→ From the Pastor →

"He healed the darkness of my mind the day he gave my sight to me. It was not sin that made me blind. It was no sinner made me see."

"He Healed The Darkness of My Mind" Gregory Dale Schultz, composer

Much of the music that the choir director, Bethyn Boni, chooses for the choir to sing is moving. I found that particularly true of this piece that we sang during Lent. It is based on the story of Bartimaeus in Mark 10:46-52. Bartimaeus was a man who was born blind. At that time, people believed that such an infirmity was caused by sin, hence the first verse of this piece of music. The music reflects Bartimaeus' journey from a faithless beggar on the street to a sighted man filled with faith. The words, the music, take us through his journey, one that would pit him against the religious

authorities of the day. He would confront them, and proclaim his faith clearly and simply: "I once was blind, but now I see." He was healed; he was made whole, by the touch of Jesus. An entirely new world was opened to him. He looked at that world through the eyes of faith.



This song, and its Biblical basis, made me think. How do we see the world? With what eyes do we look around us? Bartimaeus had his eyes opened; he went from darkness to light. When that light was revealed, he knew who had given him that gift. It was from Jesus, the Son of God. He was not afraid to proclaim either his new vision or its giver. We have never known the darkness of the blind. Light, and the ability to see it, is something we take for granted. But, put yourself in Bartimaeus' place for a moment. When the light was revealed to him, he rejoiced not only in the gift, but in the giver. The gift of light also became the gift of faith. We take the light for granted. Do we do the same with our faith? Can

we look at our world through eyes of faith? Can we see it, and those that occupy it, as creations of God? How would altering our thoughts to follow this line of thinking change the way we view the beauty around us?

As I write this, the evidence of spring is all around. It seems that overnight the grass has gone from brown to green and the trees are budding. Daffodils and crocuses are blooming, and there are birdsongs that were not present during the winter. New life is taking hold. This is God's doing, the Creator of Heaven and Earth. New life comes to the natural world through Him. New life is also offered to us. Let us embrace it as Bartimaeus did, and not be afraid to proclaim and worship its author: God and His Son, Jesus Christ.

Amazon synopsis:

The morning of January 12, 1888, was unusually mild, following a punishing cold spell. It was warm enough for the homesteaders of the Dakota Territory to venture out again, and for



their children to return to school without their heavy coats—leaving them unprepared when disaster struck. At the hour when most prairie schools were letting out for the day, a terrifying, fast-moving blizzard blew in without warning. Schoolteachers as young as sixteen were suddenly faced with life and death decisions: Keep the children inside, to risk freezing to death when fuel ran out, or send them home, praying they wouldn't get lost in the storm?

Based on actual oral histories of survivors, this gripping novel follows the stories of Raina and Gerda Olsen, two sisters, both schoolteachers—one becomes a hero of the storm and the other finds herself ostracized in the aftermath. It's also the story of Anette Pedersen, a servant girl whose miraculous survival serves as a turning point in her life and touches the heart of Gavin Woodson, a newspaperman seeking redemption. It was Woodson and others like

him who wrote the embellished news stories that lured northern European immigrants across the sea to settle a pitiless land. Boosters needed them to settle territories into states, and they didn't care what lies they told these families to get them there—or whose land it originally was.

At its heart, this is a story of courage, of children forced to grow up too soon, tied to the land because of their parents' choices. It is a story of love taking root in the hard prairie ground, and of families being torn asunder by a ferocious storm that is little remembered today—because so many of its victims were immigrants to this country.


