

While I enjoyed the time spent at the mansion with the curators very much, I must admit the task was less than fun. When confronted with space for about 45 pieces from about 400 entries there is no choice but to put excellent work in the "not accepted" pile. I congratulate all the accepted artists on their achievement and encourage all participants to keep participating, keep working on your work. How does one judge Art?

There are criteria: accomplished, well crafted, inspiring, insightful, well designed, unique. There are variables: large, small, graphic, atmospheric, realistic, abstract, three dimensional, traditional, digital. There are difficulties: evaluating work from a reproduction. But when viewing the actual work in the gallery to choose the award winners, what is ultimately distilled is an emotional reaction to a thing, a gut feeling of rightness coupled with some kind of surprise. In many cases here I chose pieces that inspire a question or a closer look, asking for the






