e are hearing the Christmas story again. In the Gospel of Luke, we read about the angel Gabriel's messages to Zechariah and Mary, the reasons why Jesus was born in Bethlehem, and the angel's announcement to shepherds of Jesus' birth. The angels were busy sharing good news of two babies who were on their way.

In the midst of Luke's account we are given two questions. The first one is by Zechariah, the father of John the Baptist. Zechariah is told that his wife is going to give birth to John, who would prepare the people for the coming of the Messiah. So Zechariah asks:

"How shall I know this? For I am an old man, and my wife is advanced in years." LUKE 1:18

The second question is asked by Mary after learning that she was going to be the mother to Jesus, the "Son of the Most High."

And Mary said to the angel, "How will this be, since I am a virgin?" LUKE 1:34

Was there a difference in the questions? Bible scholars would say that Zechariah's question was asked in disbelief. He wanted proof and asked for a sign, while Mary was merely asking how her pregnancy would take place. It was not a question of doubt or mistrust; rather it was a question of "how?" As it states in *The Lutheran Study Bible*:

In contrast to Zechariah's skeptical question (v. 18), Mary wonders in faith. Zechariah walked away, unable to speak, but Mary burst forth into holy song (vs. 46-55) after Gabriel's departure.

One question revealed skepticism while the other asked in faith.

Why was Zechariah skeptical? Simple. "For I am an old man, and my wife is advanced in years." Their days of having children were over. He was not the first in Scripture to ask this type of question. Abraham and Sarah had no children. They were old. God tells them they would have a child. Abra-

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ham asks the similar question:

"Shall a child be born to a man who is a hundred years old? Shall Sarah, who is ninety years old, bear a child?" GENESIS 17:17

Zechariah's punishment was that he would be unable to speak. Mary's question of faith is answered that the child would be born of the Holy Spirit.

The angel Gabriel answers the two questions with:

"For nothing will be impossible with God." LUKE 1:37

What happened? John the Baptist was born and prepared the people for the coming of Jesus, who was born and made the impossible possible.

But when the fullness of time had come, God sent forth his Son, born

of woman, born under the law, to redeem those who were under the law, so that we might receive adoption as sons. GALATIANS 4:4-5

The reality we face as sinners is eternal separation from God. There was and is no way possible for us to gain our way to heaven. No way! But the birth, death and resurrection of Jesus changed the impossible to the possible for all those who believe in Him. He paid the price for us on the cross. That is what the celebration of Advent and Christmas is all about — Jesus was born. Mary's question was answered and she believed what she was told and it happened. She became the mother of the Christ child. How awesome is that!

Jesus made the impossible ... possible! Our salvation!
