

Parish Membership: Every family and single adult to be considered active members of St. Bartholomew's Parish must be properly registered in the parish, receiving and regularly using the parish weekly donation envelopes. New parishioners are requested to visit the parish office.

Marriages: In order to provide sufficient time for the Marriage Preparation Course, please call the parish office and ask to speak with the pastor at least six months in advance of the wedding.

MISCONCEPTIONS & TRUE KNOWLEDGE



Fallacy, delusion, misconception, misunderstanding, misreading and false impression - all these are synonyms of misconception. The opposite is true knowledge or understanding. What do today's reading have to do with misconception and true knowledge? Check out our first reading from 2 Kings

5:14-17 – the story of Naaman, his wife's maid and Elisha, the Prophet.

The misconception began with King Joram of Israel. King Ben-Hadad II of Aram had sent a letter to King Joram, requesting his help to cure one of his army commanders afflicted with leprosy, Naaman. King Joram misunderstood King Ben-Hadad's true intentions, not without cause though. Naaman's wife's maid was an Israelite girl captured during one of the raids by the Arameans on Israel (verse 2). So, King Joram misread the request as a veiled attempt to wage another war on Israel. Thus, he went into panic mode and sent for Elisha the Prophet. Elisha was not rattled, because he understood the true intention of King Ban-Hadad healing for his beloved Naaman. Thus, he calmed the king down and reassured him. The king then understood. And was at peace.

The next misconception came from Naaman himself. He misunderstood how the famous Prophet Elisha and his God were going to cure and cleanse him. So, when Elisha told him to "Go and wash seven times in the Jordan and your flesh will heal, and you will be clean" (verse 10), he was disappointed and angry. He had thought that Elisha was going to pronounce some abracadabra and wave his hands over his wounds and he'd be healed. Wrong! He felt insulted that he was told to go and wash in the Jordan as though Aram had no rivers; they had better ones for that matter.

Just as God used Elisha to correct King Joram, He uses, once again, the Israelite servant to correct Naaman. He must have heard God telling him deep within his being, "As the heavens are higher than the earth, so are my ways higher than your ways and my thoughts than your thoughts" (Isaiah 55:9). And he understood. And he was healed.

This story is mostly about how people moved from ignorance and misconception to true knowledge. It invites us to consider how we often misunderstand some aspects of our relationship with God (and the Church). Sometimes, with consequences that set us backwards in this relationship. I am sure you'll have your own personal examples, but here are two common or widespread ones.

God is too busy for our problems: A little child knelt down to say her night prayer. She prayed for her family members quickly and told God she would not bother Him with minor issues seeing how busy He must be. Whether we verbalize this or not, we often harbor this misconception within our hearts. Some even believe this out rightly. Our God is omnipotent and omnipresent. For God time is non-existent. He is ever present to you and to me! Period.

We assume God is never satisfied. This misconception might come from Jesus' command: "You therefore must be perfect, as your heavenly Father is perfect" (Matthew 5:48). We must realize that God does not love us because of what we can do for Him. He is satisfied with us primarily because we are His children and because of the blood His Son shed on the cross for us. All He wants from us is to love Him with our whole heart, mind and soul. We are good enough for Him once we do so.

May God send you people like Elisha and the Israelite servant girl to help you correct any misconceptions you might have about Him, which might also be hindering the growth of your relationship with Him. Amen.






MEETING: This Monday, October 10th, the Holy Name Society will meet at 7:30 p.m. in the school building. All men of the Parish are welcome.


