Mayor's Message

Spring is in the air! The ice went out on April 30th and our lake appears to be at an average level. Despite a reasonable amount of snow, the runoff has been limited as the melting snow went directly into the water table.

Council continues to work on our Land Use Bylaws. We will need your input. So far, we don't have any dates set for public meetings, but watch for future announcements on meeting dates.

A special thank you to Dennis Woolsey and Rick Wagner for updating our Emergency Services Bylaw. They have also created contact lists and protocols in terms of any future emergencies in our Summer Village.

We have set our budget for the year. The municipal increase is 3.1%. Costs are rising in all areas.

Council has agreed to install a Treaty Six flag beside our Alberta and Canadian flags. This is in recognition of our First Nations neighbours.

Council wishes to extend our condolences to the Feth family. George Feth passed away mid-December. George served as a long-time Council member and employee of Silver Sands.

Alberta Environment sprayed 15 kilometres of flowering rush at the western area of Lake Isle last August. We will examine the results of the spraying in June. Consultations continue with First Nations to consider a five-year plan involving the treatment of the entire lake. A three-member team will continue to map the areas of flowering rush on Lake Isle, the Sturgeon River and the west basin of Lac Ste. Anne.

Hopefully, the weather will cooperate with our Canada Day fireworks.

Property Assessment

Each year, the Assessor will inspect certain properties within the Municipality. The property assessment is the estimated market value of your property as of December 31st of the prior year which is used to calculate property taxes. If you disagree with your assessed value, you have 60 days from the date of your assessment notice to make an assessment complaint. The assessment complaint deadline is **Monday, July 25, 2022**. There is a fee of \$50.00 that must accompany a completed assessment complaint form which is available on the Summer Village website or by contacting the office. Prior to completing the assessment complaint form, please contact the assessor to first discuss the matter of your assessment (not your tax dollars), Tanmar Consulting – 780-417-5191.

Property Taxes

The Summer Village collects revenue annually to meet the projected costs of providing services to the community. These revenues are received through grants and through municipal property taxes. Other amounts collected on your annual tax bill are collected on behalf of the Lac Ste. Anne Seniors Foundation which is seeing a 3% increase from last year, the Alberta School Foundation Fund which is seeing a 4% increase from last year and the Provincial Policing Fund which will increase to \$8,554 this year from \$6,522 last year. This year, the minimum municipal tax payable has been set at \$1,000.00 per property which is up from \$850.00 last year. Property taxes are due **Thursday**, June 30, 2022. The Summer Village has a monthly tax payment plan that runs from January to December, if you are interested in joining the plan, please contact the Summer Village Office - 587-873-5765.

You are required to set the Summer Village of Silver Sands up as a "Bill Payment", the account number will be your "Tax Roll Number" as shown on your Combined Tax and Assessment Notice.

The Summer Village Compost site is located at the Public Works Quonset at 1 Centennial Way. Hours of operation are Monday to Friday, 8:00 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. The site currently accepts leaves, grass clippings & lake weeds. Items that are NOT accepted are trees, brush & branches. Help Prevent the Spread - Clean, Drain, Dry Your Boat!

Clean

- □ Clean and inspect watercraft, trailer and gear
- □ Remove all plants, animals, and mud at the access area or dock
- □ At home, soak your gear in a bleach solution for at least one minute

Ballast

□ Rinse, scrub or pressure wash your boat away from storm drains, ditches or waterways

Drain

- □ On land, before leaving the waterbody, drain all water from:
- □ Bait buckets
- □ Coolers
- □ Bilges
- □ Live wells
- □ Internal compartments

Dry

- □ Dry the watercraft and gear completely between trips and allow the wet areas of your boat to air dry
- □ Leave compartments open and sponge out standing water Please help to keep our aquatic animals and plants healthy -

Do not wash Vehicles, ATV's, Boats etc. in the lake!!

Fires Happen! ARE YOU COVERED?

Did you know that the cost of fire suppression by the fire department is payable by the **property owner?** In our area we have seen the cost of fire suppression for a structure fire as high as \$28,000 and for a wildland (grass fire) as high as \$12,000. Be sure to check your home insurance policy or talk to your insurance agent about what exactly your policy covers and how much it covers. Besides inquiring about your home structure fire insurance, we encourage you to inquire about wildland insurance (for a grass fire that happens but never reaches a structure). Should the fire department be dispatched by 9-1-1 to your residence for any reason (house alarms including false alarms, campfires during a fire ban or fires deemed out of control or unattended, downed utility line, etc.) you, as the property owner, will receive an invoice. The only exception is for medical response calls (assisting Alberta Health Services) – there is no charge for these calls.

Fire Pits

A reminder that all fire pits must:

- -Be at least 3 metres (10 feet) from buildings, property lines and anything else that could catch fire.
- -Be less than 0.6 metres (2 feet) high / Be less than 1 metre (3 feet) wide.
- -Have enclosed sides made from bricks, concrete or heavy-gauge metal.
- -Have a mesh screen on top to stop sparks (spark-arrestor) with openings smaller than 1.25 centimetres (1/2 inch).

Volunteer Fire Department in Silver Sands

Did you know that if we can recruit 8 local residents (within a few kilometers of Silver Sands) that we may in fact be able to house a volunteer fire department within our community? Discussions would have to take place with respect to the details of how this could work, but it certainly would be a benefit to our community. The first step is to determine if we have interest from within our community to become members of a volunteer fire department. Candidates would have to participate in the required training through Onoway Regional Fire Services (North West Fire & Rescue) and would have to commit to ongoing training, meetings and active participation. Bylaw Enforcement/Community Peace Officer/Animal Control/RCMP

The Summer Village currently contracts Peace Officer/Bylaw Enforcement/Animal Control services through a joint agreement with the Town of Mayerthorpe. A reminder that if you have an emergency pertaining to Police, Fire or Ambulance, you must dial 9-1-1 (the non-emergency RCMP line is 780-727-4446).

Use of Municipal Reserve Areas & Enforcement

The municipal reserve areas throughout the Summer Village are intended to provide active or passive park and recreation areas and are intended to provide walking trails and enjoyment of the natural plant and wildlife for residents and their guests.

The reserve areas are **not** to be "annexed" into properties adjacent to them, to be cleared unless Council determines that areas need to be cleared of dangerous undergrowth or decay, to be used for the purpose of placing buildings or structures or extra storage of material or disposal of refuse without written authorization from Council, to be used for the storage of boat lifts or boat docks and are not for camping or recreational fires of any kind.

The Summer Village will be erecting boundary signage throughout the municipal reserve areas and tagging and removing any items that are encroaching onto these areas. Please move or remove any items you may have on the Summer Village municipal reserve areas to your own property. Everyone's cooperation in this matter is essential to the preservation of these precious lands.


