Irish Soup

2 Tablespoons butter

- 1 chopped onion
- 4 cups chicken broth
- 2 stalks chopped celery
- 4 medium potatoes
- 1 tbsp. lemon juice
- 2 tsp. sea salt
- 4 cups chopped cabbage
- 1 cup light cream

In a large saucepan, melt butter, add onion and cook until tender. Add chicken broth, celery and 2 potatoes, peeled and sliced. Cover and cook for 30 minutes. Pour all the cooked ingredients into a blender and process until smooth. Return to pan and add remaining diced potatoes, lemon juice and salt. Add cabbage, cover and cook 30 minutes or until the potatoes and cabbage are tender. Add cream and heat.



Heart Healthy Shopping For Seniors

- 1. Buy colorful fruits and vegetables. They are low in calories, high in vitamins, minerals and fiber. At least 5 servings per day is recommended.
- 2. Avoid buying high fat dairy or meat. Look for skinless cuts of lean meat. Ground meats should have less than 20% fat. Dairy products should also be 2%, reduced fat or less.
- 3. Buy plenty of nuts and high fiber foods to help lower blood cholesterol and keep you full. You can find fiber in fruits, veggies, beans and whole grain breads.
- 4. Consider frozen or canned fruits and veggies. They have the same vitamins and minerals in them as fresh. Choose unsalted or unsweetened varieties when possible.
- 5. Read nutrition labels. Most seniors need around 500 mg of sodium per meal or 1500 mg per day. If an item has more than 250 mg of sodium, you may want to search for a product that has less.


