Fertilizer runoff is not only unhealthy for you, but when it enters Sugar Mill's lakes via yard runoff, or enters the Texas waterways via sewers, it can be extremely harmful for fish, humans and wildlife. Environmentally friendly fertilizers such as Milorganite or Ecoscraps are better options.

**Bulky Waste** pickup dates are changing to the 1st Monday of the month, beginning with our Monday, April 4th pickup date.

Sugar Mill's Governing Documents: By purchasing or renting a home in Sugar Mill, you are legally obligated to comply with the Deed Restrictions, Covenants, and Architectural Guidelines. They are easily accessible online at www.sugarmillhoa.net. In general, they govern all exterior changes as well as some land uses for your property. Please become familiar with these so you can help keep Sugar Mill a great place to live.

Repairing cars in your driveway is not permitted within Sugar Mill. If you wish to repair the vehicle within your garage, the door must be closed so you are not within public view.

Now that Spring is here, and you get ready to spruce up your property, please remember that all exterior changes you wish to make to your property, such as planting trees or painting your home, must have prior Architectural Control Committee approval. **Mildew:** Another item to add to your Spring Spruce Up: Please check your home, including the chimney for mildew.

Help save our walls and fences: If you have bushes or trees leaning on a Sugar Mill Community fence or wall, and it is determined that they helped cause the fence or wall to break, you may be responsible for costs associated with the fence or wall repair. Please trim all bushes and trees (well-groomed ivy is permitted) so that they do not touch any Sugar Mill Community fence or wall



When will our Homeowners Association (HOA) walls look pretty again? We have had problems trying to figure out how to keep our HOA-owned walls looking nice. Our Sugar Mill trees have gotten larger, and while we all love the shade, it's ruining our grass. When it rains, mud from these bare areas splash onto the walls, making them look awful. Since it costs about \$40,0000 every time we pressure wash and paint all the walls, it is not a project that we want to do often. The good news is that we believe we finally have a solution. Our plan is to plant Asian Jasmine to the bare areas. Once established, this low-light ground cover will cover all the dirt, thus preventing it from splashing up against the wall. It will also help keep the sidewalks mud-free. Once the soil has been covered up, we will either paint and power wash the walls, or we are also considering planting a climbing ivy to cover all the HOA-owned walls. This would completely eliminate all pressure washing/painting costs because you would no longer be able to see the wall. The later idea is still in the fact-finding stage. I know some of you are growing impatient, and want the walls immediately beautified, but this is a very expensive task and we want to make sure we are spending your HOA dollars wisely. Once the Asian Jasmine gets established, this will be a very cost-effective and long-term solution. The good news is that the worst section of wall on Jess Pirtle, that is nearest to Eldridge, has finally had its two support posts repaired, and will soon be pressure-washed and painted! We apologize for the delay, but we were waiting to receive permissions from all the homeowners who back up to that wall so that we could enter their yards for the necessary repairs. Some residents were non-responsive, which caused lengthy, unavoidable delays.

**Our beautiful fountain** on Lake Trail Drive has died! It stopped working in mid-February, and a new one will be installed by the time you receive this newsletter!

Cullinan Park Updates – surveillance cameras and police patrolling the trails on ATV's are among the numerous changes that are taking place at Cullinan Park since the City recently acquired rights to it. Other improvements include better access to the 754 acres through nature trails and bridges, as well as installation of a picnic pavilion and a children's nature area.

#### Marion's Fishing Corner



Crayfish, crawdads, mudbugs, or crawfish.
Whatever you choose to call them, these tasty freshwater crustaceans are near the top of a bass's menu. This is

especially true this time of year when the high protein value of the crawfish is very beneficial to gamefish roe (or egg) development. Increased protein intake is needed during spring to help insure healthy egg formation. Crawfish that have been mostly dormant all winter are now becoming more active with the warming water temps. This makes them more accessible to the bass, just when needed most. Again, nature provides.

There are many species of crawfish found in our region, and they have different coloration patterns during certain months of the year. During the prespawn period, most crawfish take on dark colors such as black,dark red,and brown hues highlighted by bright outlines of orange or red. Summertime colors are more subtle, with most craws being shades of light green or tan. Anglers would be wise to make note of this, and try to mimic these colors when using craw-imitating soft plastics. I recently read about a study that was con-

ducted on feeding habits of largemouth and smallmouth bass. With several bass being held in a large tank, researchers released 100 threadfin shad and 100 crawfish into the tank. They then documented the bass's response. They concluded that the bass ate the crawfish at a ratio of 7 to 1 over the shad. That's info I'll remember the next time I'm on the water.

Several years ago, Misty lake had a large population of large red crawfish. However, the makeup of our water has changed, and evidently will not support that type of population now. Nonetheless, a bass never loses it's natural instincts and can still be caught on crawfish imitators. So if you are wanting to change up your bait selection a bit and offer them something that they are not used to seeing much in our lake, don't overlook the craw.

Remember to catch and release, because a bass is far to valuable of a resource to catch just once.

## TIPS AND TRENDS TO HELP MAXIMIZE HOME BUYING AND SELLING

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HOME WORK: According to a recent study by Telework Research Network, 30 million people work from home at least once a week, and that number is expected to grow by 63 percent over the next five years.

While dedicating an entire room for a home office is ideal, it's not always practical. With smaller laptops and office furnishings and Wi-Fi connections, work areas can be set up anywhere in the home. Before setting up a workspace at home, here are a few ideas to consider: Reliable power. Many older homes may not have sufficient power or may lack grounded outlets. An electrician can do a wiring inspection and upgrade outlets and circuits as needed. A strong Internet connection is also important. Make sure your DSL or cable modem is func-

tioning well and can handle a demanding work-load. Adequate storage. Storage solutions don't have to be fancy or expensive, but they do need to be tailored to hold everything you need, including reference books, office supplies and files. Sufficient lighting. Tasks like reading or drafting require lighting that shines directly on the work. For task lighting, use energy-efficient, long-lasting LEDs and a dimmer switch to control levels. Work surface. The type of work you do will determine the size of work surface you need. A longer, wider area is better for spreading out papers, while a smaller desk may work best for reading documents and making phone calls. If you use a printer every day, place it within easy reach. Seating. If you sit for long periods, invest in an ergonomic chair. It can provide better support.
