It is open to all...people of all faiths or no faith. Fortunately, abortion, like all sins, is forgivable; and forgiveness is as close as the nearest confessional. This being said, as pastor of God's precious flock and wishing none of those entrusted to me become lost I must note if a political candidate supports abortion, it would not be morally permissible for you to vote for that person. Abortion is a "disqualifying issue." A disqualifying issue is one which is of such gravity and importance that it allows for no political maneuvering. It is an issue that strikes at the heart of the human person and is non-negotiable. A disqualifying issue is one of such enormity that by itself renders a candidate for office unacceptable regardless of his position on other matters. You must sacrifice your feelings on other issues because you know that you cannot participate in any way in an approval of a violent and evil violation of basic human rights. A candidate for office who supports abortion rights has disqualified himself as a person that you can vote for. This is likely upsetting for some to hear but God's love for humanity at times strikes to the heart of the listener. In the words of Jesus, "Whoever has ears ought to hear."

Welcome to the 2020-2021 Parish School of Religious Education program (PSR)! This year we will be offering classes for those seeking the sacraments of First Holy Communion and Confirmation.

Parents – As Catholics entrusted with the blessing of children, you have been granted the responsibility to carry out God's command to spread the Good News both in your homes and throughout the world. By enrolling your child(ren) in PSR, in corporation with the Church and our dedicated teachers, your child(ren) will be given tools in order to advance and follow God's evangelical message.

In PSR, our religious instruction strives to form children who will become life-long devoted Catholics, confident Our Lord is always a constant presence in their lives. With this religious opportunity, they will become enthusiastic Catholics, passionate as they grow from children to adults, secure in the knowledge of the saving grace of their personal Catholicism.

Students – Our instructors promise classes that are faith-filled, fun-filled, and a weekly celebration of community through the teachings of Our Lord, Jesus Christ!

It is expected that students and parents attend Mass each weekend as part of our Catholic obligation. This is where we have the opportunity to come together as a community to share our beliefs and become the followers of Christ we are called to be by our Baptism. It is a fantastic way to "teach without words!"

IMPORTANT! First Reconciliation, First Holy Communion and Confirmation REQUIRE two years of Sacramental Preparation. Absences of more than THREE (3) classes could prevent the student from receiving the Sacrament. Therefore, class attendance must be a weekly priority!

Classes will be held Sunday mornings with mass following at St. Joseph's. A tentative schedule is attached.

In case of inclement weather, PSR will follow the St. Joseph/Sacred Heart closing schedule. If the weather becomes inclement during the day, parents will be notified via e-mail, text, and on their parish Facebook pages.

Please register no later than Fri. Oct 2nd. Registration forms are available at the back of the Church, can be picked up at each Parish office, or accessed via the Parish website. Cost is \$25 per student.



"Facing Fear with Faith"

"Take courage, it is I, do not be afraid" (Mt 14:27).

You may remember these words from only a few weeks ago, taken from the Gospel for the 19th Sunday in Ordinary time. We heard of the Lord who, amidst a raging storm, came walking on the water, approaching the disciples who were in the boat. His message to them in the midst of the storm, is his message to us in the storm of this moment, indeed of these months.

It was just about one year ago in this column that I reflected on another passage from Matthew's

Gospel, remember? That one too was about a storm, and we were in the midst of the storm of the reported abuse and harassment of now former Cardinal Theodore McCarrick, the release of the Pennsylvania Grand Jury Report on the sexual abuse of minors, and the failure of some bishops to protect children.

Last year, I shared a well-known painting, Rembrandt's "Storm on the Sea of Galilee," and reflected on what a powerful image it was, with the reassurance that "Christ is in the Boat!"

Now, one year later, I'm sharing a lesser known image by a little known artist, of this other storm recounted by Matthew. This time, Jesus is not in the boat, but walking on the water toward the disciples. We're told when they saw him, they were terrified and cried out in fear.

The disciples were afraid! We are afraid: afraid of drowning in the polarizing messages of the media; afraid for ourselves or for our loved ones of getting sick or dying; afraid of the results of the upcoming election; afraid of the direction so many seem to be going; afraid of the increased violence and anarchy; afraid for our children and the reopening of school; afraid of going back to attend Sunday Mass; afraid of wearing or not wearing masks; afraid of so many things!



This summer, the fear of Covid-19 hit close to home as I had traveled to the Philadelphia area for some vacation time with family and friends. Soon after I arrived, I was informed that I had been exposed to someone who had tested positive, was to get tested myself, and needed to "self-quarantine." My vacation became isolation. I never got to see or visit with family or friends. Only after eight days did the

results come back that I had tested negative. I experienced fear for myself and for those with whom I had come in contact. The fear was real. I came to understand more deeply the fear of so many of our faithful. But I found the only antidote to the fear was faith: faith that the Lord was in charge, faith that His will would be done, and faith that he would provide whatever grace I needed to confront whatever was to come.

These days, Jesus comes to us in the midst of the storm as he did to his first disciples, and offers this powerful word: "Take courage, it is I, do not be afraid."

Peter made bold to tell the Lord "If it is you, command me to come to you on the water." But once Peter saw how strong the wind was he became frightened and, beginning to sink, cried out "Lord, save me!" Today, realizing how paralyzing is the fear all around us, we might feel like we're sinking, but we take courage in the one who can save us, and we cry out with Peter "Lord, save me!"

On my Facebook page post in which I reflected briefly on this Gospel passage, someone left this insightful comment referring to Jesus: "He offered not only his word but he offered his hand to Peter. I will grab it and hold on for this scary ride."

The winds are strong and the storm has been raging, the Coronavirus, painful staff reductions, the loss of jobs, the inability to gather together, so many cancelled events, and now, the horrible crimes

leading to the arrest of one of our priests that have once again outraged and grieved us. The storm is raging. When we were in the midst of some storm in life, my Dad would often counsel us: "just be sure to keep your nose above the water line!"

Once Jesus stretched out his hand and caught Peter, he said to him "O you of little faith, why did you

doubt?" Jesus desires us to face our fears with faith, faith in him which overcomes our doubts.

There's another image I want to share with you from the perspective of Peter who, looking up from under the water, vaguely sees the figure of Jesus, and a strong hand and arm plunged into the water ready to pull him up! Jesus questioned Peter's faith, but he saved him. In the midst of all the storms raging around us, we need to ask ourselves whether we are concentrating on how strong the winds are, whether our attention is

turned to being frightened by all that is around us, or whether we're keeping eyes fixed on Christ, seeing his strong hand and arm plunged through the wind swept waters ready to pull us up, and whether we're reaching out to him with confidence. We can face fear with faith, or with doubt. Together, let's face our fears with faith.

These days, don't focus on the storms but on Christ Jesus, and with deep faith hear him say: "Take courage, it is I, do not be afraid."

CONSCIENCE AND THE CATHOLIC VOTER – 2ND OF 8

"In the Catholic tradition, responsible citizenship is a virtue, and participation in political life is a moral obligation."
- Forming Consciences for Faithful Citizenship, 13

Since participation in political life is a moral obligation, Catholics need to form their conscience with the mind and heart of the Church on issues of consequence. This outline is the second of eight, which will examine important moral and political issues. This second outline will provide an overview of the issue of abortion.

Abortion

Every single human life is valuable and possesses a dignity beyond our imagination. As 4th century Church Father St. Gregory of Nyssa wrote:

God did not make the heavens in his image, nor the moon, the sun, the beauty of the stars, nor anything else which you can see... You alone are made in the image and likeness of that nature which surpasses all understanding... Nothing in all creation can equal your grandeur. (Kyriaki FitzGerald, Persons in Communion, p. 72)

This is why the Church has unequivocally taught that abortion is an intrinsic evil, which must be opposed. It violates the sixth commandment of 'thou shalt not kill' as it destroys an innocent human life. No circumstance warrants any person, let alone a mother of a child, to end the life of another human person. This is why Archbishop Jose Gomez, President of the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops (USCCB) once remarked,

Abortion is not a "Catholic" issue. It is a matter of fundamental human rights. In fact, I believe it is the foundational issue of our time. Because it is so important, the church has spoken clearly about it and believes it is an essential aspect of the Catholic faith. (Today's Catholic, Newspaper of the Archdiocese of San Antonio, 10 October 2008)

Because the opposition to abortion is an essential aspect of the Catholic faith, Catholics cannot support politicians who advocate for abortion or 'abortion rights.' While this does not mean Catholics should only care about the abortion issue, it does mean Catholics cannot excuse or dismiss this grave error in judgment concerning politicians political positioning on this issue. As the USCCB has written:

Any politics of human dignity must seriously address issues of racism, poverty, hunger, employment, education, housing, and health care ... But being 'right' in such matters can never excuse a wrong choice regarding direct attacks on innocent human life. Indeed, the failure to protect and defend life in its most vulnerable stages renders suspect any claims to the 'rightness' of positions in other matters affecting the poorest and least powerful of the human community. If we understand the human person as the 'temple of the Holy Spirit' — the living house of God — then these latter issues fall logically into place as the crossbeams and walls of that house. All direct attacks on innocent human life, such as abortion and euthanasia, strike at the house's foundation. These directly and immediately violate the human person's most fundamental right — the right to life. Neglect of these issues is the equivalent of building our house on sand. Such attacks cannot help but lull the social conscience in ways ultimately destructive of other human rights. (1998 Pastoral Letter of the USCCB, Living the Gospel of Life, 22)

In summation, abortion is not just one issue among many. It is the human rights issue of our time and the preeminent issue of life and importance in this election. As Catholics, it is our duty to protect the most fundamental right of the human person: the right to life. The intentional destruction of innocent human life is intrinsically evil. It must always be opposed.
