BUILDING UPDATE

If you have driven by lately you can see that things are progressing. On April 27th, a structural engineer evaluated the steeple, and found the steeple structurally sound. Only a screen over one of the louvered sections needs to be put in place. Obviously this is great news. The currently "scheduled" move day for the sanctuary is expected to be during the week of May 11th.



Some work will need to be done on the sanctuary once it is moved. There is rot lo-

cated in the 8x8 wood beams in the area of the original church entrance. These will need to be repaired. Not too bad for a 121 year old building but still an area that will need to be addressed.

Also, all tile floors in the new addition have been polished and waxed. Since the newspaper article appeared in the paper on Sunday, April 19th we have had lots of people stopping by to see our progress. It won't be long now!

A Message from Pastor Robert.....

Brothers and sisters in Christ,

We have been quarantined for over a month now, and many of us are ready for this to be over so that we can get back to our regular routines, or hopefully new routines based upon positive lessons that we have learned from this experience. The important thing is for us all to be patient, and allow this to play out. Trust me our state and medical officials do not want to draw this out any more than necessary since this pandemic has had a very negative effect not only on our economy but also on our medical system which has also lost a lot of revenue due to not being able to perform many procedures over the last several weeks. Yet all of them have been willing to make sacrifices in order to make our communal health a priority.

In the meantime I wanted to share with you all some of my favorite films that in one way or another inspire me, or help me explore a deeper understanding of what it means to be human. It is my hope that these recommendations will help you pass the time when not busy with any other projects you may have taken up over this past month.

Inside Out: If you dismissed this 2015 Pixar film as just another kids movie, then you are missing something truly special. Inside Out is centered on an 11 year old girl named Riley who just moved to a new town and is having a hard time adjusting to her new surroundings. The vast majority of the film takes place inside Riley's head as we experience how she is processing her emotions in an entertaining narrative form that makes it easy for children and parents to understand how depression works and what it is like for children to begin that transition from childhood to adulthood. This is all backed up by an excellent voice cast that really helps you connect with all the characters in order to draw you into Riley's world.

Searching for Bobby Fischer: This is one of my all time favorite films. It came out in 1993 and it follows a young chess prodigy as all those around him are pushing him to be the next Bobby Fischer (who is considered the greatest

chess player of all time) while he wrestles with his need to just be a kid. It is a powerful and inspirational story exploring the positive and negative effects of how we parent and becoming who we want to be rather than what others want us to be.

Slumdog Millionaire: I recently re-watched this 2008 best picture winner and was blown away with all the beautiful messages related to love, forgiveness, and life that were embedded in this film that tackled some very painful aspects of poverty and violence in India. The story is a modern day fairy tale that is centered on Jamal, a young man who grew up in extreme poverty and has now found himself competing on the Indian version of Who Wants to be a Millionaire. As each question is asked it causes him to then reflect upon different experiences in his life that led him to this point. While taking place in India the themes explored are universal and while this character experienced extreme hardship we see that through love, forgiveness and faith he has been able to endure and succeed where everyone else told him he would fail.

Saved: Released in 2004, Saved is centered on a high school senior who finds herself pregnant while attending a local Christian high school and the varied ways her friends react to this. Upon first glance this film can seem very anti-Christian because of the way it points out many of the things it finds absurd within many Christian traditions. Ultimately though the central characters gain a deeper understanding of faith and God while wrestling with many of the traditions and judgmental attitudes that they had been raised with. It is wonderful high school drama/comedy that has helped many young men and women think about and deepen their faith.

As you all know I love movies and maybe later I will have more films to recommend — in the meantime be well and love and peace to you all.

What is May Day? In some parts of the United States, May baskets are made as part of the May Day tradition, a celebration of Spring that can include activities like a maypole dance and crowning a queen of May. May baskets are small baskets usually filled with flowers or treats, left anonymously on someone's doorstep. The giver rings the bell and runs away. Sometimes called the ding dong ditch!

What is the History of May Day? In the United States, the tradition of hanging May baskets on neighbors' doors began in the 19th century. But May Day's history is ancient – the spring festival has roots in pagan agricultural traditions, when people marked the beginning of planting season in the Northern Hemisphere and the holiday celebrated nature. In the British Isles, the festival of Beltane marked the division between winter and summer, and when the Romans conquered that region, they incorporated it into their own culture by creating a goddess of flowers named Flora. That is why so many of the May Day festival activities involve fresh spring flowers and beautiful bright colors.



Extending May Day to the whole month of May is the perfect way to practice social distancing and connect with others, whether it's a surprise on a doorstep, a note in the mail or a phone call. Please contact the church office if you need an address or phone number.

RECIPE CORNER

RHUBARB DREAM DESSERT

CRUST:

1 c flour

5 T powdered sugar

½ c butter

FILLING:

3 c cut rhubarb

1 small pkg strawberry Jello

STREUSEL TOPPING:

1 c sugar

½ c flour

1/4 c softened butter



Blend crust ingredients and press into ungreased 7x11-inch pan. Bake at 350 for 15 minutes. Mix rhubarb and Jello Pour on top of crust. Mix streusel topping, sprinkle on top. Return to oven and bake 30 to 40 minutes until done.


