RULES AND REGULATIONS

- Rules and regulations will be strictly adhered to.
 ENTRIES FOR PREMIUM PRIZES ARE LIMITED TO RESIDENTS OF NORTHWEST MINNESOTA
- NESOTA.
 Open Class entries in Huck Olson Arena on Wednesday, July 12 from 10 am 6 pm. Livestock entries and 4-H entries on Thursday, July 13.
- 4. Only one entry will be allowed to an exhibitor in one section on any class other than livestock, provided, however, that no animal shall be entered in more than one class except to make up herds or teams. Limited to 2 entries in each class.
- No purse will be awarded where there is no competition, unless specially recommended by the judges, and no unworthy exhibit shall be awarded a prize.
- 6. The association management will use diligence to insure the safety of livestock or articles after their arrival and placement, but under no circumstances will it be responsible for any loss, injury or damage done to, or occasioned by, or arising from any animal or articles on exhibition, and the exhibitor shall indemnify the Association management thereof against all legal or other proceedings in regard thereto.
- On receipt of entries a card will be prepared for each animal or articles, specifying the class, section, articles and number of entry, the card must remain attached to the articles during the whole period of exhibition.
- All exhibits, including livestock, shall be left on display until 5 P.M. on the last day of the fair, July 16. No ticket shall be removed from the article until that time. The Fair Association will not be responsible for exhibits or property left on the grounds after 7 P.M., Sunday, July 16.
- 9. No exhibits or coverings containing them will be admitted with the name or initial on them.
- Articles on exhibition shall not be handled except by officers of the department to which they belong.
 The board of directors reserves the right to make any changes in the premium list and in the rules and regulations that it may deem advisable.
- The interpretations of the rules and the settlement of all questions and differences that may come up in connection with the contest shall be vested in the board of directors.
- 13. The board of directors reserves the right to prorate premiums if the amount exceeds \$10,000.00.
- 14. All bills or materials borrowed for the fair must receive the O.K. of the secretary of the board of directors, otherwise the fair management will not be responsible.
- 15. All premiums and other checks issued by the Fair Association must be cashed before September 1st, so that the checks may be audited for drawing the state appropriation.
- 16. No person will be permitted to distribute advertising matter on the grounds except from their places of business or exhibit. The tacking or posting of any advertising, bills, cards, etc., other than within the spaces occupied by exhibitor, is strictly prohibited. The distribution of handbills, flyers, heralds, etc. will not, under any circumstances, be permitted. Anyone violating this rule will be liable to a fine or expulsion from the grounds, as the board may elect.
- 17. The management reserves the right to exclude from the grounds any person or persons whom it may deem undesirable, or expel from the grounds such person or persons who shall violate any rules.
- 18. Exhibitors will please bring in only the articles listed in the premium book. No special will be accepted.
- 19. The fair board has the right to accept or reject any exhibit.
- 20. The fair board reserves the right to regulate all raffles.

- LIVESTOCK
- 1. Entries in the livestock and poultry department shall be sent in by mail prior to July 5. This is necessary in order that stalls may be assigned according to the number of entries and that the fair management may know how much barn space is available. The animals must be in place on the first day of the fair.
- 2. Cattle will be shown by breeds, registered and grade will be shown together. Papers are required at entry time. No papers required for grade cattle.
- 3. Exhibitors must keep their barn and stalls open and stock uncovered between the hours of 10 A.M. and 5 P.M. during each day of the show. Exhibitors of livestock must keep their stock, stalls, and pens in good, neat condition and open for inspection from 10 A.M. to 10 P.M.
- 4. Each exhibitor of livestock must pay an entry fee of \$1.00 for each entry of cattle, 50¢ for each entry of sheep and hogs. No entry in the livestock department will be less than \$2.00.
- 5. Livestock must be bona fide property of the exhibitor at least sixty days before exhibition.
- 6. In championships, "Senior" designates cattle two years old or over; "Junior" under two years. Only first prize winners in single lots in open competition may compete for championships. Champion winners only may compete for grand championships.
- 7. 4-H club boys and girls who enter livestock in the open class will be required to pay entry fee, as herein specified.
- 8. All livestock including horses, cattle, sheep and goats will be examined by the official show veterinarian each day of the fair. Certificates for all livestock consigned from other states shall comply with the rules and regulations of the Livestock Sanitary Board for the importation of livestock into Minnesota. All animals must be free of warts, ringworm or other contagious disease. If they arrive at the show with these diseases, they will be sent home. All animals must be officially identified.
- 9. All poultry, except waterfowl and pigeons, besides being apparently healthy, must meet one of the following conditions in order to qualify for exhibition:
 - 1. Officially tested for pullorum and typhoid diseases and found negative within 90 days prior to opening or exhibition, or
 - 2. Originate directly from parent stock classified within 12 months of opening date of exhibition as U.A. Pullorum-Typhoid Clean or a comparable classification.

The exhibition must show compliance with one of the above by means of an official form issued by an authorized agent of which is recorded the result of this test, or an appropriate statement certifying to origin, together with identification of each bird by band number. All poultry must be identified by leg or wingband.

- Any livestock removed from the fairgrounds before 5:00 P.M. the last fair day, without notification of the superintendent, are subject to withholding of premium of animal taken home.
- 11. All bulls must have an extra neck tie in addition to any halter tie. No cattle are to be tied by leather show halters in stalls.
- Anyone may exhibit livestock in Pennington County whose home county allows Pennington County residents to exhibit there.
- 13. Additional classes may be added at the discretion of the Superintendent.

- RULES AND REGULATIONS Any standard breed of poultry can be entered.
- Poultry shall be free from any infections and communicable disease. 2
- 3. Poultry, with the exception of pigeons and waterfowl, must be individually identified with a leg or wing band and must: (1) have had a negative test for pullorun-typhoid disease conducted within 90 days prior to the opening date of the exhibition; or (2) if under five (5) months of age, originate directly from parent stock tested and foudn negative for pullorun-typhoid disease within the last 12 months. In addition, turkeys must be tested negative or originate directly from parent stock that is tested negative for Salmanella typhimurium, Mycoplasma gallisepticum, and Mycoplasma syniviae. Poultry must be accompanied by a testing or origination certificate approved by the board. Waterfowl and pigeons if over 5 months of age and sold at a sale must be tested for Pullorum - Typhoid within 30 days of the sale.
- Feed will be provided for poultry and they will be fed.
- Entry fees must accompany the entry in each case. Entry fee is 25 cents for each bird and 50 cents for each pen of birds.
- 6. No exhibitor may show more than 2 entries in each subdivision, nor more than a total of 20 birds in all classes
- 7. All young birds must be 2 months old.



SMALL GRAINS

UNIFORMITY - As nearly as possible, every kernel in the sample should correspond to every other kernel in size, shape and color. PURITY - A show sample should be absolutely free from (1) Seeds of other grains; (2) Weed Seeds; (3) Dirt, straw, sticks, chaff, etc. PLUMPNESS OF KERNEL - Indicated (1) Weight per bushel; (2) Yield; (3) Strength of breeding.

CLOVER

PLUMPNESS OF KERNEL - Indicates (1) Weight per in size and shape, meet favor with the judges. MIXTURE - No other seeds should be in the sample and all kinds of foreign matter (weeds, seeds, dirt, etc.) are objectionable.

COLOR - Bright cheerful lustre is preferred to dull dead color.

POTATOES

- 1. Do not wash exhibits. Brushing with a soft brush will remove the soil and leave the skin in its natural condition.







- 7. <u>Cloverbud Policies</u> When a Cloverbud shows an animal, an adult or youth leader needs to be in control of the animal at all times. When showing small pets, poultry, rabbits, etc. an adult or youth leader will handle the animal and be in control at all times.
- 8. Grievance Policy Follow Fair Board rules at the discretion of the 4-H Program Director and Superintendent.
- 9 Procedure for entering Club Projects at the fair - Please register with the Extension staff in the arena on July 16 from 9 a.m. -3 p.m. They will distribute your entry cards. If you are only exhibit-ing animals, you need to stop by and pick up your barn cards.
- 10. Exhibits will be placed in blue, red and white ribbon classes, except where stated otherwise.
- 11. Please cash all checks by August 15.

EXHIBITS

- Members may exhibit, demonstrate, or take part only in projects in which they are enrolled. All work on projects entered should be done by the 4-H member and completed during the current 4-H year unless otherwise noted.
- **Poster** exhibits <u>may not exceed</u> 22" wide x 28" high. They may be smaller. Please be aware that foam poster board is 20" x 30". It needs to be trimmed. We would also like the posters ready with something to hang it with, so we do not have to put staples through them. 2.
- Education Exhibits / Tri-Fold / Science Exhibits for all project areas, may not exceed 12" deep x 24" wide x 36" high. (Center back 24" wide x 36" high, right and left wings each 12" wide x 36" high.)

- Knowledge and ability to explain..... 50%
- 4 Oversized Exhibits/FFA Exhibits - If you are exhibiting an oversized exhibit/education display you need to fill out a county form and return it to the Extension Office by July 1. If this is done in advance you may qualify for grand/reserve ribbons and State Fair. If you are chosen for State Fair you will need to fill out an oversized exhibit form. The State Fair needs to approve it before the exhibit is allowed to the State Fair.
- 5 Floor Space for any exhibit should not exceed 20 square feet. If your exhibit exceeds this space limitation, contact the extension office.
- 6 All exhibits must be labeled with name, club and county. Other appropriate information for the project (i.e., vegetable varieties) should be included. If the exhibit has multiple pieces, <u>each part</u> needs to be labeled and should indicate 1 of 4, 2 of 4, etc.
- All exhibits will be evaluated by a conference with the judge. Blue, red and white ribbons will be awarded based on the member's knowledge of the project (50%) and on the merit of the exhibit (50%). Displays not meeting these guidelines will need permission from Extension Staff prior to exhibiting 7 in order to receive higher than a red ribbon. Decision of the judge is final and may not be appealed. Meeting exhibition requirements of the local County Fair Board/Agricultural Association and the 4-
- 8 H Youth Development Program from 4-H exhibit entry day through release time: If exhibition requirements are not met (and permission is not granted by 4-H and fair), youth will not be eligible for all show related premiums, awards, and participation in the state event. (Auction county decision.) Approved early release is an exception to the rule and becomes a 4-H staff and fair board decision based on each situation

ANIMAL SCIENCE

- All beef, dairy, dairy goat, horse, rabbit, llama, sheep and swine shown in 4-H livestock shows must have the required State 4-H ear tag and/or tattoo. Animal ID data must be submitted online, arrive in the Extension Office, or be postmarked no later than May 15 (with exception of Market Beef due Feb. 15)
- All animals exhibited must be owned solely by the member, member's family or leased by agreement. 2 The family includes the 4-H'ers parents or guardians and siblings living together as a family unit. The definition of family includes an extended family where the animals may be owned by grandparents with the 4-H'ers parents actively involved with and working on the farm. Registered animals, not leased, must be registered in the exhibitor's name and/or the exhibitor's family name. Animals owned in partnership with non-family members must be leased and follow guidelines within the lease agree-

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- 3. 4-H'ers exhibiting livestock at the County Fair **are responsible** for the care and feeding of animals they exhibit.
- 4. <u>All livestock exhibits must be pre registered</u>. Members in animal projects may exhibit one animal per class, unless stated otherwise.
- 5. All 4-H'ers exhibiting livestock at the fair are eligible to participate in showmanship. 4-H'ers must show their own animals. **Please sign up for showmanship on your fair registration.**
- All animal health regulations as stipulated by the Minnesota Board of Animal Health and County Fair Board will be in effect.
- 7. Club members may show livestock in the open classes as well as paying the entrance fee. See rules for "open class livestock."
- Showmanship grades are as follows: Junior 8th grade and below; Senior 9th grade and above.
 All grooming of livestock, include clipping, trimming and blocking (all species) must be clearly done by the exhibitor, members of the immediate family or any other registered Minnesota 4-H member. Immediate family members are defined as being parents, stepparents, legal guardians, grandparents, brothers or sisters. The 4-H'er exhibiting the animal should be present and involved in the fitting process at the fair.

LIVESTOCK HEALTH REQUIREMENTS

ALL LIVESTOCK

WARTS, RINGWORM, CONTAGIOUS DISEASES - all animals must be free of warts, ringworm or other contagious diseases to be entered in a show. If they arrive at a show with these diseases, they will be sent home.

SHEEP

<u>State Fair Requirement</u> – All breeding ewes and market ewes must have a USDA scrapie tag. Contact Lindsay at the Minnesota Board of Health 651-296-2942 – ext. 30, to get a tag. All sheep need a Premise number. Contact the MN Board of Animal Health - 651-201-6816 or www.bah.state.mn.us/bah/nais/. All commercial/crossbred breeding ewes need a 4-H ear tag. Registered ewes must have 4-H tag, tattoo or individual ID tag that matches registration papers.

HORSES

A Coggins test for Equine Infectious Anemia is required.

RABBITS AND WATERFOWL No health certificates required.

POULTRY

PULLORUM-TYPHOID - An official form to show a record of a negative test for pullorum-typhoid disease conducted within 90 days or an official form to show they originate directly from parent stock tested and found negative within 12 months.

SWINE

PSEUDORABIES - All Swine must:

- A. have a negative official psuedorsabies test conducted within 30 days prior to the opening date of the exhibition; or
- B. originate directly from a qualified psuedorabies-negative herd; or
- C. originate (born) directly from a Stage IV or V county or area. (All of Minnesota is stage IV);
- D. Need a premise number. Contact the MN Board of Animal Health 651-201-6816 or www.bah.state.mn.us/bah/nais/.

DOGS

RABIES - If over six months of age-must be accompanied by a certificate of rabies vaccination issued by a licensed veterinarian. Must also have Parvo and distemper shots.

GOAT

State Fair Requirement - All breeding goats and market goats must have a USDA scrapie tag. Contact Lindsay at the Minnesota Board of Health 651-296-2942 - ext. 30, to get a tag. All market goats need a 4-H ear tag.

STATE FAIR OR STATE SHOW ELIGIBILITY

- Trips for State Fair, State Horse Show, and State Dog Show will be selected from blue ribbon exhibits only (see State Dog Show Rules for exceptions).
 H members must be present for conference judging or videotape in advance to win a State Fair trip. Exhibit classes eligible for State Fair are marked with an asterisk *.
- 2. Members selected to represent the county at State Fair and State Horse Show **must have completed** sixth grade.
- 3. To be eligible for a livestock trip to the State Fair, 4-H'ers must have completed Quality Assurance/Ethics Training. State Policy: All youth participating at the Minnesota State Fair as a 4-H livestock exhibitor in beef, dairy, sheep, swine, poultry, rabbit or goat exhibitors must have completed a Livestock Quality Assurance and Ethics workshop. Certification is good for three Fair seasons. The level of training required is determined by the grade of the youth at the time the training takes place.
- 4. Along with their qualifying State Fair exhibit trip(s), 4-H members may participate in activities such as Share-the-Fun, demonstrations, Arts-In or judging teams.
- 5. The 4-H'er is responsible for providing transportation to and from the State Fair if their exhibit is oversized.
- 6. <u>Competitive events, deadlines, consequences and exemption options</u> Every Minnesota 4-H member is eligible for a "one-time" member exemption. This exemption provides the ability (one-time in a 4-H member's career) for the 4-H member to acknowledge they missed a 4-H deadline related to enrollment or competitive event participation and waive the consequences for the named deadline.

<u>Requirements:</u>

- **Demonstration** / **Illustrated presentations** may be related to any project that the member is enrolled in or to any area of interest or expertise the 4-Her has. Presentations may be an individual or a two-person team. Individual presentations shall not exceed 15 minutes in length and team presentations should not exceed 25 minutes in length.



- Demonstrations are an oral presentation that includes actually demonstrating the hands-on steps required to accomplish a task or process. This most often includes the use of physical objects and actual doing or showing. For example, a demonstration could involve using bedding plants, potting soil and related items to demonstrate how to plant a flower pot. At the end of the Demonstration there should be something of a "finished product." Demonstrations may also include the use of supporting visuals like posters, charts or overhead transparencies. Supporting visuals can include technology based options like presentation software (i.e. MS PowerPoint). However, the focus of the Demonstration should be on the "doing," not the supporting visuals.

- Illustrated Presentations are an oral presentation that presents an idea, concept, viewpoint or experience in an educational or informative format. For example, an Illustrated Presentation could be a report on leadership lessons learned through a trip to Washington, D.C. or an educational presentation that explores sustainable energy options. Illustrated Presentations most often consist of interaction with supporting visuals like posters, charts or overhead transparencies. Supporting visuals can include technology based options like presentation software (i.e. MS PowerPoint). Supporting visuals may include tangible items, but generally little or no activity takes place with the item.

- Youth in Action presentations are interactive, continuous presentations that are approximately 45 -50 minutes in length. Topics selected for a Youth in Action demonstration may be related to a project in which the member is enrolled or to any other area of interest or expertise the member has. Involving the audience in the process is the primary focus of Youth in Action and constitutes a major portion of the evaluation results.

- Presentation Software (i.e. MS PowerPoint) may be used for both Demonstrations and Illustrated Talks. If Presentation Software is used in a Demonstration, the presentation software should supplement the Demonstration (hands-on demonstrating should still be the basis of the entry). If used for an Illustrated Talk, the presentation software can be the basis for the entire talk; however the member must interact with the presentation and information - not just step to the side and let the presentation play. (Self-presenting entries created with presentation software should be burned on to a DVD and entered in the "Video" class.)

If presentation software is utilized, judging will include the effective use of the software. For information on effectively using visuals in presentations and/or presentation software please see http://www.mn4h.org/programs/software_presentation

Special NOTE: If presentation software is utilized in either a Demonstration or an Illustrated Talk, the 4-H'er is responsible for securing any equipment necessary for judging. Extension staff may be able to assist in this process, but it is the responsibility of the exhibitor to contact Extension staff WELL BEFORE the scheduled judging. The ideal situation is to deliver the presentation with a computer and LCD projector, but the use of transparencies and an overhead projector is also possible.

PRESENTATION SOFTWARE

Special NOTE: Entries formerly entered in the Presentation Software Contest should now be directed into one of the following classes:

Demonstration (If presentation software is used to support or enhance a Demonstration)

Illustrated Talk (If presentation software is used to present information or to communicate a message in a way that involves the 4-H'er interacting with the presentation content)

Video (If presentation or other software is used to create a self-presenting visual or multi-media presentation that does not include the live interaction of the 4-H'er - something that just "plays/presents" on its own)

If riding 2 horses, points are counted toward either games or performance classes. Points are not combined for the rider.



b) Cost of garment. Explanation of why garment was purchased and examples of ways it will be used in existing wardrobe and include inventory of wardrobe

- Garments may have been worn before showing but should be cleaned and pressed before exhibiting.

2) All labels should be visible so they can be read. Use permanent ink marker or pencil to write labels. Labels produced by a computer printer are acceptable. Ballpoint ink or non-permanent markers are not acceptable.

- The exhibit may be a poster, mobile, three-dimensional display, scrapbook, balance beam, charts, journals, pictures, slides, equipment, supplies, photographs, puppet play, skit, judging comparison, taped interview, file of ideas, research study, etc.

- Pictures, food models, plaster, plastic, papier-mâché, etc., are preferable to perishable foods in an educational exhibit. Perishable foods should be used only if they add to or help explain the educational exhibit. If perishable food is a part of the exhibit, the food is to be brought just for judging.

- Exhibits containing perishable foods, which will be discarded, must include a colored photograph of the food. The photograph should be taken prior to the County Fair and attached to the dis-play. This photograph and an $8 \times 10^{\circ}$ card listing nutrition information and the recipe will be displayed as the exhibit instead of the food. (This is optional for grades 3-5)

- All food preservation exhibits must be labeled with a 2" x 3" label. Labels to include county. name, grade, product, hot pack or cold pack, processing method (boiling water bath or pressure canner), date, processing time. Date processed & source of recipe. Pressure canned items indicated dial or weighted gauge and how many pounds of pressure used.

- Jars should be heat-tempered glass canning jars.

- All jars should be sealed. Leave screw bands on two piece jar lids. Jellies and jams should be covered with lids.

- Use pint jars for fruit, vegetables, and fish; one-half pint jars for jams and jellies; one quart jars for pickled products.

- Jellies and jams must be processed in boiling water bath according to USDA and/or University of Minnesota food preservation publications, available through the Extension Office. Note: Paraffin is not acceptable.

No artificial food coloring should be added to entries.

- Dried foods may be stored in glass jars, self-sealing plastic bags or airtight plastic bags. The quantity of dried foods should be: fruits and vegetables - 1/2 cup or more of each, herbs - 1/4 cup of each in whole leaf form, meat - 3 strips, i.e. venison or beef jerky.

- All video/filmmaking exhibits must be made by the exhibitor OR if the exhibit is made by a video/filmmaking production team, the exhibitor must be a member and must have created at least 50 percent of the finished video/film.

- Video/film must be presented on DVD, USB or flash drive or data CD.

- Video/film must include a title and credits.

- The video/film must be original material, portions from other sources must be documented and have a copyright release, including music, will not be publicly displayed unless the exhibitor has written permission from the producer to use the material in the video/film.

- The exhibitor's name, grade, club, and exhibit class must be clearly printed on all exhibit pieces.

- A computer with DVD player or USB port will be provided for viewing the video/film during the conference judging. If other equipment is needed for viewing, additional arrangements need to be made in advance.

- Video/film must be playable on Windows, use file format including .WMV, .FLV, MPEG, AVI, .MOV, .AVCHD, .MPEG-1, .MPEG-4, as well as a playable DVD.
