My teaching philosophy sums it up best and reflects my belief in service leadership: "To give of oneself in the venture of promoting and developing the growth of others."

Q & A WITH JEFFREY MRIZEK

Jeffrey Mrizek is the 2022-23 ASPA Sacramento President. He is CEO of Global Urban Nomads, a community of leaders working for positive change. In addition, he is a professor at William Jessup University School of Professional Studies, teaching courses in leadership and management. Jeffrey holds an MBA from University of Phoenix and a Doctor of Education (Ed.D.) from California State University, Sacramento.

When and why did you join ASPA?

As a state civil service supervisor at Franchise Tax Board is where I first learned of ASPA. In that role, I supported the departments' Our Promise, the statewide charitable giving campaign. That is where I first met Geoff McLennan and he introduced me to ASPA. In 2019, I attended my first Annual Award Ceremony. After emerging from the pandemic. I decided to get more involved and joined the ASPA Executive Council in 2021. At this time, I was the Dean of Workforce and Economic Development at the California Community Colleges Chancellor's Office, and we were very busy as the pandemic instigated the digital transformation of that agency. Having worked for a decade in State service, I knew that myself and many public service supervisors and managers were feeling the demands and sensing burn out from the challenges of transforming government to fully remote work. ASPA was a great way to stay connected and network while many of the inperson events were not being held.

What does ASPA offer a student or young professional?

ASPA is absolutely an amazing opportunity for students or young professionals to learn about the importance of public service in meeting the needs of citizens by delivering excellence in leading and stewarding the public good. Perhaps the greatest value ASPA offers is access to leadership at all levels across various departments and agencies; this network provides access to mentorship and insight to emerging opportunities that can support one's career development. By creating lasting friendships with like-minded civil servants at ASPA, students or young professionals find an opportunity to serve, lead and inspire others to the great joy and privileges that public servants enjoy in their careers. Also, there are opportunities to receive scholarships, learn about educational pathways, and even secure internships or promotions from the opportunity to connect with the influential membership of ASPA. Fundamentally, ASPA is a great place to learn, practice and master service leadership with some of the best experienced and emerging state and local government leaders.

What are your goals for the chapter over the next year? My goals for the ASPA Sacramento Chapter is to continue to support the deep passion and hard work of the many volunteer public service leaders who have led this organization before me. One specific goal is to regional partnerships strengthen our with initiatives in our region focused on the recruitment and retention of the public sector leadership. This can be accomplished by strengthening and aligning relationships with regional efforts like Innovative Pathways to Public Service, NXTGOV, and the Institute for Local Government. By approaching our work in regional collective impact, ASPA is well-posed to support the needs of Public Sector Administrators in a very important workforce transition, Building Back Better. As both an experienced public sector administrator and community college professor, I seek to lead ASPA to invigorate our public career pathways to develop, attract and retain talent. By engaging our regional partners and institutions of higher education to support and strengthen our state and local government agencies in talent development. I am most excited by the forthcoming civil service apprenticeship models that ASPA can support in meeting Governor Newsom's call for 500,00 apprentices; this will be an amazing opportunity to both in-skill and up-skill our public service workforce.

If money were not an issue, what would be your dream job?

Truth be told, a SCUBA instructor. It is a personal passion of mine, I enjoy the adventure and exploration of the underwater world and it's the closest way to having the superpower of flying. Although I often joke that I would also do my job as a professor for free. Honestly, it is a pure joy to work with thousands of
