# San Lorenzo School

From part 1: After being mistreated at a cattle ranch, Dionisio's father hiked many days to the base of a large mountain and started the village of San Lorenzo in 1939. The village saint image deteriorated and was stolen, but why try to recover it when it couldn't even take care of itself?

In 1984, Dionisio visited Linda Vista College, where my



brother Fred Adams and his family served as missionaries, in Chiapas, Mexico. "I came out here to see if you can help us. I live 'way back in the hills. It took me six hours of hiking to get to the road, then two hours on the bus, and another walk down to this campus to get to your house. We recently started a school, and we need a piano."

My brother stood there looking at this man with clean but well-worn clothing, and questioned, "a PIANO?" "Oh yes!" replied Dionisio, his eyes sparkling. "We want our school to have the best, and I've heard that pianos are very nice for

music and to attract students." "And tell me Dionisio, HOW could you possibly get a piano to your village, if there is no way in by vehicle???"

Without hesitation, Dionisio replied "Well, how about a HELICOPTER? I've heard helicopters can do things like that . . . " So began my brother's friendship with Dionisio. This Chamula Indian peasant, living out in the middle of nowhere, speaking Spanish as a second language (Tzotzil is his native dialect) had BIG DREAMS. He wanted this school to provide a high quality Christian education to kids in his village and surrounding communities. And he wasn't just going to have a few kids pile into someone's house and that was it. NO! School buildings, and a PIANO. How did he even know what a helicopter was anyway?

Several years later my brother Fred hiked into this jungle village to check the situation out. (Exactly a month later Fred became paralyzed in a construction accident at Linda Vista). Sure



enough, a large area of jungle between San Lorenzo and the mountain had been cleared, and with much work and sweat they had built their little school.

Not only that, Dionisio had located other sources of help. How did he find them? By pursuing his dream, persevering and asking over and over. Eventually he contacted Lynden Bechtel, based at Bella Vista clinic & school where MPI originated. Lynden and a male

"WE'LL DO IT!" exclaimed Dionisio. Right away volunteers from several nearby villages cleared trees, rocks and dirt creating an uphill, and rather perilous, crude runway, at the base of that mountain. Four months later they sent out a message, "We have an airstrip for you to land your little plane now!"

# Thailand: Mien Update

If you still remember the story of Kao (Kaowa) who wanted to be baptized and whose parents and sister were so opposed, I will continue the story as we see how the Holy Spirit has been continually leading him and his sister. Naai, like her parents, was opposed to Kao's decision to be baptized. Kao related the story to me how Naai scolded him over the phone at that time he expressed his desire to follow Jesus.

She told him that the Bible is just man-made to unite the world. But God controls the entire situation. One day I got a call from Kao that his sister Naai's business in Bangkok went bankrupt and that her only son died. He drowned in a small pond near her house. He told of Naai having poor relationship with the children of her husband's first wife. So she decided to come home and stay in Nan city with her brother Kao who is teaching English in a private school there. Her life was so broken and empty. Her brother saw her crying often.

As Kao had already found true happiness in Jesus, he shared Jesus with his sister. That gave her hope, comfort, and peace. Often he read the Bible to Naai especially when she was overcome by sadness. And since Kao is good friends with the missionary volunteers team, he was able to connect with our lady missionaries Sister Ana and Elma in Huai Fai.

I remember one time when the entire missionary team came to Naai's house. The purpose was not to see her but to retrieve something that was left behind at her house on a previous trip. Before we left her house, we offered a prayer as is our practice before we part ways with people. We asked if she had something for which she would like us to pray about. She expressed her desire for a Bible study. So I asked someone to get my Bible in our car and we began studies right away! Naai also wants to learn English so her brother Kao suggested that she stay with the missionaries in Huai Fai.

We saw her English improve and saw how she has become very close to us and to her own brother Kao. She has been very helpful during our medical outreach and English camp, translating what our nurses would like to say to her fellow Miens and helping in the English camp. She cooks Thai food and joins in our daily worship. And as our outreach activities in Huai Fai came to a close we were overjoyed when she agreed to let us use her truck in hauling our stuff and team to the next village. Without her help it would have been difficult to go to Maeraem Village for the next English camp and medical outreach.

God truly works in unexpected and unimaginable ways! Could you imagine that sister Naai who was so opposed to her brother Kao's decision few months back, became very helpful to us in our

missionary work in two villages? Last night when I thanked Kao for the help he and his sister provided he said, "Do you remember that my sister

embassy. She wants to go to Australia to study English for 6 months. She and her agency were so positive that she can go to Australia but sadly she was denied! She was confused and wondered why those people who don't believe God got good things in life and why she didn't get what she wanted.

We have been calling her and sending message of encouragement and telling her that God has a better plan for her and sometimes we don't understand right away but she will in God's time. I also added that we don't love and serve God because we receive good things but because we love Him and we trust that He knows what is best for us.

However, since her agency suggested that she should re-apply, she plans to re-apply. I said pray and ask God for it but whatever the result; if it is good, we praise God. If it's not, still we praise God.

# Lewis Jungle Ministries Update

In some ways, it is hard to believe we have been here a year already, but it seems a lot longer than that since we have been with our family and friends, though.

It has been a year filled with many challenges, but so many blessings, too. I see how long it has taken others to start an airbase from the ground up and the years it has taken them and I am thankful for what the Lord has done for us in a short time.

People here have been very generous in providing lots of fresh fruit and veggies, arranged for free housing, a free airplane hanger to use while ours is being built, materials for construction, fuel, and so much more! Over a year without a paycheck, and we have not gone hungry. Those of you who have donated to the project have made it possible for us to pay the bills, as things are very expensive here!

The airplane mechanic who was planning to come work with us, is not able to come now, due to health issues. We really need a mechanic and would like to have another pilot as well. Do you know anyone who has a passion for missions and helping others? There is so much work to do here, but not enough help.

Even without the use of the plane this year, we have done several emergency medical evacuations of patients to the hospital in town. If we hadn't taken them, most in the middle of the night, over very rough and muddy roads, they would not have survived until the next day. We just took in 2 more patients this week. Toni has provided medical help to patients out here in the bush as she as been called upon. She has also been helping in the children's Bible classes and providing lots of meals to people who have helped on the construction of the hanger.

God has blessed in so many ways, and so many people have helped. The people here are so happy to have us here, and can hardly wait to see the plane in the air. When it lands here in Bewani for the first time, it will be the first plane to land here in nearly 20 years, they tell me. We have gotten the airstrip all ready and it's just awaiting the plane. Hopefully the plane will be flying on missions of mercy before the end of this year, if that is God's plan.

Thank you so much for your prayers and for being a part of our mission project in this remote part of Papua New Guinea. Bringing more souls to the Kingdom of God is our goal.
