The first reading for the celebration of All Saints' Day is from Revelation 7:9-17. It's a fitting text for All Saints' Day as it describes heaven with the Saints' around the throne of God. See the Words written by St. John, "Then one of the elders addressed me, saying, 'Who are these, clothed in white robes, and from where have they come?' I said to him, 'Sir, you know.' And he said to me, 'These are the ones coming out of the great tribulation. They have washed their robes and made them white in the blood of the Lamb.' 'Therefore they are before the throne of God, and serve him day and night in his temple;




and he who sits on the throne will shelter them with his presence. They shall hunger no more, neither thirst anymore; the sun shall not strike them, nor any scorching heat. For the Lamb in the midst of the throne will be their shepherd, and he will guide them to springs of living water, and God will wipe away every tear from their eyes." (Revelation 7:13-17).

The language of St. John's text is one of hope for us saints here on earth. For we too, like the saints who have gone before us, wear white robes, washed in the blood of the Lamb, our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ. In the font, we became saints whose sins were forgiven and who now wear the mark of the cross upon our forehead and our hearts. In the blood that Jesus shed for us on the cross, we are made new, sainted, promised that when we too, like the saints before us, fall asleep in Jesus, that we will be with our God who guides us to springs of living water, who will wipe away every tear from our eyes. Thanks be to God for His promises to us. What joy there is in knowing that someday, when our frail flesh lays in the grave, that we will be with our loved ones again, gathered around the throne of our Good Shepherd, partaking of His Divine Holy Supper for us in the marriage feast of the Lamb that is still to come. DID YOU KNOW?

The earliest official reference to using "Taps" at a military funeral is described in an 1891 manual. During the Civil War, a Union soldier "was buried at a time when the battery occupied an advanced position concealed in the woods." Because it wasn't safe to fire the customary three volleys over the grave, Captain John Tidball decided the sounding of "Taps" would be an appropriate substitute ceremony.

We had class from 8am to noon every week day from June to August. Even with that much class time, wrapping my brain around a whole new language was very exhausting. It has paid off however this semester as we have been going through the Old Testament Prophets and are about to start going through the first five books of the Old Testament starting at Genesis. When you think "Lutheran," do you think joy? When you tell your neighbors and friends that you are a Lutheran, do they say that Lutherans are joyful people? When you go to worship on Sunday morning, do you go in joy, listen in joy, sing in joy and leave with joy?

"Rejoice always" (1 Thess. 5:16). That is the whole verse — easy to memorize. Rejoice. Always. Because God loves you. Because Jesus died and rose for you. Because the Spirit has called you by the Gospel into this saving faith. Because God is faithful to His promises, and He will surely do it (1 Thess. 5:24).

"Joy:fully Lutheran" is the theme for The Lutheran Church—Missouri <u>Synod</u> through the 2019 Synodical Convention. Joyfully Lutheran, we live in response to God's love for us in the death and resurrection of Jesus. We live joyfully, because God's love is freely given to sinners through faith for Christ's sake. We live joyfully, because we do not work to earn God's love and forgiveness but receive it by faith alone in what Christ has done for us.

Joyfully, we receive God's Word and Sacraments as His means through which He gives to His children His love and mercy in Christ. We live joyfully, because though we cannot believe by our own reason or strength, the Holy Spirit has called us by the Gospel, enlightens us with His gifts, sanctifies and keeps us in the one true faith in Christ Jesus. We live joyfully, because the Father invites us to pray to Him as children talk to their dear father. We live joyfully, because Jesus has done it all for us.

Our joy is not generic joy. We are not just happy people. We are joyfully Lutheran. We live our lives trusting in the mercy and love of God. Our Savior suffered for us, and we know that our lives also will be filled with trials and suffering, yet we live in joy.

Joy does not mean that we ignore the realities of our lives. Faith in Christ does not remove us from the trials and temptations that befall people in this life. Faith in Christ does not mean that we cannot suffer or sin. Faith in Christ points us to the hope we have in the midst of the difficulties of this life. And Christ is our joy.

The cross is the most prominent symbol of Christianity. We proclaim the Lord's death until He comes. With our Lord, we know that suffering and pain is inherent in our lives as we dwell in this sinful world. With our Lord, we do not expect sinners to embrace the Kingdom, but trust that it is through suffering and death that the Kingdom comes among us. With the Lord, we bear our own crosses and rejoice in the will of the loving Father, even when it seems hidden from our view.

The Christ on the cross is the Christ who conquered death and the grave. We rejoice, because our sins have been removed from us. We rejoice that death no longer has the final word over our

lives. We rejoice that our Savior is coming again. We rejoice in the promises of life with Him forever. We rejoice that He is with us in His Word, Sacraments and Church.



Frederick Harold Schmick, Sr., 91, passed away on Thursday, November 1, 2018 at University of Maryland Medical System at Easton. He was born on February 5, 1927 in Preston, Maryland the son of the late John T. and Elsie E. Goehringer Schmick. After graduation from Preston High School he served in the US Navy for two years. He graduated from the University of Maryland in 1960 earning a BS Degree in Industrial Arts Education.

He began farming at Spring Garden Farms in 1952 the year he married Jeanette Isler. He farmed for 40 years growing vegetable crops and small grains. He was known for the delicious cantaloupes, honeydews, and watermelons he grew. He also was a member of the Board of Directors of Provident State Bank for 22 years. He enjoyed gardening, traveling, and playing bridge.

He was a lifelong member of Immanuel Lutheran Church in Preston where he taught Sunday school for over 20 years, served on the church council and was congregational president for 15 years.

He was an active member of the Maryland Farm Bureau, past member of the Preston Lions Club. He also served as a member of the Board of Directors of Choptank Community Health Systems for 14 years.

Fred is survived by his wife of 65 years, Jeanette Schmick, whom he married on November 22, 1952, three children, Frederick Schmick, Jr. (Patricia), Carol Trice (Jeff), Ruth S. Thomas (Dale), four grandchildren, Jordan Glover (Joshua), Rebekah Trice, Sarah Trice, Kathryn Trice, Charles Fry (Kimberly), William Fry, Dylan Vickers (Meghan), and great-grandchildren, Aireal and Dax Vickers, and a brother, Victor L. Schmick (Betty). He was preceded in death by siblings, Leona Wrightson, Kenneth Schmick, John Schmick, Jr., Edna Warren, and Betty Shirey.

From Our Kitchen To Yours...

Recipe Grandmother's Devil's Food Chocolate Cake and Icing

<mark>2</mark> cups flour, 1 tsp. salt, 1 tsp baking powder, 2 tsp baking soda, 3/4 cup unsweetened cocoa, 2 cups sugar, 1 cup veg. oil, 1 cup hot coffee, 1 cup milk, 2 eggs, 1 tsp vanilla extract

Prepare:Sift together dry ingred. in mixing bowl. Add oil, coffee, and milk, mix at med. speed for 2 min. Add eggs and vanilla, beat 2 more min. Batter will be thin. Pour into 2 greased and floured 9" x1 1/2" cake pan. Bake at 325 for 25-30 min. Cool cake 15 min before removing from pan. Cool on wire racks. When completely cool then add icing.

Icing: 2 cups sugar, 1 cup can milk, and 1 butter (size of walnut)

Prepare: In sauce pan cook until forms a bubble in water. Then beat with spoon off heat until becomes thick. Immediately pour on cake.



This icing tends to run off the cake and if cooked to perfect texture, once it cools it will have a "crackling texture". However, mine is usually sticky but still tastes good. I am not sure I have ever gotten it to look or be like Mommom's but I keep trying. My dad's birthday was in December and this was his mom's recipe. It is still a favorite for everyone in our family (especially Richardson side).





Potatoes; 2 tbsp butter; 1 onion & 1 stalk of celery chopped; 1 tbsp chopped parsley; 4 slices of bread; 1 egg, 1 cup of milk; 2 tsp salt & dash pepper.

Peal potatoes and boil in salted water until soft. Meanwhile, cook chopped onions & celery in butter until soft. Cube bread in small pieces. When potatoes are cooked, mash. Add onion, celery, bread, 1/2 cup milk, salt, pepper, parsley. Beat until smooth and then add egg and remaining milk. Beat again. Turn into a greased casserole, dot with butter and bake 1 hour at 350 degrees .

Taste and see that the Cord is good! PSALM 34:8

"Being from Berks County, Pa. (which is next to Lancaster County) this is my favorite recipe for the holidays instead of plain mashed potatoes. It is an old Pennsylvania dutch recipe."

Combine all fruits into a large mixing bowl, with marshmallows and cashews.

In a separate bowl add cool whip and pistachio pudding mix. Once all combined add cool whip and pistachio mix to the fruit mixture. Keep cold in fridge till ready to serve. Enjoy!
