And Don't Forget the Worship and Praise

There's an old joke about a visitor at a Lutheran service getting overly enthusiastic during the service and shouting out phrases like "Hallelujah" and "Praise the Lord!" This made the woman behind the visitor respond, "Hey buddy, this is a Lutheran church, we don't 'Praise the Lord!"

As Lutherans we put a great amount of emphasis on Word and Sacrament and rightfully so. We put focus on the fact that God has called us to His Divine Service that we might hear the Word properly preached and have the Sacraments properly administered.

However, that leaves a gap in our thinking. The Scriptures from beginning to end are full of directives that as we think about how great and awesome the Lord is, we would be a people of worship and praise. As the disciple Peter puts it, *But you are a chosen race, a royal priesthood, a holy nation, a people for His own possession, that you may proclaim the excellencies of Him who called you out of darkness into His marvelous light*. (1 Peter 2:9)

And in reading the Psalms who can ignore the call to worship and praise in those texts?

Psalm 105 - Oh give thanks to the LORD; call upon His name; make known His deeds among the peoples!

Sing to Him, sing praises to Him; tell of all His wondrous works! Glory in His holy name; let the hearts of those who seek the LORD rejoice!

Two quick thoughts – One is just as we get all excited about the accomplishments of family members or even celebrities at athletics or in the media – we are supposed to be even more exuberant about the Lord! He has created us to give Him thoughtful worship and praise.

It's not enough to come and sing <u>about</u> the Lord, He expects us to come and sing <u>to</u> Him.

The other thought is this – worship and praise is not something to be left up to other denominations or traditions. Singing directly to the Lord is the call and vocation of every Christian of every age and background – Psalm 146 - Praise the LORD! Praise the LORD, O my soul! I will praise the LORD as long as I live; I will sing praises to my God while I have my being.

One common factor about all of us is that somehow we want the Sunday morning service to be just about our needs and wishes. But the service is bigger than that – it's never meant to be about us or to just feed us or to just keep us happy. **It's about HIM** – we come as He brings us by the Holy Spirit that we might praise Him as He feeds us with His Word and Supper. AMEN.

There eventually were 7,000 Burma-Shave signs stretching across America. The familiar white on red signs, grouped by four, fives and sixes, were always enjoyable for family trips. You'd read first one, then another, anticipating the punch line on number five and the familiar Burma-Shave on the sixth. The signs cheered us during the Depression and the dark days of World War II. However, things began to change in the late Fifties. Cars were faster, superhighways were built for a new faster pace of life, and sadly, the Burma Shave signs began to decay along the secondary roads. By now, all of the highway signs are gone and they remain as a memory for seniors. They had their moments in time. (A portion of the text is from Internet Research)

What signs do WE follow today? There are many complete with lurid and tempting displays, sounds and smells challenging our purpose each day. Some may seem OK, but a close examination reveals that most are purely secular messages to tempt us with "You need it now" and "You deserve it." Sadly, their theme is "It's all about me." Considering the above declarations, we may deduce that these are thoughts and desires for those who may not really know Christ.

Jesus on occasions prompted the crowd to "follow me". Few did in the early beginnings and even today we are still contending with that challenge to reach the unsaved. We who are in Christ Salvation are also in His life and even His death on the Cross-- quite remarkable as we think of the sacrifice. What sign should we follow today? I say it is the sign of the Cross, an obstacle to the unsaved, but a declaration of salvation for believers. A Baby Care Kit from LWR is like a promise. It says to that baby, Your needs will not be neglected by this world. You matter to us. When you send Baby Care Kits, you provide encouragement by welcoming these little ones into an international community that cares.

Baby Care Kits are distributed as part of emergency and relief efforts, to be sure, but they are also given out as part of LWR health initiatives to encourage women to seek prenatal care. One such initiative in Mali provided training for local prenatal health care workers, who were given Baby Care Kits to distribute when they assisted with births. These kinds of programs help more babies in rural, poor areas receive a healthy start in life. We hope you will join us in this effort!

What to Include

Do not add other items or leave out any of the items listed. Gently used, clean items (no stains or tears) can be substituted for new ones. Wrap items in one of the receiving blankets and secure with diaper pins. Do not enclose the Kit or any of its contents in plastic bags.

Include the following items in each Baby Care Kit:



×2 Two lightweight cotton t-shirts



×2 Two pairs of socks



×2 Two long- or short-sleeved gowns or sleepers (without feet)



×1 One hand towel, dark color recommended



×2 Two receiving blankets, mediumweight cotton or flannel, or crocheted or knitted with lightweight yarn, up to 52" square



×2 Two or three bath-size bars of soap equaling up to 8-9 oz, any brand, in original wrapping



×4 Four cloth diapers, flat fold preferred (see the <u>Diaper Tip Sheet</u> for alternatives




×2 Two diaper pins or large safety pins



×1 One jacket, sweater or sweatshirt with a hood, *or include a baby cap*

Please include sizes between 6 and 24 months. Varying the sizes of the clothing items included will make the Baby Care Kit useful as the baby grows.

- Sweaters may be knitted or crocheted from leftover yarn, or made from heavy double knits or fleece. Select a pattern that suits your skill level. Preferred styles have buttons or ties down the front.
- Diapers can be made from flannel or even by recycling t-shirts.
- If knitting or crocheting receiving blankets, including one knitted/crocheted blanket and one flannel blanket will provide maximum versatility.
- Onesies can be cut and hemmed or serged to make a simple t-shirt.
- Gowns, rompers or top/pants sets can be substituted for sleepers.
