HAPPY 100TH BIRTHDAY to the American Legion Auxiliary! On November 10th, 2019, the American Legion Auxiliary will celebrate its' 100th birthday. At the October 14th, Seward City Council meeting, Mayor Squires issued a proclamation declaring November 10th as American Legion Auxiliary Centennial Day. Unit 5 will celebrate its' 100th birthday in 2023. The American Legion Auxiliary has been dedicated to helping veterans, active duty military and their families, the community and children for a century and look forward to providing that assistance for another century.



November 8th, the Seward Elementary School will be hosting their annual Veteran's Day program. This program is open to all Veteran's and their families. The elementary students

always put on a very special program as a way of saying thank you to our veterans for their service and sacrifice they made to keep us all free. If you are a veteran



or know a veteran please plan to attend - it is so important to keep our youth informed and educated about what Veteran's Day means and the reason why we recognize our Veteran's on a special day.

Veteran's Day is officially on November 11, 2019. Veteran's Day honors all members of the Armed Forces who served this country. They served and fought to protect us, to keep our country safe, and to preserve our way of life. Veteran's gave their time and risked their lives for you and me. In some cases, they made the ultimate sacrifice.

This holiday was originally call Armistice Day and was first celebrated in 1921. In 1954, President Eisenhower changed it to Veteran's Day, in honor of those who served and died from all wars.

On November 11th at 11:11, 1921 the U.S., France and England each buried an unknown soldier in honor of those who died in World War I. This began the annual Armistice Day holiday.

The time and day was picked because fighting ceased in WWI in 1918 on November 11^{th} at 11:11. In keeping with the tradition, work stops on this day and time each year for a moment of silence. Please remember to recognize and thank our Veteran's on this day.

November 10th is USMC Day which celebrates the birth of the United States Marine Corps. The Marine Corps was created

during the Revolutionary War. The Continental Congress of the newly formed United States of America authorized the creation of the Continental Congress on November 10th,



1775. The name was later changed to the U.S. Marine Corps and is often abbreviated as USMC. The Marine Corps has participated in every war that has involved the United States. If you see a Marine, active or retired, thank them for their contributions to protecting our country and freedom. They deserve our thanks and appreciation.



And of course, coming up on the 28th is Thanksgiving. The Post Family will again be providing a great Thanksgiving meal to those in need in the community. This is a great opportunity to volunteer and provide assistance in preparation of the food and delivery to those out in the community who cannot get out. Bingo continues every Monday. Come on down for a fun evening especially now that winter is setting in and the days are getting shorter and colder. A Short History of Veterans Day

World War I - known at the time as "The Great War" - officially ended when the Treaty of Versailles was signed on June 28, 1919, in the Palace of Versailles outside the town of Versailles, France. However, fighting ceased seven months earlier when an armistice, or temporary cessation of hostilities, between the Allied nations and Germany went into effect on the eleventh hour of the eleventh day of the eleventh month. For that reason, November 11, 1918, is generally regarded as the end of "the war to end all wars."

In November 1919, President Wilson proclaimed November 11 as the first commemoration of Armistice Day with the following words: "To us in America, the reflections of Armistice Day will be filled with solemn pride in the heroism of those who died in the country's service and with gratitude for the victory, both because of the thing from which it has freed us and because of the opportunity it has given America to show her sympathy with peace and justice in the councils of the nations..."

The original concept for the celebration was for a day observed with parades and public meetings and a brief suspension of business beginning at 11:00 a.m.

The United States Congress officially recognized the end of World War I when it passed a concurrent resolution on June 4, 1926, with these words:

Whereas the 11th of November 1918, marked the cessation of the most destructive, sanguinary, and far reaching war in human annals and the resumption by the people of the United States of peaceful relations with other nations, which we hope may never again be severed, and

Whereas it is fitting that the recurring anniversary of this date should be commemorated with thanksgiving and prayer and exercises designed to perpetuate peace through good will and mutual understanding between nations; and

Whereas the legislatures of twenty-seven of our States have already declared November 11 to be a legal holiday: Therefore be it Resolved by the Senate (the House of Representatives

concurring), that the President of the United States is requested to issue a proclamation calling upon the officials to display the flag of the United States on all Government buildings on November 11 and inviting the people of the United States to observe the day in schools and churches, or other suitable places, with appropriate ceremonies of friendly relations with all other peoples.

An Act (52 Stat. 351; 5 U. S. Code, Sec. 87a) approved May 13, 1938, made the 11th of November in each year a legal holiday—a day to be dedicated to the cause of world peace and to be thereafter celebrated and known as "Armistice Day."

Armistice Day was primarily a day set aside to honor veterans of World War I, but in 1954, after World War II had required the greatest mobilization of soldiers, sailors, Marines and airmen in the Nation's history; after American forces had fought aggression in Korea, the 83rd Congress, at the urging of the veterans service organizations, amended the Act of 1938 by striking out the word "Armistice" and inserting in its place the word "Veterans." With the approval of this legislation (Public Law 380) on June 1, 1954, November 11th became a day to honor American veterans of all wars.

Later that same year, on October 8th, President Dwight D. Eisenhower issued the first "Veterans Day Proclamation" which stated: "In order to insure proper and widespread observance of this anniversary, all veterans, all veterans' organizations, and the entire citizenry will wish to join hands in the common purpose. Toward this end, I am designating the Administrator of Veterans' Affairs as Chairman of a Veterans Day National Committee, which shall include such other persons as the Chairman may select, and which will coordinate at the national level necessary planning for the observance. I am also requesting the heads of all departments and agencies of the Executive branch of the Government to assist the National Committee in every way possible."

On that same day, President Eisenhower sent a letter to the Honorable Harvey V. Higley, Administrator of Veterans' Affairs (VA), designating him as Chairman of the Veterans Day National Committee.



In 1958, the White House advised VA's
General Counsel that the 1954 designation
of the VA Administrator as Chairman of
the Veterans Day National Committee
applied to all subsequent VA Administrators.
Since March 1989 when the VA was elevated
to a cabinet level department, the Secretary of Veterans Affairs
has served as the committee's chairman.



The Uniform Holiday Bill (Public Law 90-363 (82 Stat. 250)) was signed on June 28, 1968, and was intended to ensure three-day weekends for Federal employees by celebrating four national holidays on Mondays: Washington's Birthday, Memorial Day, Veterans Day, and Columbus Day. It was thought that these extended weekends would encourage travel, recreational and cultural activities and stimulate greater industrial and commercial production. Many states did not agree with this decision and continued to celebrate the holidays on their original dates.

The first Veterans Day under the new law was observed with much confusion on October 25, 1971. It was quite apparent that the commemoration of this day was a matter of historic and patriotic significance to a great number of our citizens, and so on September 20th, 1975, President Gerald R. Ford signed Public Law 94-97 (89 Stat. 479), which returned the annual observance of Veterans Day to its original date of November 11, beginning in 1978. This action supported the desires of the overwhelming majority of state legislatures, all major veterans service organizations and the American people.

Veterans Day continues to be observed on November 11, regardless of what day of the week on which it falls. The restoration of the observance of Veterans Day to November 11 not only preserves the historical significance of the date, but helps focus attention on the important purpose of Veterans Day: A celebration to honor America's veterans for their patriotism, love of country, and willingness to serve and sacrifice for the common good.

"One of our Own!"

For those of you who don't know what Legiontown is let me tell you. It is a national platform of the American Legion that allows us to inform and brag about the accomplishments of our organization or some special folks in our organization. We've had that opportunity to be showcased several times for the good we do in the community and for some special events that are uniquely Alaskan such as the work we do for the Armed Forces YMCA during the Combat Fishing Tournament, donations to the "Take a Vet to Lunch" program at the Senior Center and those occasions where we come together to help others when the fish are running, and we find "the Crew" rallies to fillet over 200 salmon to donate to those in need of nourishing food.

Well, we have another unique event by post member Jeff Roy's little girl - 12 years old Shelby. Shelby was supported by Post 5 as she participated in one of Alaska's fastest pastimes for kids, JR drag racing. It has been around since the 90's and it gives kids 8-17 the opportunity to race half-scale versions of the big dragsters you would see at the big national events in a handicapped, bracket-style drag race contested over a 1/8th mile track. Kids can go as fast as their license allows, and no JR can go faster than 85 mph or 7.90 et.



Shelby had a great season this year, advancing to 5 final rounds with 4 wins, one of those being the big Independence Day weekend race, where she swept both points races and finished the season off in 2nd overall here in Alaska. In the

4 years she's been racing, she's advanced to 14 final rounds with 11 wins, a points championship, an IHRA Iron Man Race of Champions win, and got to represent Alaska at the World Finals held in Memphis, Tenn., in 2017. She has also competed at Bristol, TN, Rockingham Dragway in NC, and I64 Motorplex in Owingsville, KY. (where she



advanced to the final round) and she and her dad Jeff plan on racing Rockingham again this winter as well as hoping to squeeze in a race at the Strip at Las Vegas Motor Speedway.
