In March the Palestine "Call" committee will probably begin to interview candidates. And, as the Spirit moves, there will come the day when the congregation will vote to issue a "call" for a Pastor to come and proclaim the word as well as administer the sacraments. In the Lutheran church we value this notion of "calling" but as we continue down the path of welcoming a new Pastor it is important to understand that we also value the "priesthood of all believers." In other words, "CONSIDER YOUR CALL!"

Consider your call as one baptized, filled with the Spirit, and sent to serve. Just as the Pastor has certain responsibilities and a "flock", so do you! Perhaps that flock is your family, perhaps that flock involves the people living next door to you? Perhaps those flocks are children who gather at Palestine or the children who gather in the school or playground? Perhaps that flock involves one who has wandered off and in need desperately of someone who will seek and find? Consider your call!

The Lenten midweek worship begins on Ash Wednesday, March 5th with worship at 7:00 p.m. Then on March 12th, 19th, 26, April 2, and April 9 we will have a soup supper beginning at 5:30 followed by worship at 7:00. The Pastors of Nazareth in Cambridge, Bethlehem in Slater, St. John in Madrid, as well as the chaplain of Madrid Homes and the Youth director of Fjeldberg will be taking turns as guest preachers under the theme, "Consider your call." I will be joining in this as well as a guest preacher in those communities of faith. We will be speaking about "calling" and our hope is that in our messages there will be an encouragement to be salt and light as followers of Jesus sent into the world. This Lenten season, let's make a special effort to join together in worship as we move toward the celebration of Easter!

In Good Company: Stories of Biblical Women September 2013-May 2014

Session 6: **Woman of Endor, a Seer and Communicator**

Theme verse And Jephthah made a vow to the Lord, and said, "If you will give the Ammonites into my hand then whoever comes out of the doors of my house to meet me, when I return victorious from the Ammonites, shall be the Lord's, to be offered up by me as a burnt offering.

Judges 11:30-31

Overview: Let's call her Daughter, because she needs a name. Daughter, a young woman, retreats to the mountains with her female companions when her life is put in Jeopardy by an oath her father made to God. She waves good-bye to a life that she had imagined for herself, she grieves her virginity, and her actions become a memorial to her.

In this Bible study, a young daughter and a woman anointing Jesus are both remembered for something they do. These women, acting out of love while saying good-bye, remind us to think about what we will be remembered for. What will be our memorial?

Objectives:

- Identify Psalm 130 as Martin Luther's inspiration for a hymn, ELW 600,
- Learn the significance of the rending of clothes.
- Wrestle with the uncertain ending of the story of Jephthah's daughter, and
- Reflect on how they would like to be remembered.

Theme for the March edition of *Gather* is – A Hard Journey. There are times in the life of faith when we find ourselves on a difficult path and we are tempted to turn back. But God's grace will carry us when the way is hard.

The Resource Center - News & Scripture

Last week, news sources reported that during a severe storm that battered the Atlantic coast of Europe, a loaded ship that routinely carries thousands of 40-foot steel containers filled with goods, lost a record number of them into the sea -- about 520.

There is a sense in which that ship can be a metaphor for us, who, under normal circumstances, go about our daily lives doing our duty, handling our responsibilities and proving ourselves reliable and adequate for our tasks. But when heavy storms of life come, some of our duties may become more than we can fully handle, and not all of them are completed.

The Big Questions

- 1. Using the ship carrying containers as a metaphor for us handling our responsibilities, what do you consider to be your God-given duties in life? How did you arrive at that conclusion?
- 2. What kinds of "storms" make it difficult to fully pursue your daily callings?
- 3. How do you think God views our failure to do what we perceive as our duty? Does our being under unusual stress have any bearing on God's view of our failures?
- 4. From a Christian point of view, what is the significance of personal failure? How can it increase our faith in God? What might we do ahead of time to decrease the likelihood that the storms of life will impair our ability to fulfill our God-given duties?

Bible verses to guide your thoughts

1 Chronicles 16:37

In this context, these worship-related duties may be considered "God-given," and bring to mind stanzas from two Christian hymns, both by Charles Wesley. One is the second stanza of "A Charge to Keep I Have" and

the other stanzas are the first two of "Forth in Thy Name, O Lord, I Go."

Questions: To what degree do these hymn lyrics voice a prayer of your heart? Are there times when a hymn, poem or verse inspires, encourages or even shames us into doing the right thing?

Proverbs 31:15

This woman in Proverbs not only manages her household with alacrity, but she rises in the middle of the night with cheerful energy to begin preparing food and directing her household staff. She makes the clothing for her family and herself, as well as extra garments that she markets and sells to local merchants, does charity work for the poor, finds time to handle some real estate transactions and then to plant vineyards on the land she has acquired. Through all of this, she home-schools her children in kindness and religion, keeps up her spirits and behaves with such decorum that she is a good reflection on her husband, who, freed of household duties, is able to take his seat among the elders (a sort of ancient community-service equivalent of sitting on the city council or serving as a judge).

Questions: How does the attitude with which you approach your responsibilities reflect your Christian commitment? Is this an example of how administrative skills such as advance planning and follow-through can be one of the spiritual gifts?

Luke 9:23
