FROM THE PASTOR:

Dear Friends in Christ,

What is the most important holiday on the Christian calendar? Many would say Christmas. Certainly, from a secular standpoint, the Baby Jesus' birth in a manger in Bethlehem has captured the imagination of those merchants who rely on the "ka-ching" of their cash registers this time of year to bolster their bottom lines. But even beyond the mercenary factor, there's the romantic nostalgia for solitude and peacefulness, the angel's proclamation: "Peace on earth, good will toward men." And even from a theological point of view, scholars today tout the Incarnation, the Word (Christ) made manifest in the Man (Jesus): "And the Word became flesh and dwelt among us, full of grace and truth" (Jn. 1:14).

There are others, though, who lobby for Pentecost as the premier Christian holiday, because it highlights the power of the Holy Spirit active in our lives today and in the life of the Church. Even Jesus could say to His disciples the night before He was crucified, "Truly, truly, I say to you, he who believes in me will also do the works that I do; and greater works than these will he do because I go to the Father" (Jn. 14:12). This will happen when the earthly Jesus, Who had been the focal point of His disciples' attention, leaves the scene and opens up the possibility of His Spirit energizing these disciples to go out into all the world to spread the Good News of His resurrection. What could be more important for an evangelizing Church than the power of Pentecost bringing repentance of sins and the promise of New Life?

So, the case has been made for the prominence of both Christmas and Pentecost for preeminence as the most important Christian holiday. But what of that other great festival of the Church year? What of Good Friday/Easter? Because we do treat both as two sides of the same coin, the great Paschal Mystery of Jesus' death and resurrection. St. Paul reminded the congregation he had founded in Corinth that he ". . . decided to know nothing among you except Jesus Christ and him crucified" (1 Cor. 2:2). It's at the cross that the enfleshed God-Man, Jesus Christ, penetrated to the very core of the sinful human condition by identifying with us in our mortality, the fact that one day all of us must die. God's raising Jesus from the dead, then, put's God's final seal of approval on Jesus' sacrifice of Himself for all our sakes. Because Jesus lives, we, too, shall live eternally in solidarity with the Triune God—Father, Son, and Holy Spirit.

So, this Christmas, let us join Mary as she ". . . kept all these things, pondering them in her heart" (Lk. 2:19), and let us never forget the prophetic words of Simeon there in the temple eight days later when he spoke directly to her: "Behold, this child is set for the fall and rising of many in Israel, and for a sign that is spoken against (and a sword will pierce through your own soul also)" (Lk. 2:34-35).

May the joy and solemnity of Christmas permeate your lives in these troubled times with the hope of better days ahead and the fullness of Christ's life lived out within our own.



FOOD PANTRY:

Our church is the distribution site for the Schuylkill Valley Food Pantry. It is a monthly distribution done on the third Saturday of each month, from 9:00 to 11:00 a.m. There is an income guideline and a registration form to fill out, giving us your name and address as well as the number of family members in your household. Also, there are brochures and information available on heating assistance, ways to conserve energy and general concerns of limited income families. Please contact the church for further information.
