Program Description

The Criminal Justice Law Enforcement Administration Associate of Applied Science degree program is designed to provide the academic and professional training necessary for careers in Law Enforcement. The Law Enforcement Administration option is designed to prepare students for entry or advancement in the criminal justice system.

WHAT DO LAW ENFORCEMENT OFFICERS DO?

Law Enforcement officers protect lives and property. Detectives and criminal investigators, who sometimes are called agents or special agents, gather facts and collect evidence of possible crimes. Law enforcement officers' duties depend on the size and type of their organizations.

WHERE DO THEY WORK?

Officers regularly work at crime or accident scenes and other traumatic events as well as deal with the death and suffering that they encounter. The jobs of some federal agents, such as U.S. Secret Service and DEA special agents, require extensive travel, often on short notice. These agents may relocate a number of times over the course of their careers. Some special agents, such as those in the U.S. Border Patrol, may work outdoors in rugged terrain and in all kinds of weather.
