

Parish Membership: Every family and single adult to be considered active members of St. Bartholomew's Parish must be properly registered in the parish, receiving and regularly using the parish weekly donation envelopes. Only in this way can the parish issue documents attesting to parish membership and Catholic practice, e.g. a letter to be a Godparent or Sponsor. New parishioners are requested to visit the parish office.

Sick & Shut-ins: The priests are available to administer the Sacraments to those who are unable to come to Church. The Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick is part of the healing ministry of the Church, and should be received early in an illness or before a serious operation.

Baptisms: Please call the parish office to make arrangements.

Marriages: In order to provide sufficient time for the Marriage Preparation Course, please call the parish office and ask to speak with the pastor at least six months in advance of the wedding.

GOD DRAWS THE FAITHFUL TO HIS KINDGOM




How appropriate that we read this passage from Jeremiah as we approach All Saints Day and All Souls' Day. Jeremiah speaks of God gathering the faithful from the ends of the world, guiding them "so that none shall stumble" (Jeremiah 31:9). They departed in tears, but will return rejoicing. In the

same way, God draws the faithful from all the earth to the heavenly kingdom. May God console us as we reap what we have sown in tears.

The responsorial psalm echoes the passage from Jere-

miah, describing Israel's deliverance from exile. God has reversed the fortune of the faithful: "They go forth weeping...(but) shall come back rejoicing" (Psalm 126:6). In all honesty, the history of the Chosen People in the course of the Old Tes-



tament is one of many reversals of fortune, both good and bad. But they could always look forward in hope because they had faith in the Lord. This faith is mirrored in Bartimaeus, leading Jesus to tell him, "Go your way; your faith has saved you" (Mark 10:52). Faith enables us to look forward in hope.

The question that Jesus asks Bartimaeus is almost exactly the same as the one we heard Him ask James and John last week: What do you want Me to do for you?" (Mark10:36, 10:51). But whereas James and John asked for power and glory, not seeing what they were asking of Jesus, Bartimaeus, the blind man, sees Jesus for who He is and asks for healing. Granted his request, Bartimaeus immediately followed Jesus. In other words, he immediately became a disciple. Bartimaeus had been blind, but he had the eyes of faith all along.



October 28, 2018 ALL SAINTS SOLEMNITY NOVEMBER 1ST

The earliest certain observance of a feast in honor of all the saints is an



early fourth century commemoration of "all the martyrs". In the early seventh century, after successive waves of invaders plundered the catacombs, Pope Boniface IV gathered up some twenty-eight wagonloads of bones and reinterred them beneath the Pantheon, a Roman temple dedicated to all the gods. The pope rededicated the shrine as a Christian church. According to Bede, the pope intended "that the memory of all the saints might in the future be

honored in the place which had formerly been dedicated to the worship not of gods but of demons". (On the Calculation of Time).

But the rededication of the Pantheon, like the earlier commemoration of all the martyrs, occurred in May. Many Eastern Churches still honor all the saints in the spring, either during the Easter season or immediately after Pentecost.

How the Western Church came to celebrate this feast in November is a puzzle to historians. The Anglo-Saxon theologian Alcuin observed the feast on November 1 in 800, as did his friend Arno, bishop of Salzburg. Rome finally adopted that date in the ninth century.

COMMENT: This feast first honored martyrs. Later, when Christians were free to worship according to their conscience, the church acknowledged other paths to sanctity. In the early centuries the only criterion was popular acclaim, even when the bishop's approval became the final step on placing a commemoration on the calendar. The first papal canonization occurred in 993; the lengthy process now required to prove extraordinary sanctity took form in the last five hundred years. Today's feast honors the obscure as well as the famous—the saints each of us has known.
