These public amenities, as they are known, are dominated by the tyrannical Urine Good Company (pun very much intended) where the only beneficiaries are employees of the money- hungry corporation. If citizens relieve themselves in public or take illegal leaks, they along with rebels who refuse to pay the fee, are punished by exile to the dreaded and mysterious colony of Urinetown.

Director's Notes

Freedom is a theme so basic and so American, it would take a lot to make it look unappealing (hence the many American accents you will hear on stage during this performance); but then again, most people don't consider urination without paying a luxury. With a sense of humour and critical attitude, "Urinetown: The Musical" draws our attention to some of the most pressing problems in contemporary society. Urinetown parodies some big-ticket issues; political topics like bureaucracy, mismanagement of politics, the legal system, corruption, large corporations, corporate control, and the growing divide between rich and poor, as well as discussing social and environmental issues like social irresponsibility, self-entitlement, and environmental conservation.

This year's production has given students the opportunity to explore these arguments from both sides. The show looks at innocent people affected by the greed and corruption of monopolised government and capitalism; all while raising the topic of environmentalism by examining the way humans waste natural resources without a second thought. It is for this reason we decided to showcase 'trashion' (recycling trash as fashion), so it is front and centre in your mind while watching this show.

Urinetown: The Musical, although written 20 years ago, still speaks to the sense of dread that many people have about the world today, and what we do or don't do to affect its future. These students are inviting the audience to look at their own actions and question the actions of society today, but in a non-threatening manner.

In our non-traditional version of this show, we are creating a

vision of a post-apocalyptic future where recourses are scarce and the lower class have formed tribes based on the materials they could get their hands on. We hope this extra layer is a feast for the eyes and is a welcome

departure from the predictable 'brown' colour pallet of the show.

Urinetown: The musical has layers and depth and you can delve in as far as you feel comfortable. The style of the play is strongly driven by the aesthetic of breaking down the fourth wall and putting the performers on the same plane as the audience, so prepare for that 3D effect. With that, Urinetown: The Musical is actively encouraging you to not take it too seriously, so you, the audience, and the performers are always in on the joke together.

I would like to echo the acknowledgment of the amazing support we have had from the RSC community stated by Rosina, Gaynor and Lauren in this program, I would like to also acknowledge our incredible production manager Annmarie Stelfox (prod mum) who, as always, has kept the ship afloat and reminded us to all follow our heart.

To our wonderful cast, you have taken the challenge of signing up for this off-beat show that is not candy coated and easy to swallow. I hope you have enjoyed the challenge and grown as performers. I have been revitalised as a director seeing so many young performers discover the opportunities a show like this has to offer. As always — "I'm not sorry!"


HISTORY OF URINETOWN





PLAYWRIGHT GREG KOTIS HAD THE IDEA FOR URINETOWN WHILE TRAVELING IN EUROPE. A TRAVELING STUDENT ON A BUDGET, HE ENCOUNTERED A PAY TOILET AND BEGAN WRITING SHORTLY THEREAFTER IMAGINING AN ABSURD WORLD WHERE EVERYONE HAD TO PAY TO PEE! JOINING WITH COMPOSER MARK HOLLMANN, THEY TEAMED UP TO MAKE A 'UNPRODUCEABLE' MUSICAL WITH TOO MANY CAST MEMBERS,

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POLITICAL CONTENT AND OF COURSE, A HORRIBLE TITLE! INITIALLY, NO PRODUCTION COMPANIES WERE INTERESTED IN OPTIONING THE MUSICAL, BUT FINALLY THE NEW YORK FRINGE FESTIVAL ACCEPTED THE SHOW INTO THE FESTIVAL WHERE THROUGH A SERIES OF FORTUNATE



EVENTS IT WAS AN AUDIENCE FAVOURITE. THE COMPANY OPTIONED THE MUSICAL, AND IT OPENED OFF-BROADWAY AT THE AMERICAN THEATRE FOR ACTORS, THEN TRANSFERRING TO BROADWAY IN SEPTEMBER 2001. ORIGINALLY PLANNED TO OPEN ON SEPTEMBER 13, THE SHOW CONTAINED SEVERAL REFERENCES WHICH, AFTER THE SEPTEMBER 11 ATTACKS, WOULD PROVE OFFENSIVE. ULTIMATELY, ONLY ONE LINE WAS REMOVED FROM THE SCRIPT, AND THE SHOW OPENED SEPTEMBER 20, 2001

BORADWAY BABY! (2001)

URINETOWN OPENED ON BROADWAY AT THE HENRY MILLER'S THEATRE SEPTEMBER 20, 2001. THE MUSICAL COMEDY, DIRECTED BY JOHN RANDO, PLAYED 25 PREVIEWS AND 965 PERFORMANCES. THE PRODUCTION EARNED 10 TONY AWARD NOMINATIONS UP AGAINST MEGA HITS SUCH AS 'MAMA MIA!', 'THOROUGHLY MODERN MILLIE' AND REVIVALS OF 'INTO THE WOODS' AND 'OKLAHOMA!', WINNING THREE AWARDS; BEST ORIGINAL SCORE, BEST DIRECTION AND THE ALL-IMPORTANT, BEST BOOK OF A MUSICAL WHICH YOU WILL SEE COME TO LIFE DURING THIS PERFORMANCE. THE BROADWAY PRODUCTION CLOSED ON JANUARY 18, 2004 BUT THE WORLD WAS NOT DONE WITH THIS TRULY UNIQUE MUSICAL.

THIS IS EPIC!



Urinetown: The Musical runs on a long-standing tradition of satirical social commentary and protest plays. The writers, Mark Hollman and Greg Kotis, use many of the same techniques as their theatrical predecessors and the show is indebted to the works of many of these great playwrights, composers, and philosophers, which the show honours, updates and pokes fun at. The show owes the largest part of its inspiration to Bertolt Brecht (1898-1956) who was a highly influential German playwright and director. He became renowned for encouraging audiences to think, instead of becoming too involved in the story or characters; developing a form of drama called 'Epic Theatre', in which ideas or lessons are the most important element. For Brecht, the theatre was most useful as a forum for debate. His plays raised social issues that were of great importance to his audiences – often using humour mixed in with politics. Bertolt Brecht's theories about theatre have been so influential that a word has been coined to describe his theatrical style. "Brechtian" is the term used to characterise the type of theatre that Brecht not only wrote, but also directed and developed through extensive work with actors. Notice some of these "Brechtian" techniques in the performance: Actors breaking the 4th wall, political commentary, actors breaking into song and action being spoilt before it happens.

"I'll miss the curtains... and maybe the crew, peace out"



A unique quality of RSC shows, unlike any other school, is the student involvement in the technical crew. All technical elements of every show are operated entirely by a team of students. So next time you are watching a show at RSC, turn around and give a thumbs up to the dedicated students in the tech crew. Students at RSC are afforded a rare opportunity to develop their skills in operating professional-level sound, lighting, vision and stage effects equipment. The industry skill sets which students acquire through their involvement at RSC mirror those required of both amateur and professional theatre companies. Students in all year levels are encouraged to put forward applications to join each show, regardless of their prior

experience. Many students come and go throughout their time at the college, however, for those who are involved from year 7, there are opportunities for supervisor roles in their senior years. This allows the senior students to share their knowledge with the younger generation of techies to continue the tradition of skill sharing; a core value of the RSC production ethos. Students may apply for roles including; Stage Manager, Lighting Operator, Follow Spot Operator, Stage Effects (Operator), Sound Operator, Wireless Microphone Technician, Vision Switcher, and Camera Operator. 

The Lyrebird Awards



In a dystopian future, 20 years after 'The Stink Years', the show opens with a grim welcome from Officer Lockstock, and a street urchin Little Sally. They explain how a twenty-year drought has caused a terrible water shortage, making private toilets unthinkable. All restroom activities are done in public toilets controlled by a megacorporation called "Urine Good Company" (or UGC). To control water consumption, people have to pay to use the amenities. There are harsh laws ensuring that people pay to urinate, and if the laws are broken, the offender is sent to a place called "Urinetown," never to return.

The oppressed masses huddle in line at the poorest, filthiest urinal in town, Public Amenity #9, which is run by authoritarian Penelope Pennywise and her assistant, dashing young everyman Bobby Strong, Bobby's father, Old Man Strong, cannot afford his urinal admission for the day and asks Pennywise to let him go free "just this once." After his plea is dismissed, he urinates on the street and is soon arrested by and escorted off to Urinetown.

Later that day, in the corporate offices of Urine Good Company, CEO Caldwell B. Cladwell is discussing the new fee hikes with Senator Fipp, a politician firmly in Cladwell's pocket, when Cladwell's daughter, Hope arrives on the scene as the UGC's new fax/copy girl.

Officers Lockstock and Barrel discuss the journey to Urinetown and how it reduces everyone, even the toughest, to screams. Hope enters and encounters Bobby Strong, Bobby, distraught over his father's arrest and wondering if he could have done something, tells Hope that his heart feels either cold or empty. Hope tells Bobby that the only answer is to follow his heart. The two realise that they both want a new world where the people can be happy and pee for free. United by their belief, they fall in love. Little Sally asks Officer Lockstock what Urinetown is like, but Lockstock replies that its power lies in its mystery and he cannot flippantly reveal that "there is no Urinetown, we just kill people", and that the reveal will not come until Act II, "with everybody singing and things like that."

The next day, Cladwell's assistant, Mr. McQueen, announces the new fee hikes set upon the urinals. Bobby concludes that the laws are wrong. Opening the doors of the urinal, despite Ms. Pennywise's protests, he begins a pee-for-free rebellion. Pennywise rushes to the offices of UGC, where she informs Cladwell of the revolution. The two give each other long, meaningful looks, but they are interrupted by the situation at hand. Cladwell vows to crush the rebellion, frightening Hope. Cladwell, by way of a series of increasingly convoluted metaphors involving a bunny, tells Hope that it is their privilege and responsibility to stomp on the poor.

Cladwell, McQueen, Fipp, Pennywise, Lockstock and Barrel arrive at Amenity #9 to snuff out the uprising. Bobby learns that Hope is Cladwell's daughter. Bobby realizes that the only way out of the trap is to kidnap Hope to use as leverage against Cladwell. The rebel poor escape with Hope as their hostage. The police give chase, but the slow-motion choreography makes it impossible for the police to catch them. Lockstock vows to catch the poor as he tells the audience to enjoy intermission

What will happen next? Will Bobby lead the poor to glory? Will Cladwell successfully snuff out the uprising? Will hope and Bobby fall in love? Will you come back after interval? We hope so, there are some great songs in Act 2!

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




















