Here's what I'm thinking...

LENT ALERT: I think that maybe I have been looking for Jesus in all the wrong places! Well, not exactly all the wrong places, maybe just not <u>all</u> the right places.

During this season of Lent, every week we ask in one way or another what it means to be a Christian—to follow Jesus. Every week we have been looking at the life of Jesus for some answers. The work is to superimpose, in honest ways, Jesus' example onto the situations in our own lives. Scripture is certainly the *right* place to start. But it has felt like difficult work because week after week, Jesus asks us to do really hard things, like examine our long-held prejudices, defy church leaders, sacrifice our own self-interests, stand up for justice and against oppression, and love our neighbors—even the ones who make us so angry. And right now there is so much in this world that makes us so very angry. It can be discouraging work because we doubt that we can love the way Jesus does and we can't even realistically imagine what that would even look like given some of the situations we face today.

I was contemplating this when, unexpectedly, I heard an interview with comedian Sarah Silverman on the radio. Silverman is known for her sunny, upbeat, silly, delivery of jokes that are often a bit "blue", politically incorrect, and the punchline is often "bleeped." She self-describes as an "R rated Mr. Rogers for adults." It was a wonderful interview in which she, almost immediately, went from being light and funny to being unselfconsciously wise, relate-ably humble and compassionately understanding while offering a real, culturally relevant, answer to the question; "What would Jesus do?"

Someone attacked her on Twitter using vulgarity. Instead of fighting back or ignoring him, she went to his feed and found so much acting out and pain and felt like he needed a connection. So, she wrote back to him; "*I read your timeline and I see what you are doing. Your rage is very thinly veiled pain, but you know that. I know that feeling. I believe in you. See what happens when you love.*" She immediately heard back from him and they started a real conversation that she says still continues every day. Sarah said, "It didn't take anything from me to be loving to him—in fact it made me feel good. Empathy and compassion are free."

So here's what I'm thinking...In my sermon last week I quoted Karoline Lewis—"We who follow Jesus will meet God in him—we will see what God sees—the beauty and the ugliness." How is God calling us to "harness the power of anger in the work of Love?" Now I want to share from the words of a new favorite theologian of mine, Sarah Silverman; "Resist divisiveness. Take up the challenge of seeing ourselves in each other. Find someone who does not deserve your compassion and give it to them." Keep your eyes and ears and hearts open this Lent. You never know where you will find Jesus.

Action Alert on Drone Warfare from the Office of Public Witness

Drone strikes by the United States consistently violate the basic human rights of people in targeted regions of the world. Using "signature strikes," the military kills human beings without a trial--not because they are known threats, but because they fit the profile of someone who may be a threat. Civilians often are killed in the strikes, and the strikes erode the trust between the US and affected populations.

Call your senators and representatives and tell them to end the CIA's authority to carry out drone strikes.

Sample script: Hello. My name is _____, and I am a constituent from _____. As a person of faith, I believe in the dignity of each human life. The CIA's drone program lacks transparency, and results in an unacceptable level of civilian deaths. Please work to end the CIA's authority to carry out drone strikes.


