September 6, 2020 Mt 18:15-20

Dear St. Pius X and St. Anthony Church,

Monks in a monastery and nuns in a convent have a community ritual they refer to as 'Chapter of Faults'. They gather in prayer-time, and as a community each member can both 1) offer ready confession of their own sins against a sister or brother, and/or 2) accept accusations of offenses they may have committed against another sister or brother! That is true maturity: a readiness to admit fault and accept responsibility for one's sins. Also, imagine the deep trust they all share to be able to approach another and point out their faults. Of course, the idea is not simply to 'air out' grudges, but it is to involve the whole community in being proactive to heal misunderstandings and prevent grievances from dividing them. Also, such peacekeeping rituals that build stronger cohesion in the small community of a monastery and convent, may not be as easily performed in a larger group (even though it is more needed there!) In a way, we do a 'chapter of faults' ritual at the beginning of every mass as we confess our sins in the 'Confiteor' Prayer and repeat three times 'Lord, have mercy'. Notice that in the prayer we say first, "I confess to almighty God and to you, my brothers and sisters, that I have greatly sinned...". We are confessing to one another. And also, at the end of the confession we ask for prayer from each other, when we say "therefore I ask blessed Mary ever-Virgin, all the Angels and Saints, and you, my brothers and sisters, to pray for me." We both 1) confess offenses committed against each other and 2) ask for prayer from each other! Where do such rituals come from? Jesus Himself. He teaches this 'reconciliation' model in the gospel today!

I call this Jesus' method of conflict resolution or 'church mediation' of problems among her members. Of course, as above, it assumes 'trust and maturity', too. Jesus lays out a four step process aimed at healing and reconciling offenses for the good of everyone involved. First step: Have a heart to heart with the offender. If that doesn't work, step two is to involve a couple of mutually trusted confidants and approach the offender again with prayer and conversation. If that appeal doesn't reconcile brothers or sisters, then go to the whole church. Step three involves asking the whole church for prayer and appealing to the greater unity of the whole body of believers for reconciliation (this larger group intervention is not establishing a jury to vindicate oneself, but a greater call to prayer). If that too, doesn't bring resolution, then Jesus says step four is to 'treat the offender as a 'Gentile or tax collector'' What does that mean? Well, this step four, is the hardest step. It DOES NOT mean to 'write them off' or 'feel justified in hating them'. Not at all. Remember that Jesus said "For the Son of Man has come to seek and to save what was lost" (Luke 19:10 after Zacchaeus the Gentile & Tax collector's conversion)! So the fourth step is the hardest because Jesus is basically saying, "Repeat the previous steps". But this time repeat steps 1-3 on a higher level! Approach the offender (maybe not physically) on a more creative and spiritual level seeking reconciliation and peace. We have all faced offenders who obstinately deny their responsibility or even defend their hurtful offenses as justified. Then what? Still, we must forgive. At each step in this forgiveness process, Jesus is invoking prayer among the believer to be the 'stronger one' to work for the peace not only of him or herself but also of the offender. Justice is good for all involved, just as sin harms the soul of both victim and offender. If an offender cannot see the damage their behavior spreads, then count on it, that their own soul is already harmed (the deadness in soul prevents their empathetic ability to see the effect of their conduct). What else are they doing to themselves that we'll never know about? So Jesus is saying that his disciple needs to 'rise up' and be the stronger person to see through the hurt.

Also, I can't help but see the wisdom of Jesus working through the intervention and efforts of the other disciples brought in to mediate and pray with both parties. Sin affects us all (side effect of original sin is that 'everybody hurts'). So, sin's remedy also helps everyone. For example, by the time the victim works through the first three steps, then those others involved (who as good friends themselves, can see the ongoing torment the victim is putting him or herself through by dwelling on the wrong), will nudge the victim to 'healing and acceptance' through other means. Also, those communitarian steps will raise everyone's awareness of 'intended or unintended' harm that can occur through every person's actions. God's healing and the peace of acceptance comes through that mutual processing of the offense together. Everyone benefits from each person 'letting go' of poisonous grudges or toxic memories of past offenses. Jesus' original acceptance of His own 'peace-giving' cross for our sake is what sets the pattern for all of us disciples to practice individually and as a community this process of 'getting over to getting on' with living'.

<u>Another Saint in a Time of Plague: St Peregrine Laziosi</u> (born 1260-died May 1 1345)

While St. Peregrine is a popular patron saint of all illnesses without known cures yet, he is commonly invoked as help for those suffering cancer. However, since he lived in such a tumultuous political time and among extreme 'divisions' within society, he is also invoked as a patron saint for peace and understanding during times of division and hostility among factions in society (as his biography will clarify below).

St Peregrine is an Italian saint of the Servite Order (Friar Order Servants of Mary). He was born the only son within a politically connected and wealthy family in Forlì (Northern Italy). Forli was part of the Papal States (Italian territorial land under jurisdiction of the Pope). St. Peregrine's family supported the antipapal faction, seeking autonomy from the Vatican's secular rule over them. As a result of the local hostility toward the Pope, the Catholic Churches in Forli were suppressed (closed) by the Pope as a penalty, to bring about reconciliation with Rome. St. Philip Benizi, who was a popular preacher and Prior General of the Friar Servants of Saint Mary, was sent to try to reconcile the divided community and bring them back into union with Roman rule. While addressing the crowds in a public forum, St Philip Benizi was heckled by agitators in the mob. An impulsive 18-year-old Peregrine struck St. Philip. Philip was driven out of the city with further insults and threats. Witnessing the Christian nobility and patience submitting to the crowd's abuse and mistreatment, Peregrine's soul was struck with remorse. He underwent a conversion and sought out St. Philip to apologize and ask forgiveness from him in person. St. Philip meekly received him with kindness, and embraced him. St. Philip's loving reaction made such a deep impression on Peregrine, that he began living a 'consecrated life' for Christ with strong devotion to prayer and charitable works for the poor. Within a few years he applied to become a Servite brother himself and was accepted. He became an ordained priest within the order a few years later in Siena.

A couple years after his ordination, he was sent back to Forlì, to found a new Servite house to serve the poor and care for the sick (kitchens to feed the hungry and hospitals to serve the sick). He was a popular preacher well known for his holiness and piety. It was recorded that during a particular grain shortage due to drought, he miraculously multiplied stores of barley/ wheat and wine. Many people came to him for spiritual direction (confession), and was referred to as an "Angel of Good Counsel" for his wise instruction.

He took on many penances himself, some severe, for the salvation of souls. One such penance was to stand all day, or all the time he possibly could unless he was made to sit by a superior. If he had to, he would simply lean against a wall or his choir stall in the church. In 1320 (at age 60), he developed a terrible infection in his right leg that developed into an ulcer that would not respond to any treatment. A doctor decided to amputate his leg. Since St. Peregrine felt that action would limit his service to the sick and poor, he prayed all night before the Crucifix in the chapel. In a vision, he saw Christ descend from the cross to touch his leg. When he awoke the doctor had arrived and upon examination to prepare for surgery, the surgeon could find no ulcer or residue of the malignant tumor. News quickly spread of Peregrine's miraculous cure and he was sought out for prayer and healing from many sick. Many pilgrims came to him, and continue to pray for his intercession for healing. There is a Saint Peregrine Cancer at Christ the King Catholic Church in Mesa, Arizona.

St. Peregrine, patron saint of cancer and illnesses without known cures, pray for us.


