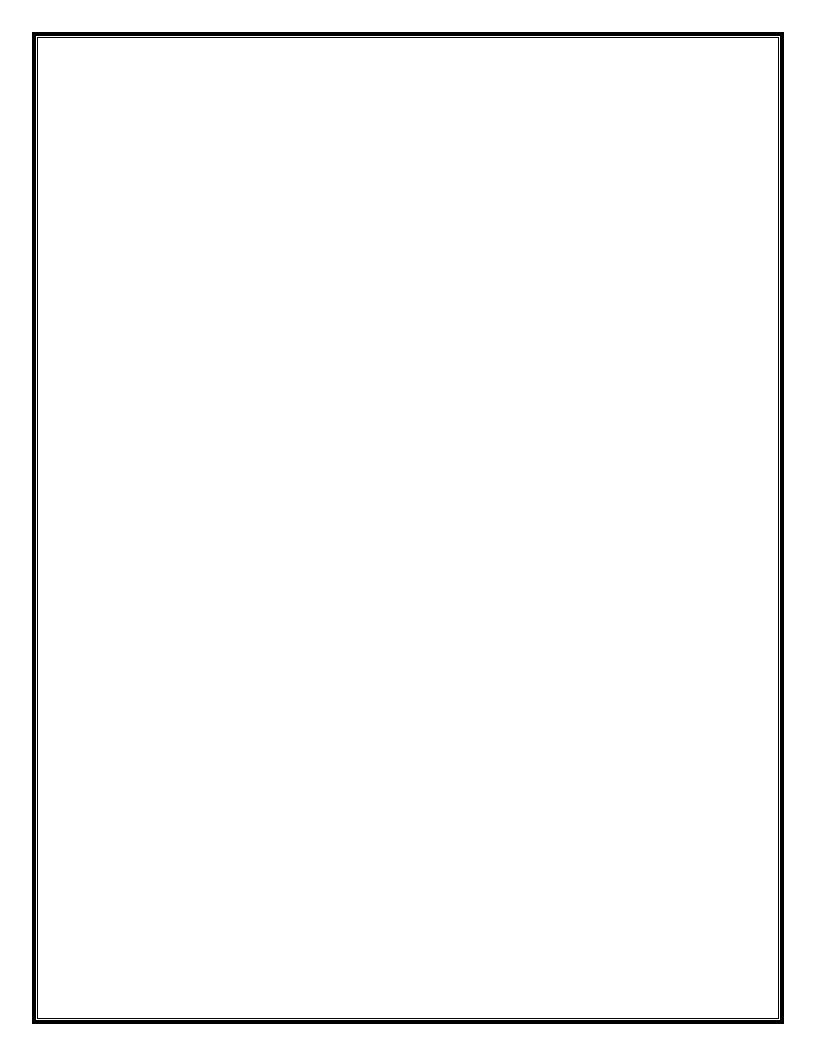

Dear Friends,

We are proud to present our **2021 Annual Report**, which showcases the accomplishments of the past year. The amazing story is in comparing where we came from, where we are today, and what we have accomplished in between. Two stories are worth noting:

First, when we were just getting started thirteen years ago, our board decided to buy our first building before we had even opened a checking account. **Ed Matthews**, a founding trustee, pulled out his checkbook after the vote and wrote us a \$500 check. Handing it over, he said that now we could at least open a checking account before we took out a loan to buy the building.

Second, the **Windgate Foundation** awarded us a \$25,000 grant for The Nook, our new expo and event space, in November. In making the award, they noted how impressed they were that we were able to do so much with so little.

Since our beginning, we have been **making a lot happen with very little**. Three years ago, we faced the very real prospect that we would not last six more months. Faced with long odds, we made the audacious decision to buy two more buildings and combine our operations under one roof! We were all in. Despite a global pandemic adding more challenges, it worked.

Today, the foundation is strategically positioned with a diverse revenue stream of grants, contracts, rental properties, retail sales, and donations from faithful supporters that fund our operations and continue to invest in our community. We are built for the long-term.

We have come a long way from that first \$500 donation. We are happy to report we are in our strongest financial position ever. It happened through a lot of hard work, faith, and grace.

So, what is next? We will continue to stretch every dollar and make the most with every resource we are given as we *bridge the past and future*.

The famous cartographer and explorer Schoolcraft traveled up the White River to the place French fur traders had name Calico Roche, because of the calico-coloring on the bluffs rising out from the river. When the railroad began construction along the river in 1903, they met those rocks and nearly met their match.

The railroad blasted away huge chunks of those bluffs to make way for the railroad bed and sent those huge boulders into the river. Many thought our namesake calico-coloring was gone forever. Now 200 years later, those huge boulders still jut up from the riverbank and the calico-coloring has returned. And, Calico Rock is still the only place in the world with that name.

The Calico Rock Community Foundation was formed in 2008. At the time, our sole purpose was to create and operate the Calico Rock Museum & Visitor Center. Since then, we have restored seven historic buildings, sparked an economic revitalization, and built a museum of national acclaim focusing on science, history, and art.

The foundation has raised and invested \$10 million in Calico Rock. We are preserving our past, celebrating today, and envisioning a better tomorrow.

In appreciation for her service, it is fitting that Jill Easton is the first woman to be named a *trustee emeritus* by our board. Thank you for your service, Jill.




LEAVING A LEGACY

WHAT'S NEXT?



We were awarded a \$25,000 grant from the Windgate Foundation in November to finish the work on our expo/event space. We are calling the space The Nook. Its located just off Peppersauce Alley with ample parking and handicap access. The Nook will have two handicap restrooms, a catering service kitchen, and a large expo/exhibit/event space. The Nook is designed for traveling exhibits, art shows, culinary classes, poetry readings, weddings, family reunions, business conferences, and any other type of event. We are planning to host our first event, the Dedication of the museum in The Nook in March.

As a Main Street Arkansas network program, we are constantly working to expand opportunities for our local businesses. There is a growing demand for small office space for entrepreneurs, so we are renovating the back half of the **Bluff City Bank Building** (behind Peppersauce on Main) to become a **business enterprise center**. Our plan is to offer four or five office spaces with a low monthly rental fee that will include high speed internet, utilities inclusive, and a support team that can make their business successful. It is a fitting location...this was where our museum got its start and where we will help give small businesses their start.

We promised the City of Calico Rock that we would invest \$50,000 over three years into community improvement projects. One of those projects is beautifying Main Street. Unfortunately, the Main Street mural has slowly deteriorated because of a wet weather spring behind the wall. We sandblasted and restored the wall and installed new metal signage that presents a welcoming front door to the community that will be much easier to maintain over time.

Next year, we will invest in art throughout the community, new banners on Main Street, and continue to invest in signage around town to welcome visitors and improve our community.



The Nook will be a place for expression, a place where people can gather. It is being funded by a generous grant from the Windgate Foundation.



In Memory Ed Matthens

His slightly crooked grin usually stretched from ear to ear. His speech was always slow and deliberate, but believing he was not animated would have been a terrible mistake. At ease planting flowers on Main Street with his hands buried deep in dirt or talking by telephone with the United States Secretary of State, Ed Matthews was comfortable in his own skin.

He loved his family and was committed to serving his Lord, but there were two subjects he was sure to speak about if given just enough time--the Methodists and Calico Rock, and not necessarily in that order.

He grew up in Old Joe, just north of Calico Rock along Highway 5, but his love for Calico Rock ran as deep as his bones. He wrote the first history of the town which is immortalized as the Encyclopedia of Arkansas. And, he was instrumental in the founding and continuous growth of the Calico Rock Museum.



Ed was a Methodist minister by vocation, but being a pastor was his passion. He counseled bishops and regular Joes. He was Hilary Clinton's pastor when she lived in Little Rock as First Lady of Arkansas and remained a confidante and spiritual advisor for the remainder of his life. He spoke with her from foreign countries, the White House, and her West Chester home. He saw the human side of her, the vulnerable woman who was a mom and grandma first. He always said that every politician he's ever met, regardless of their party, were far more "real" and human than what we all come to believe by how they are portrayed on television.

Ed was passionate about Calico Rock. He was part of every group that made Calico Rock better. He joined a committee to research the history of the historic buildings on Main Street and applied for their designation on the National Register of Historic Places. He was part 20/20, CORE, the Chamber, and so much more. He was part of the group that tried to rebuild the old depot and negotiated with the railroad to keep the passenger train running through town.

Ed joined the original board of trustees for the Calico Rock Community Foundation. He gave the \$500 that let the Foundation open a bank account, it was the first donation the Foundation ever received. He and his family were quick to join the effort in raising funds for the very first building the Foundation bought and he donated to every future project, too.



Ed never missed a board meeting, a committee meeting, or a group meeting for decades, even though he lived in Little Rock with his wife Pat. He was committed. He was passionate. And, Ed Matthews was a doer.



A few years ago, a car accident made travel to Calico Rock a lot harder and Ed had to step back from all the work he was doing. He stayed involved from afar. He helped edit the Calico Rock history book. He supplied stories and anecdotes. He dug through old pictures. He made introductions to important people and future donors. He was always talking about Calico Rock.

Ed Matthews has gone to be with his Lord and Savior, whom he served faithfully for a lifetime. He leaves to mourn his wife Pat and their boys and children and scores of friends. Ed Matthews has gone home. We will sorely miss his devotion and his tireless efforts.
