Help for the Business End of the Music Industry

IBMA and SPBGMA are the organizations that make Bluegrass and or Acoustic Music a top priority in America and abroad. If you are not familiar with these groups, I highly suggest you look them up on your computer, or your children or grandchildren's computer. When the musicians you love to listen to on recordings, radio, internet, or LP's (which are making a nostalgic comeback) need help with the business end of the music industry, public relations, booking, videos, legal advice, insurance advice, and of course sourcing other musicians, it's where they go.

The larger of the two organizations, IBMA is the International Bluegrass Music Association celebrating the genre at its convention annually in October in Raleigh, NC, and promoting Bluegrass music around the world. Business meetings, open forums, numerous showcase events promoting performers and bands plus concerts and an award show fill the convention center. And the whole city becomes a 'parking lot pickin' venue as the sounds of Bluegrass fill the air!

SPBGMA, which stands for Society for the Preservation of BlueGrass Music America, holds its convention the first weekend of February in Nashville, TN. Most hotel rooms are booked up already so forget it unless you own an RV that can tow a dingy to drive into town (via the river). Concerts performances, award shows and plenty of pickin' will fill the Sheraton Music City Hotel.

Whatever your feelings are for Bluegrass Music, it is good to know that the future of the genre, or the "Art of Acoustic Music", is in the hands of ever wiser and more professional men and women. The early days of "every musician for him/herself" have gone by the wayside. Because of contracts, litigation, insurance, travel expenses, taxes, and, last but not least, the number of venues that may or may not be on the up and up, knowledge is king. Just because somebody wants to have a Bluegrass Festival does not mean the check will cash at the end of the show. Ask some of the old timers still in the business if they've ever been stiffed.....and be prepared to hear some of the horror stories that will give you the chills.

If you ever get the urge to attend one or both of these conventions, get reservations early and allow for having fun at a cost. That said, I don't believe you will be disappointed. I have never met anyone in Bluegrass Music that I didn't like.

Importantly and less costly, please attend the local Bluegrass Music events, renew your membership in NKBMA, check our websites and those of our member bands, come to our jams and concerts, meet nice people, tap your foot and donate your time and money to help us keep the genre alive in the Tri-state area. We need more of you to become involved by becoming members, a board member or volunteer to help with and plan future events.

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# INTERNATIONAL BLUEGRASS MUSIC MUSEUM and HALL OF FAME

International Bluegrass Music Museum & Hall of Fame

Located in beautiful Owensboro, KY is intended to be the world center for the presentation of the history, culture, and future of bluegrass

music. Its mission is to gather, preserve, exhibit and disseminate artifacts, history, collections and performance art of the global history of bluegrass music via educational experiences for the visitor.

The current museum (entrance pictured above) is in rented quarters and not large enough to house the growing collection of artifacts and exhibits. A new International Bluegrass Music Center will be located at the center of an \$80 million new waterfront park with glittering fountains and gorgeous public spaces and festival venue fronting on the Ohio River. Ground-breaking ceremonies on the new facility took place last summer and opening is projected for Spring of 2018.

The new location is next door to two new hotels and a new convention center. In short, the new Bluegrass Center will be the focal point of the City enjoying the City's support in the form of free rent for 99 years. Owensboro residents have raised \$5 million toward the cost of building the new museum which will be 2x larger than the existing facility.

The only full-scale Bluegrass music museum in the world, the new facility will have far more exhibit space, a 500 seat concert hall, an outdoor concert area for 2000, an expansive gift shop, an international hall, a research library, teaching rooms and rooftop restaurant overlooking the Banks of the Ohio.....

### Rabbit Hash General Store Rebuild Update

ALMOST DONE! The rebirth of the 185 yr old landmark is well ahead of schedule. It burned to the floor last February but the exterior looks much the same as it did before the fire. The architect hired for the rebuild promised to hold true to the old design retaining as many old building quirks as possible.

First, the floor was restored, then new walls, new ceiling beams and finally the roof. Residents and volunteers had worked hard clearing the debris from the fire salvaging as many items and wood from the old building as they could. Some folks donated old lumber from barns and an old house for use in the rebuild so the 'new' old store would have the look and feel of the original historical landmark. Others including the Shaker Village of Pleasant Hill down in Harrodsburg, KY, donated artifacts to help recreate that 1831 look and feel to the store.

A new fire suppression system and new electrical wiring have been installed. Workers and volunteers were allowed to create a 'time capsule' of artwork on the interior side of the exterior walls which are now sealed away behind the interior walls. Windows and doors have been installed, interior door and window trim installed. The old store front sign has been replicated and installed as seen in the photo on the right.

The right shed room has been restored and painted. A new walk-in cooler has been installed and two long counters and the store shelving are being installed using the same old craftsmanship and vintage materials

Workers are pushing hard for a February 13<sup>th</sup> reopening of the store – one year to the day it burned. That may be pushing it too hard, but the store will be open in the next month. Watch their FB and website pages for updates as the opening date is finalized.

Page and other fund raisers, \$51,000 has been raised to assist in the project. Duke Energy, owners of the East End Power Plant just down river from Rabbit Hash donated an additional \$25,000 citing the fact that the town and store are favorites of the 100+ workers employed locally. Don Clare president of the Historical Society says insurance will cover \$60,000 of the rebuild costs as well. The efforts of all, use of old woods and adhering to the original design will allow the General Store to keep it's historic designation.

January 2017 -Willis Music, Florence The Po' Ramblin' Boys took the stage and kicked off 2017 with the some of the best, tightest, hard-driving traditional bluegrass to ever come from the Willis stage! Add to that their humorous antics and high energy presentation and you can see why they have delighted audiences everywhere they perform.

The first to take the stage was Jasper Lorentzen who, with hat, is as tall as the standup bass he plays. His hard driving bass pounds like a jackhammer as he provides the foundation for the band's driving sound. Not only is he a master of the instrument but he is one of the most lively bass players I have ever seen.

Second to take the stage was Jereme Brown, a fourth generation banjo player, who provides vocals and Ralph Stanley style banjo skillfully knowing when to play and importantly....when not to play. More high energy when needed.

Next was Josh Rinkel whose guitar had a slogan 'Keep It Lonesome!' On the front. His high energy guitar playing matched the hard driving tempo of the bass and his vocals complemented the mix.

Last to the stage was the band's lead singer and mandolin player, C.J. Lewandowski. MC for the group he says, "We want to be known for keeping the old music alive, and making some new music that's still close to the roots....we are just trying to keep those roots alive...complement and not take away"

To honor some of those roots, the band called 'Dad' Tommy Brown to the stage to sing a couple of songs with them. When Tommy is in the house the jokes always fly and Gene Thompson, long-time friend of Tommy's, got drawn into the fun. It was a night of great music and fun as they entertained a packed house. #### Tom Bushelman Sr.



On November 25<sup>th</sup> we lost another one of our friends and fellow musicians. For those that didn't know him, let me share some of Tom's rich Story with you.

As noted in a previous article (see Northern Grass August 2015) Tom Bushelman, Sr. was one of the early contributors to our rich bluegrass heritage in Northern Kentucky. His photo collection and stories of the early days of bluegrass were legendary.

Tom was a mentor to many of us in the late 80s and 90s sharing his experiences, playing with some of the local bands and sharing his love for the music of Monroe and Scruggs. He played guitar, banjo, dobro and bass. Some of his children learned to play fiddle, banjo, guitar and dobro.

While I was producing television coverage of local events, Tom taught me how to read the body language of bluegrass bands, anticipate the next instrument to take a break and switch camera shots in time to get close up shots of the musician's skills showing hands and fret boards. And it must be said he is solely to blame for my involvement in this great genre.

Tom dabbled in lutherie creating a basement full of instruments with a twist; a guitar with a 5-string banjo neck, a banjo made from a stainless steel bedpan, a guitar with a toilet seat around the sound hole (his sitar), a 12-string dobro.....you get the point? His humor was unique. And never agreeing with the 'experts' regarding the resonator and importance of wood and sound holes and such, he created the famous 'popsicle stick' dobro pictured above with rich tones proving them wrong. Now displayed in a glass case in

the living room it bears the signatures of many of the genre's greatest artists.

Our friend, Steve Martin, made the following post to Facebook when he learned of Tom's passing:

'We met maybe mid 70's. Our families had married into each other. At some gathering...we discovered we both loved and played bluegrass. We sneaked out of that gathering and began what was to become a decades long sharing of song and stories and laughs. Today, at home with his best dog by his side...and the absolute love of his life...close by, this life friend who surprised me with this hand made neck with all hand cut inlay attached to a '23 Gibson...passed through to the next scene. Always his way...Later on down the road.'

Tom always enjoyed a good jam session. He always grinned as I tried to sing a traditional bluegrass song in my old folk singer style voice and encouraged me to get the rhythms and timing right. He tried to teach me banjo but my wife couldn't handle that! Switching to the bass, he showed me the basics helping me learn the nuances of playing bluegrass bass.

Tom is survived by his wife, Rita, three daughters, Brenda, Susan, Sheri, and son, Tom Jr. And numerous grandchildren. The legacy he leaves behind is rich in music, humor and a point of view unique to him. I consider myself most fortunate to have known him and call him friend. He will be missed......


