - the Medal of Honor. Several ships have been named after him, the most recent being the Arleigh Burke-class guided missile destroyer, **USS KIDD (DDG-100)**, commissioned 2007. ✍

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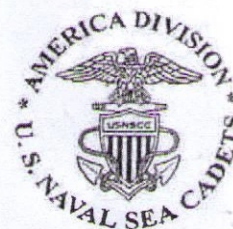

HISTORY OF NAVAL STATION NORFOLK

The land on which Naval Station Norfolk is located was originally the site of the 1907 Jamestown Exposition. Congress appropriated \$1 million in 1908 for the purchase, but the Assistant Secretary of the Navy approved a new coal ship instead.

Just after the United States entered World War I the Secretary of the Navy was persuaded to buy the property and develop it. The Navy filled a large part of the flats on the west and north by dredging the Elizabeth River to a depth sufficient for large ships to dock at The Naval Operating Base (NOB). By Armistice Day, 1918, there were 34,000 enlisted men at the base. Construction continued. By 1942, recruit training at the base was discontinued in order to focus on advanced training for men going directly to the fleet.

After World War II, NOB and Naval Air Station Chambers Field were collectively referred to as Naval Base Norfolk and then Naval Station Norfolk. Today, in addition to being the home for the Navy's largest concentration of naval forces, Naval Station Norfolk also hosts personnel from the other services and supports significant Joint missions. Naval Station Norfolk is now abbreviated NAVSTA Norfolk. 🪑











HOW NOT TO DESIGN A TAILHOOK

If it ain't broke, don't fix it. If you are a F-35C designer, do you use decades of history with the Navy F-18's? Nope. The Hornet's distance between the wheels and the tailhook is 18.2 feet. Now try 7.1 feet. What happened? The first carrier landings attempted by F-35C's failed - could not catch the wire. Turns out, that the wheels running over the wire set it to a "transverse kink wave," making it harder for the tailhook to grab. The fix was a sharper tailhook hook with a stronger frame and hook downforce, no doubt with delays and dollars. 🪑

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USS MISSOURI IN THE GULF WAR – JAN/FEB 1991

USS MISSOURI (BB-63 - "Mighty Mo" or "Big Mo") was the last battleship commissioned by the United States, in 1944. In World War II, she fought in the battles of Iwo Jima and Okinawa and shelled the Japanese home islands. She was best remembered as the site of the Japanese surrender which ended WWII. She also fought in the Korean War, but then was decommissioned in 1955 into the United States Navy Reserve, "Moth

ball" Fleet, but reactivated and modernized in 1984 as part of the 600-ship Navy plan. Repeat, **Six Hundred**. She provided fire support during Operation Desert Storm in January/February 1991. In 1998, she was donated to the **USS MISSOURI Memorial Association** and became a museum ship at Pearl Harbor. ⚓

SHOWS HIS TRUE COLORS

Early warships often carried flags from many nations on board in order to elude or deceive the enemy. The

rules of civilized warfare called for all ships to hoist their true national ensigns before firing a shot. Someone who finally "*shows his true colors*" is acting like a man-of-war which hailed another ship flying one flag, but then hoisted their own when they got in firing range. ⚓

Greetings from **USS GRAVELY**!

The crew was happy to return to Norfolk after our Hurricane Florence sortie, which had a significant impact on our schedule but, fortunately, did not impact the Hampton Roads area as originally forecasted. We returned to sea for a week in late September to complete Initial Ship Aviation Team Training (ISATT) with our detachment from HSM 70, which was a critical pre-deployment certification with the pilots, air crew and aircraft that will be embarked in **GRAVELY** through deployment. We were also able to complete a towed sled live fire certification event, another check in the box towards Basic Phase Certification.

Following a successful week at sea, **GRAVELY** headed to the Naval Weapons Station in Yorktown to complete an ammunition onload. Finally, it was back to Norfolk in early October for final inport preparations for the KEARSARGE Composite Training Unit Exercise (COMPTUEX), which will serve as the deployment certification event for **GRAVELY** this fall. This promises to be a dynamic and chal-

lenging event, which will test the ship and crew's preparedness across all warfare areas.

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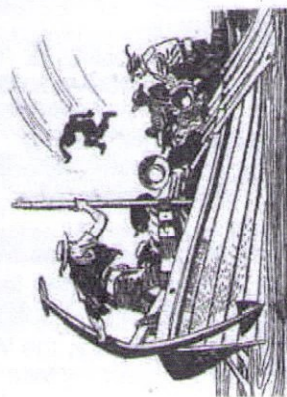
