Right on Byrd 1 block to Argyle Left on Argyle to 2577 S Argyle. From the east

you' all happen to be. When you reach Clovis Ave go either north if you came west on Jensen or a road south of it. When you reach Byrd make a right turn.

Some Oddities of the Civil War

The following were gleaned from Burke Davis's The Civil War: Strange & Fascinating Facts:

Firing on both sides of the War was so inaccurate that soldiers estimated it took a man's weight in lead to kill a single enemy in battle.

I don't know how one could verify this statement, but a Federal expert said that each Confederate who was shot during the War required 240 pounds of powder and 900 pounds of lead.

One of the Civil War's most striking victories was won by an Irishman in Confederate service, Capt. Richard Dowling, 19, of the Davis Guards. With 43 men armed with rifles and six small cannon, he defended **Sabine Pass**, TX, in Sept. 1863, driving off a Federal fleet which tried to land

about 15,000 men. Dowling sank one gunboat, disable and captured two others, and turned away the rest of the raiding fleet. He took 400 prisoners—all without a loss of a man.

This was the only command of record in the war to get its whole muster roll into official reports. All the men got silver medals from Jefferson Davis, the only such given by the Confederacy.

AFTER ACTION REPORT SJVCWRT MEETING

25 October 07 by Ron Vaughan

Twenty-two persons were present and the majority voted to continue meeting at Ramada. Professor Jim Stanbery gave another of his always great presentations, this time on "The Lost Opportunity at Spring Hill." He stated it is the common belief that CSA John Bell Hood bungled (partly due to overindulgence of alcohol and laudanum) the chance to cut off Gen. John M. Schofield's army, destroy it, and then race to Nashville. Jim dispelled many myths about this campaign.

First of all, there is no contemporary evidence or commentary that Hood abused substances on that night or any other. Secondly, Jim pointed out that Hood did not have a master plan to win a race to Nashville. His objective was to defeat Union forces in detail if possible, or force them to make costly attacks on his army. Third, the blame for failure to achieve a success at Spring Hill seems to lie with other generals than Hood. Hood had personally led troops into position and given orders to have forces in place north and south of Spring Hill. However, there were no Confederate troops within a stones throw of the pike.



CSA Gen. Cheatham and Stewart did not comply and did not inform Hood of the true disposition of troops. General Nathan Bedford Forrest was a great raider and fighter, but deficient in doing proper reconnaissance and sending intelligence reports to Hood. He did not send patrols on the road south of town, nor report enemy movements to the north. Fourth, even if Hood had cut the roads north of the town, Schofield would not be "cutoff". There were other roads to the west, which could take an army north. Also, even if trapped, he could have dug in and made a good defense.
