Our club has a lot of gifted demonstrators, and tonight was no exception. At a blink of an eye I thought I was in France. In from the other room walks in this guy with a funny hat and talking with an elevated voice in French. (That is, I think it was French). At this point I figured out that it was our demonstrator for the night, Maury Mahan, and he was holding the tree of learning in his hand. Of course I didn't find that out until we came back to the U.S. and Maury explained what he was holding. The tree of learning was an accumulation of different projects that went wrong. So instead of putting the pieces in the wood pile, he used them to make a tree. He started with a base, added a dowel rod, then drilled holes at different angles through his pieces and placed them over the dowel rod. So now what you see is a piece of art. For him it's a reminder of what doesn't work. He had a story for each piece on the tree, and what went wrong with that particular turning.

Maury then talked about what makes a turning a piece of art. There are three major categories you need to consider 1) Embellishments 2) Shapes and 3) Proportions. He showed the club samples of turnings that he had previously accomplished highlighting the different
